p Etcd here from Spain, most of his Servants being already arrived by Sea. The Prince de Vaudemont continues in a ve y weak Condition without any fign of Amendment. And the Prince de Rache hes dangeroully ill at Mons. The Letters from Vienna of the 6th Initant tell us, That the Emperor with the Hungarian and Auxiliary Troops, will have too thousand fighting Men in the Pield the next Summer. They wite from Upper Hungary, that the chief of the Rebels in Mont-gatz do diffwade the Prince's Ragoizi from submiting to the Emperor, giving her hopes of her Hufbands Liberty; which is much talked of, but as we have reason to be ieve, without any ground. These Letters add, that upon the advancing of the Imperial Troops towards Montgatz the Rebels retired from the Town into the Callie, but finding afterwards that the Imperialists could not binguptheir Cannon, and that they were therefore drawn back, the Lungarians returned into the Town.

Bruffelles, Decemb. 21. His Excellency parted from hence this morning for Louvain and Leeuwe intending to be here again on Sunday or Monday The States of this Province have in comnext. pliance with his Excellencies demand, refolved to raile Fifty thousand Florins for a Months pay to the General Officers. Our Span fh Letters, which came this day, tell us, that a very confiderable fum of mony will be very speedily remitted hither. That the Count de Melgar at present Govenor of Milan is appointed by the King of Spain to go his Ambaflador Extraordinary to the Pope. And that the Count de Monterey, the Duke d'Uzzeda, and the Duke de Bournonville are in Nomination for the Government of Milan. The Letters from Vienna of the 10th inflant, tell us, that the Prince's Ragetzi having fent to the King of Poland to defire his Interpolition with the Emperor on her behalf, his Majesty had refused to meddle therein, but had advised her to submit her felf in time to his Imperial Majefty.

The isth Inftant arrived Paris, Decemb. 22 here, the Marquifs de la Pierre from Turin, with the News of the Dutchess of Savoy's being brought to bed of a young Princes; He had the same day Audience of the King, and of the Duke of Orleans, being prefented to them by the Marquifs Ferrero Ambaffador of Sayoy. His most Christian Majesty has named the Marquifs d'Urfe, and the Duke of Orleans the Count de Tonnerre, to go and make their Compliments at the Court of Savoy on this occasion. The zoth of this month the Count de Lobcowitz Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor had his first Publick Audience of the King at Verfailles, being conducted by the Introductor of Amballadors. Signior Bapt. Nani is coming hither in the quali y of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Republick of Veni e. The Letters from Germany tell us, that the Emperor and the Elector Pala'in, have confented to refer the differences between the faid Elector and the Dutchels of Orleans to the Popes Arbitrage,

London, Decemb. 15. This day Signior Zeno and Signior Giussiniani, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, made their Publick Entry, having been received at Depiford, by the Earl of Tarmouth, and Charles Cottrel Eiq; Affistant-Master of the Ceremonics, and brought by Water in the Kings Barge to the Tower ; At their Landing they were Saluted with the ulual Discharge of the Cannon, and were ftom thence Conducted in His Majesties Coach followed by four Coaches of their own, and a great many others with fix Horles a-piece all in

Mourning, to the Houfe appointed for their Entertai ment in St. Fames-Square, where their Excellenci:s were Complimented from the King by my Lord Lumley; from the Queen by Her Majeilies Vice Cnamb riain ; from the Queen Dowager, likewife by Her Vice-Chambeilain ; and from their Royal Highneffes Prince George, and the Princess Ann, of Denmark, by the Masters of their Horie.

The'r Excellencies Whitehall, Decemb. 18. Signior Zeno and Signior Giuftiniani, Ambaffadors Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, had this Afternoon their Publick Audience of their Majeslies, to which they were Conducted by the Earl of Darby, and Sir Charles Coursel Master of the Ceremonics in the Kings Coach followed by their own and a great Irain of other Coaches with Six Horfes apiece, with all the other Honors

that are given to Ambälladors of Crowned Heads. Whitebal, Decemb. 18. His Majelty has been pleated to appoint the Right Honorable the Lord, Viscount Tiviot, Colonel Robert Philips, and John Evelyn of Deptford Elgito execute the Office of Lord Privy Scal, during the absence of his Excellency the Earl of Clarendon' Lord Licutenant of Ireland.

London, Decemb. 18. This day Charles Bateman was executed at Tyburn, according to the Sentence passed upon him the 11th instantat the Old-Bayly.
