AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 15th day of *January* 1849,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the regulation of municipal corporations in England and Wales," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that, if the inhabitant householders of any town or borough in England or Wales should petition Her Majesty to grant to them a charter of incorporation, it should be lawful for Her Majesty by any such charter, if she should think fit, by the advice of Her Privy Council, to grant the same, to extend to the inhabitants of any such town or borough, within the district to be set forth in such charter, all the powers and provisions of the Act, of the fifth and sixth William the Fourth, cap. 76, for regulating corporations, whether such town or borough be or be not a corporate town or borough, or be or be not named in either of the schedules to the said Act; provided, nevertheless, that notice of every such petition, and of the time when it should please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette one month at least before such petition should be so considered:

And whereas the inhabitant householders of the borough of Tynemouth, in the county of Northumberland have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, praying that a charter of incorporation may be granted to the said borough:

Her Majesty was this day pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said petition be taken into consideration, by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on Tuesday the twentieth day of February next.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Ma-

jesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in the said Commissioners under the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, in the words following, viz:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Longford, in the county of Derby, and within the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient, that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Alkmonton, in the said parish of Longford, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes,' or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners under the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should comprize the whole township of Alkmonton (except a small detached portion thereof situate about three miles and a half from the said church), and the whole of the liberty or township of Hungry Bentley, and should be called 'The Chapelry District of Alkmonton,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

"The chapelry district of Alkmonton is bounded on the east by the townships of Longford and Rodsley, both in the said parish of Longford; on the north by the chapelry district of Yeaveley and the township of Stydd, both in the parish of Shirley; on the west by the parish of Cubley, and on the south by the parishes of Boylstone, otherwise Boilston and Barton Blount; and which proposed chapelry district of Alkmonton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured green:
