Lord Chamberlain's-Office, June 6, 1848.

ON Tuesday the 6th of June 1848, at a quarter past five o'clock in the morning, The Remains of Her late Royal Highness the PRINCESS SOPHIA, fifth Daughter of His Majesty King George the Third, were privately removed from Vicarage-place, Kensington, for Interment in the Cemetery at Kensal-green.

- A Guard of Honour mounted in front of the residence of Her late Royal Highness.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying Domestic of Her late Royal Highness.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying Mrs. Cochrane, Miss Skift, Miss Fanny Skift, and Mr. Spry, of Her late Royal Highness's Household.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying Dr. Watson, Dr. F. Hawkins, John Merriman, Esq. and James N. Merriman, Esq. the Medical Attendants upon Her late Royal Highness.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying Lady Augusta Bruce (one of the Supporters of the Pall), Lady of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent; Lady Augusta Cadogan (one of the Supporters of the Pall), Lady of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cambridge; Lieutenant Colonel the Honourable George-Augustus-Frederick Liddell, Equerry of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Gloucester; and Colonel Sir George Couper, Bart. and C.B., Equerry of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Marchioness of Ormonde, and Lady Charles Somerset (one of the Supporters of the Pall), Ladies of Her Majesty the Queen Dowager; and Lady Georgiana Bathurst (one of the Supporters of the Pall), and Lady Caroline Murray, Ladies of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Gloucester.
- A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Earl of Morton, Major General Sir Frederick Stovin, K. C. B., and Colonel Edward-Pery Buckley, the Lord, Groom, and Equerry in Waiting to the Queen; and Captain Edward-Arthur Somerset, Equerry to Her Majesty the Queen Dowager in Waiting.

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying Lady Carteret, Lady of the Bedchamber, and Miss Vyse, Bedchamber Woman of Her late Royal Highness, and Lieutenant General Sir Charles-Wade Thornton, K.C.H.

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Coronet of Her late Royal Highness, Lord Edward-George Fitzalan-Howard, Vice-Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, and Sir William Martins.

A Mourning Coach, drawn by four horses, conveying the Duchess of Norfolk, Chief Mourner, and Lady Couper, the Attendant to the Chief Mourner.

The Funeral Procession reached the Cemetery, Kensal-green, at seven o'clock A. M.

His Royal Highness Prince Albert, attended by the Marquis of Abercorn, K. G., Lord George Lennox, Colonel William Wylde, C. B., and Colonel Everard-William Bouverie.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, attended by Major Baron Knesebeck and Edmond St. John Mildmay, Esq.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge; Count Kielmansegge, the Hanoverian Minister; Earl Spencer, C. B. Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household; the Bishop of Norwich, Clerk of the Closet to the Queen; the Very Reverend John Merewether, D. D. Dean of Hereford, and Deputy Clerk of the Closet to the Queen in Waiting; and the Reverend Evan Nepean, Chaplain in Attendance upon Her late Royal Highness, met the Funeral at the Chapel of the Cemetery.

Upon arrival within the Chapel, the Body was placed on the Bier, and the Burial Service commenced, the Clerk of the Closet officiating, assisted by the Deputy Clerk of the Closet.

The Chief Mourner sat at the head of the Corpse, with her Attendant; the Ladies of the Royal Family on either side the Bier, the Lady of the Bedchamber and the Bedchamber Woman of Her late Royal Highness, nearest the head of the Corpse.

His Royal Highness Prince Albert, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, and His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge, sat near the Chief Mourner.

The Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household stood at the foot of the Corpse, the Vice Chamberlain and Sir William Martins on either side.

The remainder of those present proceeded into the pews.

The part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Coffin was deposited in the Vault beneath the Chapel, and the Clerk of the Closet then concluded the Service.

After which, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, and His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge, were conducted by the Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household out of the Chapel, followed by the Attendants and others present at the Solemnity.
