Walmouth, Nov. 11.

THe 7th Instant the *Endeavour* of this Port which with the last fair wind went out for *Ireland*, with a considerable lading of Salt, Hops and Linnen cloth, intending from thence for the *Barbadoes*, had the misfortune in her way to spring so great a leak, that most part of her lading was much damaged, and a considerable quantity thrown overboard to preserve the Ship, which yet had run a great hazard of being foundred, had not a *Londoner* homewards bound taken care for her, and brought her hither into harbour.

The 9th instant came in the *St. John of Dover* laden with Corn, which had also sprang a leak, but had timely stopped it, without any considerable damage; as also another Vessel from the same place bound with provisions for *Tangier*.

Plymouth, Nov. 12. The *Bantam Merchant* is put to sea with a fair wind. From *Foy* we are advised of the arrival there of a Vessel from the *Barbados*, having left the rest of the Fleet from that place, consisting of 52 Sail, 8 dayes since about 500 leagues off at sea, and tis hoped may suddenly appear upon the Coasts.

West-Cowes, Nov. 12. The last night arrived here 5 ships, amongst whom the *John of London*, homewards bound from *Bilboa*, informing us that the *Teneriffe Merchant*, intended for *Bilboa*, was cast away in that Road, with the Master and all the Company, three only excepted.

The same night was forced in by storm the *Cat*, a Privateer of *Offend* with two Prizes, one the *St. John of Hambourgh*, laden with Pitch, Tar, &c. taken off from *Havre de Grace*, the other a *Rotterdam Ship* homewards bound from *Diepe* laden with Tobacco and other Commodities.

Tarmouth, Novem. 13. On Sunday last arrived here a Vessel from *Hull*, informing us, that by a Danish Vessel they were assured that a Ship of this Town homewards bound from *Newcastel*, laden with Coals, and supposed to have been lost, is safely arrived at *Bergen in Norway*, where she has disposed of her lading, and is taking in her Cargo of Deals.

This Morning sailed from hence the *St. George of London* with another Vessel laden with Herrings for the Streights. Another Vessel that some dayes since went off for the same parts, was cast away upon the *Goodwins*, but her men escaped in their Boat to *Newport*, only one, who could not be persuaded to quit the Ship, was found dead and fastned to the Shrouds.

This afternoon came in here two Ships from *Rotterdam*, both of them belonging to this place laden with Merchants Goods.

Milan, Oct. 26. Our Governour *Don Luis Pons de Leon* continues still his more then ordinary care for putting all places under his Government into the best defensive posture, and in order thereunto is pleased personally to visit the most considerable places, which he abundantly supplies with all sorts of Provisions, giving order for the necessary repair of all his Forts and places of strength.

Two new Regiments are now compleating; and will in little time be ready to Muster. In few dayes all the Cavalry are to be drawn to a Rendezvous, and a particular account to be taken of the whole Force of this State both of Horse and Foot, that all things may be in a fit posture to receive the French if they should make any attempt this way the next Spring.

The Duke of *Parma* is gone for *Modena* incognito. The Abbot *Rospigliosi* continues yet at *Rivoli*, where he daily recovers strength, and may in few dayes go forwards for *Rome*.

Venice, Oct. 31. A Ship lately arrived at *Ancona*, tells us, that the Turks had with great loss of men quitted the Siege of *Candia*, and that the Venetians Sallying out upon them, fell in upon their rear with so much valor, that they were much disordered in their retreat, and great numbers killed, but this being news only gathered up by the way, we expect a farther confirmation.

Our last Letters from *Candia* by the way of *Otranto*, assure us that the Turks, especially the Janisaries, being tired out with the tediousness of the Siege, the many wants they find in the Camp, and the great slaughters and loss of men, were grown mutinous against the Grand Visier, who fed them with large promises, but 'twas believed would in little time be obliged to quit the Siege.

We are also informed, that the 25 years of Truce between the Persians and Turks being now expired, and the Grand Sophy of Persia having observed the Grand Sultan to have his hands fully employed in the Siege of *Candia*, and more work cut out for him in *Poland*, was resolved to take these advantages of renewing the War upon him, and had accordingly already declared it, which gives us some reason to believe that the Visier will not be able to continue long before the Town, but will be called off to the more necessary defence of the Empire, to which purpose 'tis said a Chiaus is already dispatched to him.

Our Auxiliary Gallies having taken four considerable Prizes laden with Corn, and given chase to ten of the enemies Gallies, which saved themselves by flight, are now returned towards their Ports, and were safely arrived at *Zante*.

Several of our ships have been lately ordered out by the Senate, to take in the Powder, Mortars and Granadoes given by the Pope and Duke of *Tuscany* for the assistance of *Candia*.

Dantzick, Nov. 5. Letters of the 28th past from *Warsaw* inform us, that the General *Sobietzky* had by a late Treaty with the Tartars, prevailed with them for a Truce for the space of six moneths, by which they were to March away out of the Polish dominions, and not to return again before the time prefixt; but for so doing they were to receive 120 thousand Polish Guilders from the General, whereof one moiety to be presently paid, and Hostages given them for security of the other: All the Tartarian prisoners to be released, but the *Polanders* taken by them continue still Captives, and they suffered to march away with all the Booty they have gotten in this Invasion. They much pressed the nullifying of the Peace with *Mosco*, but this at the last was left to be debated in the ensuing Diet which is to be held in *January* next. We hear not that the Cossacks were at all mentioned in this Treaty.

The King is daily expecting the full relation of this Agreement from the General, which when arrived, will be made publick, and the raising of the Militia of the Kingdome countermanded.

Hague, Nov. 17. On Tuesday next the States of *Holland* are to be again Assembled, wherein several Affairs of Concernment will fall under their consideration; particularly the continuance of the present Taxes and Impositions for a year longer, as also to deliberate upon their present State and posture of Affairs in reference to the *Netherlands*. The Baron

de Bergeick having not closed with the Proposals made to him, is upon his return without effecting any thing in that Negotiation, a Minister of State was lately sent from his Highness the Elector of Brandenburg to the Marquis *de Castel Rodrigo*, to encourage the Agreement with the States, but as yet little fruit appears of his endeavours.

The Count *de Donna* is still here expecting the exchange of the Ratifications of the Treaty between that Crown and the States, and the payment of the sum of 240 thousand Crowns which in few dayes the East-India Company will be ready to pay to the Swedish African Company according to the Treaty, in reparation of the damages received in the Fort of Cape *Corso* and the Swedish Ship formerly seized; which done, he intends for England.

The States of *Holland* intend also in their Assembly to nominate their principal Officers to command in the Army, and if the other Provinces hold off, may probably elect them out of their own Province.

The Bishop of *Strasbourg* is in four or five dayes expected here, having, according to his desire, a Yacht sent to transport him to *Amsterdam*.

From *Manster* we are informed, that the Bishop of that place has prevailed with the States of his Country for an advance of moneyes towards the raising of eight Regiments of fifteen hundred men in each Regiment, which are to be employed (as is given out) against the Elector of *Cologne*, and 'tis said the Bishop of *Paderborne* is raising five Regiments for the same design.

The Portugais Ambassador has given in writing his answer to the States demands, in which, for the restitution of *Cochin* and *Canonar*, he offers the present payment of two Millions, and the yearly value of 500 thousand Livres to the West India Company for twelve years, in lieu of the other six Millions demanded by the States, which they are content to accept upon that Kings Ratification, and shall be willing out of an act of pure generosity to remit all the Interest that may be due for that sum.

The Duke of *Newburgh* has written to the States to acquaint them with the safe Delivery of his Dutchess of a young Prince.

On Monday last the States sent to Complement the Prince of *Orange*, it being his Birth-day, and his entrance into the 17th year of his age.

The 6000 men ordered to be raised, are now Levying.

Paris, Nov. 19. From *Lille* we are informed, that the Sicknel's rages extremely in that and some other places of our new Conquest, and that of the Garrison in that City, there dyes between 20 and 30 in a day.

Order is given for great Levies against the next Spring both of horse and foot in all parts of his Majesties Dominions, but none of them to be, in till *January* next; if the Treaty for Peace between the two Crowns proves ineffectual, 'tis believed his Majesty will not have less then 150 thousand men in Arms for the next Summers Service, in which 'tis confirmed that the Generalship of the Army in *Catalonia* is conferred on Monsieur the Duke of *Orleans*, who, if the War continues, intends in person to spend two years together in that Service with an Army of 15000 men. Nor are our preparations less for the Sea then Land-Service, several Gallies being now building at *Toulon*, and a considerable Fleet intended to be fitted up under the Command of the Marquis *de Crequy* General of the Gallies, to attend the Spaniards in the Mediterranean.

From *Rocheil* we are told, that the rest of the Squadron designed for the Mediterranean; but dispersed and endangered by Storm, have been discovered at the Mouth of the River of *Charante*, and are since put in there.

This day the Prince of *Conde's* Baggage went hence for *Burgundy*, himself in few dayes intending to follow after, and may be again expected back in *January* next, or so soon as he shall have given order for the Fortifying of such places which he shall find most convenient, and settled those parts in a good posture.

The Deputies from the States of *Germany*, intended hither with the others of a Mediation in the name of the Empire, will not set forwards out of *Germany* before the next Month, so that the Treaty is not like to begin till towards the Spring.

The 17th Instant his Majesty gave Audience in the great Gallery of the *Chuilleries* to the Baron *de Platten* Ambassador from the Dukes of *Brunswick* and *Lunenbourg*, to which he was introduced by the *Sieur de Berlige* the Master of the Ceremonies, with the usual Ceremonies.

From *Thouze* we are told, that the great and important work of cutting a large Channel for a Communication between both Seas, is advanced beyond expectation, and 'tis hoped, that whereas eight years were allotted to Monsieur *Riquet* the undertaker, for the perfecting thereof, it may be probably effected in half the time; they are now laying the Foundation for the first Sluice, where is to be placed a Medall designed and continued by the *Sieur Andreossi*.

Margate, Nov. 13. Yesterday the *serings*, one of his Majesties Fregats, passing somewhat too late in the Evening through the Narrow, unfortunately run aground on the Sands called the *Woolpecker*, and was lost; the men escaping in their Boat got safe to land, where the Pilot is secured, through whole want of care she was thought to have miscarried.

Whitchall, Novem. 15. This day their Excellencies the Heers *Mierman* and *Boreel*, Ambassadors from the States of *Holland*, had their Publick Audience of both their Majesties in the *Banquetinghouse*, to which they were introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord *Pagett*, and Sir *Charles Cottrel*, Master of the Ceremonies, with the usual Solemnities.

The same day being likewise the Birth-day of her Majesty, the Court was more then usually filled with Ladies of the greatest quality, who were in the Evening diverted with the Italian Musick in her Majesties Privy Chamber, and the night afterwards concluded with Fireworks, for which preparations was made in *St. James's Park*.
