The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade in the "British Possessions abroad," after reciting that, by the law of navigation, foreign ships are permitted to import into any of the British possessions in Asia, Africa, or America, from the countries to which they belong, goods the produce of those countries, and to export goods from such possessions to be carried to any foreign country whatever; and that it is expedient that such permission should be subject to certain conditions, it is enacted that the privileges thereby granted to foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those countries which, having colonial possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, shall place the commerce and navigation of this country, and of its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation, unless Her Majesty, by her Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any part of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not, in all respects, be fulfilled by such foreign country:

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to grant the aforesaid privileges of trading with the British possessions abroad to the ships of the Dominican Republic:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in her vested by the said recited Act, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from the date hereof, and in the mean time, until Her Majesty in Council shall be pleased to revoke or determine this Order by any other Order in Council, it shall be lawful for Dominican

vessels to import, from the territories of the Dominican Republic into any of the British possessions abroad, goods the produce of the said territories of the Dominican Republic, and to export goods from such possessions, to be carried to any foreign country whatever:

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the vessels of the Dominican Republic from trading with any of the British possessions in Europe, to such extent and in such manner as they lawfully may under the laws of navigation now in force:

Provided further, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall extend or apply to the possessions of the East India Company:

Provided always, that the privileges hereby granted shall be confined to vessels of the Dominican Republic, built, owned, and navigated as required by the British laws of navigation for the time being in force:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Cathedral Churches of Wales," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-ninth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' and of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for regulating the Cathedral Churches of Wales,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for making additional provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes where such assistance is most required:

"Whereas, under the authority of the said recited Acts, we have from time to time prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council certain

schemes, in which we have recommended and proposed that certain grants should be made, in augmentation of the incomes of certain benefices and churches, in certain classes, and subject to certain limitations, therein mentioned, which schemes have been ratified by Orders of your Majesty in Council, and such Orders have been duly gazetted:

"And whereas on the sixth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, we found it necessary to suspend, until further notice, our recommendations of further grants, with certain specified exceptions, and the several benefices and churches described in the schedules hereunto annexed fall within such exceptions:

"And whereas, after due inquiry and consideration, we have satisfied ourselves that the benefices and churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A, fall within the first of the before-mentioned classes, subject to the respective limitations in the said Orders mentioned, and are fit and proper to be forthwith augmented, by the respective annual amounts stated in the last column of the same schedule:

"And whereas the benefices or churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C, fall within the third class in the said Orders mentioned, and are situate within the places set opposite to the names thereof respectively in the fifth column of the same schedule, and we are in possession of certain tithes or lands arising or situate in such places respectively, or of the proceeds thereof; and after due inquiry and consideration, we have satisfied ourselves, that the same benefices are fit and proper to be forthwith augmented, by the respective annual amounts stated in the last column of the same schedule:

"We therefore humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches so described in the said schedules marked A and C the fixed annual sum set opposite to the name of such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedules respectively, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year; but in the case of Shotter Mill, contained in the said schedule marked A, not after the first day of May or the first day of November, as the case may be, next following the expiration of the existing lease of the tithes of the parish of Frensham; and that two such half-yearly payments shall in each case be made on the first day of May next:

"And we further recommend and propose that, in consideration of an equivalent benefaction which has been secured to us by the Right Honourable John Earl Brownlow, there shall, in like manner, and on like days and times, be paid by us to the incumbent for the time being of the district chapelry of Manthorpe, in the parish of Grantham and county of Lincoln, the fixed annual sum of sixty pounds:

"And whereas we have satisfied ourselves that the several benefices or churches contained in the schedule hereunto annexed marked E fall within the third of such classes, except the perpetual curacy of St. Mark, Swindon, which falls within the second class aforesaid; we therefore recommend and propose, that in order to provide fit houses of residence for the incumbents of the benefices or churches contained in the last-mentioned schedule, we shall be at liberty to pay to such persons and at such times as shall appear to us from time to time to be expedient, such a sum or sums of money, in the case of each such

benefice, as shall be required for providing a fit house of residence for the incumbent thereof; provided that, in the case of the last-named benefice, the total amount so paid by us, in addition to the amount of the benefaction, shall not exceed such last-mentioned amount.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation of any of such benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit, when there shall be sufficient means for that purpose; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of

payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure for making better provision for the cure of souls, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," or under or by virtue of any other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Rothwell, in the West Riding of the county of York, and within the diocese of Ripon, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate at Middleton, in the said parish of Rothwell, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' or under or by virtue of any other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the church building Acts, and that such district should consist of the township of Middleton, and part of the township of Rothwell, and should be named 'The Chapelry District of Middleton,' with boundaries, as hereinafter mentioned:

"The chapelry district of Middleton is bounded on the north and north-west by the parish of Hunslet and the townships of Holbeck and Beeston, in the parish of Leeds, on the west by the township of Churwell, in the parish of Batley, on the south-west and south by the parish of West Ardsley, and by the chapelry district of Lofthouse, in the said parish of Rothwell, and on the east by the said chapelry district of Lofthouse, and by the turnpike-road leading from the town of Leeds to

the town of Wakefield, extending northward from the said chapelry district of Lofthouse, along the west side of that road, to its junction with the highway leading to Rothwell Haigh; thence along the north side of that highway, easterly, to the crossing of the railway from Rothwell Colliery to the river Aire; thence along the west side of that railway, north-easterly, to where it crosses the turnpike-road leading from the said town of Leeds to the town of Pontefract; and from this point, extending in a north-westerly direction on the south-west side of that turnpike-road to where it enters the parish of Hunslet, as such proposed chapelry district of Middleton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured blue:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary the Virgin, at Middleton aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be equally divided between the minister thereof and the Reverend John Bell, Master of Arts, the present vicar or incumbent of the parish church of the said parish of Rothwell, during his (the said John Bell's) incumbency thereof; but, upon his avoidance of such parish church, that the whole of the said fees should belong to the said minister of the said church of Saint Mary the Virgin, at Middleton aforesaid, and his successors:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Lord Bishop of Ripon (as Bishop of the diocese) has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned; in testimony whereof, the said Charles Thomas Lord Bishop of Ripon has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.
