Buckingham-Palace, September 5, 1848.

THIS day Her Majesty, accompanied by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, proceeded in state from Buckingham-Palace to the House of Peers, where she arrived soon after one o'clock; and was received, on alighting from her state coach, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, the Lord Great Chamberlain, the Lord Steward of the Household, the Duke of Wellington, Garter King of Arms, and Black Rod, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

Her Majesty was there robed, and the procession moved into the House in the usual order;—the sword of state was borne by the Duke of Wellington, the cap of maintenance by the Earl of Shaftesbury, in the absence of the Marquess of Winchester, and the crown by the Marquess of Lansdowne.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne, and His Royal Highness Prince Albert on a Chair on the left side of the Cloth of Estate, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, Sir Augustus Clifford, Bart. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message Kingdom.

from Her Majesty to the House of Commons commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I AM happy to be able to release you from the duties of a laborious and protracted session.

The Act for the prevention of crime and outrage in Ireland, which received my assent at the commencement of the session, was attended by the most beneficial effects. The open display of arms intended for criminal purposes was checked; the course of justice was no longer interrupted; and several atrocious murderers, who had spread terror through the country, were apprehended, tried, and convicted.

The distress in Ireland consequent upon successive failures in the production of food has been mitigated by the application of the law for the relief of the poor, and by the amount of charitable-contributions raised in other parts of the United Kingdom.

On the other hand, organized confederacies took advantage of the existing pressure to excite my suffering subjects to rebellion. Hopes of plunder and confiscation were held out to tempt the distressed, while the most visionary prospects were exhibited to the ambitious. In this conjuncture I applied to your loyalty and wisdom for increased powers; and, strengthened by your prompt concurrence, my Government was enabled to defeat in a few days machinations which had been prepared during many months. The energy and decision shewn by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland in this emergency deserve my warmest approbation.

In the midst of these difficulties you have continued your labours for the improvement of the laws; the Act for facilitating the sale of incumbered estates will, I trust, gradually remove an evil of great magnitude in the social state of Ireland.

The system of perpetual entails of land established in Scotland produced very serious evils both to heirs of entail and to the community, and I have had great satisfaction in seeing it amended upon principles which have long been found to operate beneficially in this part of the United Kingdom.

I have given my cordial assent to the measures which have in view the improvement of the public health, and I entertain an earnest hope that a foundation has been laid for continual advances in this beneficent work.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have to thank you for the readiness with which you have granted the supplies necessary for the public service.

I shall avail myself of every opportunity which the exigencies of the State may allow for enforcing economy.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have renewed in a formal manner my diplomatic relations with the Government of France. The good understanding between the two countries has continued without the slightest interruption.

Events of deep importance have disturbed the internal tranquillity of many of the States of Europe, both in the north and in the south. These events have led to hostilities between neighbouring countries.

I am employing my good offices, in concert with other friendly Powers, to bring to an amicable settlement these differences; and I trust that our efforts may be successful.

I am rejoiced to think that an increasing sense of the value of peace encourages the hope that the Nations of Europe may continue in the enjoyments of its blessings. Amidst these convulsions I have had the satisfaction of being able to preserve peace for my own dominions, and to maintain our domestic tranquillity. The strength of our institutions has been tried, and has not been found wanting. I have studied to preserve the people committed to my charge in the enjoyment of that temperate freedom which they so justly value. My people, on their side, feel too sensibly the advantages of order and security to allow the promoters of pillage and confusion any chance of success in their wicked designs.

I acknowledge with grateful feelings the many marks of loyalty and attachment which I have received from all classes of my people. It is my earnest hope that by cultivating respect to the law, and obedience to the precepts of religion, the liberties of this nation may, by the blessing of Almighty God, be perpetuated.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by Her Majesty's command, said,

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to " amend and render more effectual an Act, passed " in the last session of Parliament, for build-" ing, and promoting the building, of additional "churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in the said Commissioners under the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, in the words following, viz.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Drayton in Hales, in the county of Salop, and within the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate at Little Drayton, in the said parish of Drayton in Hales, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the "An Act to amend and Third, intituled "render more effectual an Act, passed in " the last session of Parliament, for building, " and promoting the building, of additional " churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners under the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be called, "The Chapelry District of Little Drayton," with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

"The boundary of the chapelry district of Little Drayton commences at a point, No. 1 (on the map hereinafter referred to), where the

boundary line of the parishes of Moreton Say and Drayton in Hales meet, at the bridle-way, entering into Longslow-lane, and proceeds from such bridle-way, in a south easterly direction, along the southern side of that lane as far as Shropshire-street, and crossing that street proceeds along the south western side of the lane leading by the National Schools, down the steps, and into the road, called New-town; up the southern side of which road it proceeds, horth easterly, as far as the turnpike road leading from Drayton to Newport; crossing the river Tern, it proceeds, in a south easterly direction, along the western side of the said turnpike road as far as the boundary line of the parish of Hinstock; along which boundary line it then proceeds, in a south westerly direction, as far as the turnpike road from Whitchurch to Newport; and then proceeds, in a north westerly direction, along the boundary line of the parish of Stoke upon Tern as far as the river Tern; along which said river it then proceeds, south westerly, as far as the boundary line of the parish of Hodnet, and proceeds along that boundary line, in a northerly direction, until it reaches the boundary line which separates the parish of Moreton Say from the parish of Drayton in Hales; along which said boundary line it then proceeds south easterly, north easterly, and northerly, until it reaches the point where the said boundary first commenced, as such proposed district is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient, that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church, at Little Drayton aforesaid; and that the fees to arise therefrom should belong and be paid to the incumbent thereof for the time being:

John Lord Bishop of Lichfield (as Bishop of the diocese) has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof, he has signed and sealed this instrument:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously

pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.
