REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOM.

The Ladies, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *legibly* written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presencechamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies, who are to be presented, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on the Tuesday previous to the Drawing-Room on the 31st of May, before twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested, that in every case written cards only be delivered.

Board of Green Cloth, St. James's-Palace, May 25, 1849.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the carriages proceeding to her Majesty's Drawing-Room, on Thursday the 31st of May, are to fall into line and come down the left-hand side of St. James'sstreet, enter at the iron gate nearest the Palace, set down at the Arcade, turn round, and go out by the iron gate nearest Marlborough-house, to wait in St. James's-square. When called, they are to pass from the square through Charles-street, into Regent-street and Jermyn-street, come down St. James's-street as before, take up, and go away through Pall-mall.

No hackney carriages will be admitted within the gates.

For all persons having the privilege of the entrée, tickets will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, on Tuesday next, from eleven till three o'clock : their carriages are to pass through Constitution-hill-gate, into St. James's-park : those belonging to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers are to set down at the Ambassadors'-entrance in Marlborough-court, at the east end of St. James's-palace, and wait there till called : those belonging to the Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State are to set down in the Middlecourt, and wait there : the carriages of all other persons having the entrée are likewise to set down in the Middle-court, and wait in Stable-yard, or St. James's-park, till called : they are then to take up in the same order as they had set down, and pass away up St. James's-street.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket; to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hill, gate, and Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entrée* by any other approach to the Palace than as above directed.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted that, notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like rights and powers of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us by proper instruments, in writing duly executed according to law, with a proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed except by the authority of a scheme and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act 'to carry into effect, with certain modifications, 'the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ec-'clesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two 'several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-'missioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for substituting a money payment to the Canon of the canonry of Woodborough, in the collegiate church of Southwell, for certain property belonging to him as such canon.

"Whereas it was by the first recited Act (amongst other things) enacted, that, subject to the provisions therein contained, all the estate and interest which the holder of any canonry not suspended by or under the provisions of the same - Act, and his successors, had and would have in

any lands, tithes and other hereditaments or endowments whatsoever annexed or belonging to or usually held or enjoyed with such canonry (except any right of patronage), or whereof the rents and profits had been usually taken and enjoyed by the holder of such canonry, as such holder separately and in addition to his share of the corporate revenues of such chapter, should, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than the provisions of the same Act, accrue to and be absolutely vested in us and our successors, for the purposes of the same Act, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the said two recited Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect 'any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the . hand of any canon of any cathedral or collegiate church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes or other hereditaments belonging to such canon, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes or hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes or other hereditaments:

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Edward Garrard Marsh, the present Canon of Woodborough aforesaid, that, with a view to the sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

commended by us to your Majesty in Council: "We therefore, with the consent of the said Edward Garrard Marsh, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of such gazetting, all the lands, tithes and other hereditaments (except any right of patronage) now belonging to or forming part of the endowment of the said canonry, or to or in which he the said Edward Garrard Marsh as such canon, has or ought to have any estate, right, title or interest, separately and in addition to his share of the corporate revenues of the chapter of the said colle-giate church of Southwell shall, together with all such estate, right, title and interest therein, be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said Edward Garrard Marsh to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance as aforesaid, there shall be paid by us to the said Edward Garrard Marsh in each and every year, so long as he shall continue to hold the same canonry and no longer, the annual sum of seventy-five pounds, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July, and that the first such half-yearly payment shall be made on the first day of July next; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease, of such lands, tithes and other hereditaments as aforesaid. or of any part thereof, shall since the fifth day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, have been or shall be granted by the said Edward Garrard Marsh, and that if the next avoidance of the said canonry shall happen on any other day

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than one of such two half-yearly days of payment, then a proportionate sum only shall be paid to the said Edward Garrard Marsh or his representative or representatives.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lincoln. His Royal Highness Prince Henry of the Netherlands, on his arrival in England, to return the Insignia of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, worn by Field Marshal His late Majesty King William II. of the Netherlands. His Royal Highness was attended by Count Schimmelpenninck, the Netherland Minister at this Court.

His Royal Highness was introduced to his audience by Viscount Palmerston, G.C.B. Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Colonel the Honourable Sir Edward Cust, K.C.H. Master of the Ceremonies.

Westminster, May 24, 1849.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to confirm certain Acts of the Legislature of Newfoundland respecting the rebuilding of the town of Saint John's, Newfoundland, and to enable the said Legislature to make other provisions respecting the rebuilding of the said town.

An Act to remove doubts concerning the validity of certain grants of land in the colony of New South Wales.

An Act to make provision until the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty, for a general rate in aid of certain distressed unions and electoral divisions in Ireland.

An Act for the dissolution of the Argyll Canal Company, and for the abandonment of their undertaking.

An Act to enable the Edinburgh and Northern Railway Company to raise a further sum of money.

An Act for the management and disposal of the Freemen's Pastures, in the parish of Great Grimsby, in the Parts of Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, and for other purposes. An Act for better supplying the town, port, and

An Act for better supplying the town, port, and harbour of Whitehaven and other places with water.

An Act for altering the mode of assessing the drainage rates, authorized by the Act for draining and improving Marshland Smeeth, and Marshland Fen, in the country of Marshland, in the county of Norfolk, and to provide for the repair of roads within the limits of the said Act.

An Act for enabling the North Western Railway Company to make an extension of the Lancaster Branch of their railway, and a new road to Settle Station, and to abandon the William Lands' Branch, and for other purposes.

An Act for authorizing the Bradford Waterworks' Company to raise a further sum of money.

Whitehall, May 24, 1849.

The Queen has been pleased to nominate and appoint James Ivory, Esq. one of the Ordinary Lords of Session, to be one of the Lords of Justiciary in Scotland, in the room of John Hay Forbes, Esq. resigned.

India Board, May 24, 1849.

The dispatch, of which the following is an extract, and the accompanying papers, have been this day received at the East India-House, from the Governor-General of India.

The Governor-General of India to the Secret Committee of the East India Company.

Camp, Sidham, April 7, 1849. (Extract.)

On the 21st ultimo, Major-General Sir Walter Gilbert took possession of the city of Peshawur. Dost Mahomed Khan had fled with his army on the 19th, and had reached the western side of the Khyber Pass. The city of Peshawur was found uninjured; but most of the garden houses in the neighbourhood had been burnt by the Affghans, and the Sikh cantonment completely destroyed.

You are aware, from my dispatch of the 24th ultimo, that I looked to the occupation of Peshawur, and the flight, or destruction, of Dost Mahomed Khan, as results, the accomplishment of which was necessary to enable me to declare the war concluded, and peace restored. The indefatigable ardor of Sir Walter Gilbert, inspiring his troops with like zeal, achieved, with singular rapidity, the crowning successes of the war.

I request your attention to the General Order issued by me on the 2d instant, and to the names of the officers particularly noticed therein.

General Order by the Governor-General of India.

Camp, Ferozepore, April 2, 1849.

The Governor-General has the gratification of publishing, for general information, dispatches which have been received from his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, and from Major-General Sir Walter Gilbert, K.C.B. announcing the termination of hostilities in the Punjab.

The Governor-General declared that, before the war could cease, every enemy, whether Sikh or Affghan, should be driven from before us; and the British army has well and gallantly made good his words.

The Sikh Sirdars and the remnant of their army were pursued, have surrendered, and have been disarmed.

The Ameer of Cabool with his troops has fled before the British force, and has been chased ignominiously from the territories he invaded.

The war has thus been brought to an end, and the Punjab has been declared a portion of the British empire in India.

Once again the Governor-General offers to his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, to the General Officers, the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Soldiers of the Army, the assurance of his deep and unfeigned gratitude for the great services they have rendered to the country, for the zeal and gallantry they have displayed, and for the sustained and cheerful exertions they have made.

In anticipation of the wishes of the Honorable Court of Directors, the Governor-General will grant to every officer. and soldier, who has been employed within the Punjab in this campaign, to the date of the occupation of Peshawur, a medal, bearing the word "Punjab," in commemoration of the honorable service they have done.

The Governor-General is also pleased to direct that every corps which has been so employed shall bear the same word on their standards, colours, and appointments.

The Governor-General desires to take this opportunity of acknowledging his obligations to officers who have been serving in various positions connected with the army in the field.

The Governor-General is sensible of the zeal and activity of Major-General Sir D. Hill, K.C.B. commanding the reserve, and he would have looked with confidence to his service, if the division under his command had been called into operation.

Brigadier-General Wheeler, C.B. has executed the several duties which have been committed to him with skill, and with success, and the Governor-General has been happy to convey to him his thanks.

The Governor-General is indebted to Brigadier Stalker, commanding at Mooltan, for the successful exertions which have been made under his directions for placing the fort again in a condition of defence, and for maintaining the tranquillity of the country.

The Governor-General begs to acknowledge the service which has been rendered by Lieutenant-Colonel Mc Sherry, 1st Native Infantry, commanding at Govindghur. The energy, vigilance, and tact which he has exhibited, during his occupation of that fortress, have been of much value to the Government of India.

From Sir Froderick Currie, Bart., Resident at Lahore, previously to his return to his scat in Council, the Governor-General received at all times effective and most ready co-operation: and he has continued to receive from Lieutenant-Colonel Sir H. Lawrence, K.C.B. the support which his known ability and experience enable him to afford.

The meritorious conduct of the several Assistants to the Resident has elicited the strong approbation of the Government. In addition to those whom he has before named, the Governor-General offers his especial thanks to Major George Lawrence, for the able management which so long enabled him to maintain his position at Peshawur, and to Captain James Abbott, for the gallant stand he has made in the hills of Hazara.

Lieutenant Taylor has earned the full approbation of the Government by his judicious and persevering efforts, which regained, and have held, the province of Bunnoo.

The sustained defence of the Fort of Attock, which was made by Lieutenant Herbert, under circumstances of great difficulty, has been viewed by the Government of India with admiration, and entitles him to their warmest praise.

Mr. John Lawrence, Commissioner of the Trans-Sutlej province, has received the thanks of the Governor-General. Well seconded by his assistants in the district, he has greatly contributed, by his promptitude, energy, and firmness, to the maintenance of the general tranquillity which has prevailed in these newly acquired territories.

The Governor-General especially wishes to record his marked approbation of the manner in which Major Mackeson, C.B. as his Agent with the army, has discharged the duties which were intrusted to him. In the important political matters in which he has been engaged, Major Mackeson's proceedings have been distinguished by ability, judgment, discretion, and firmness; and the Governor-General begs to convey to him the expression of his unqualified satisfaction.

The Governor-General concludes by tendering to the Officers of the Government in his camp sincere thanks for the assistance he has, at all times, received from them.,

He particularly desires to express his obligation to Mr. Henry Elliot, Secretary to the Government of India, for his very able, laborious, and valuable aid in the important affairs which have occupied the Governor-General's attention; and to Colonel Stuart, C.B. Military Secretary to the Government of India, and to Lieutenant-Colonel Benson, C.B. Member of the Military Board with the Governor-General, for the great assistance he has derived from their experience and judgment in the affairs of their respective departments.

While thus congratulating the Army and British Subjects in India, on the triumphant success which has been achieved, the Governor-General desires humbly to acknowledge the Hand, by which alone all victory is given.

He has, accordingly, intimated to the Lord Bishop his wish, that, on the first Sunday in May, thanksgiving shall be offered to Almighty God, for the successful termination of the war in which we have been engaged, and for the restoration to the people of the blessing of peace.

The brilliant results have been obtained, your Lordship will observe, without a single shot being fired by our troops since the victory of Goojerat, on the 21st ultimo.

It is almost superfluous for me to repeat to your Lordship how very highly I estimate the unwearied and zealous exertions, in these subsequent movements, of that most energetic and able officer Major-General Gilbert, and the excellent troops under his command.

In soliciting your Lordship's particular attention to Major-General Gilbert's commendation of Major F. Mackeson, C.B. your Lordship's Agent with the force, I beg to repeat the high sense I entertain of that officer's merits, and the excellent service he has rendered throughout the campaign.

The Sikh rebellion and Affghan confederacy having been now effectually put down and overthrown, I beg to be favored with your Lordship's instructions for breaking up the Army of the Punjab, which has, I trust, merited the approbation of your Lordship and the country.

Major-General Sir W. R. Gilbert, K.C.B. Commanding the Field Force on Special Service, to the Adjutant-General of the Army.

Peshawur, March 21, 1849.

I advanced this morning, from Nowshera to Peshawur, with the Bengal division of my force, and have much satisfaction in reporting, for the information of His Excellency the Right Honorable the Commander-in-Chief, that I am in possession of the city of Peshawur and its Bala Hissar.

The Affghan Army, under command of Ameer Dost Mahomed Khan, retreated from Peshawur on the 19th instant, and is to-day reported to have reached Dakka, on the western side of the Khyber Pass. The city I found untouched by the Affghans, the Ameer having directed the gates to be closed against his troops; but most of the garden-houses, in its neighbourhood have been burnt, cr otherwise rendered uninhabitable; and the Sikh cantonment, at Ali Murdan Khan's Bagh, has been burnt to the ground. The fort of Jumrood is, also, reported to be destroyed.

By the expulsion from the Province of Peshawur of the Ameer and his army, I have carried to a successful conclusion the whole of the instructions of the Right Honorable the Governor-General of India, conveyed to me, through his Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, with your letter of the 3d instant. The Sikhs have been humbled, and their power crushed; the British prisoners released from an irksome captivity; and the rich province of Peshawur freed from its Mahomedan invaders. To my troops I am indebted, under Providence, for these glorious results. Since the 1st of the month, they have marched from the Jhelum to the Indus and Peshawur, crossing both rivers under many disadvantages, and overcoming all the obstacles of the road, which are naturally great, and were much enhanced by our large train of stores and baggage -the necessary incumbrances of a force like this. To both officers and men I am deeply indebted, for their cheerful endurance of the fatigues and privations to which all have been exposed.

I cannot permit myself to conclude this report of my arrival at Peshawur, without expressing to his Lordship my sense of the valuable services rendered me by Major F. Mackeson, C.B. who accompanies the force as Agent of the Governor-General. I am particularly indebted to him for his ready assistance, and for the unwearied and unremitting zeal with which he has performed the important duties of his office. To his cool judgment and unswerving decision of purpose, I owe much of the success that has attended the progress of my force.

From my Staff generally, I have received every assistance.

(Extract.)

I have had the honor of receiving your Excellency's dispatch, dated the 25th instant, inclosing a copy of one from Major-General Sir Walter Gilbert, K.C.B. in which he announces the occupation of Peshawur by the force under his command, and the retreat of the Ameer Dost Mahomed Khan and his followers beyond the Khyber Pass.

I request that your Excellency will convey to Major General Sir Walter Gilbert my strongest approbation of the manner in which the service on which he was sent, has been conducted and performed.

Major-General Gilbert has earned the highest credit by the ability, energy, and discretion with which he has directed these movements; and I am most sensible of the cheerful and continued exertions which have been made by officers and men—exertions which have produced the gratifying result of compelling the surrender of the remnant of the Sikh army, of driving the Affghan Sovereign and his army ignominiously from the country, and bringing the war to a full and most honorable conclusion.

Your Excellency can now proceed to take the proper steps for breaking up the army of the Punjab.

The Nosshead Light will be known to mariners as a revolving light, which gradually attains its brightest state once every half minute, and then as gradually declines, until to a distant observer it totally disappears. The light will be visible towards the north and east, between W.N.W. and S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. From S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. to N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. in a south-easterly direction, the light will be of the natural appearance; but from N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N. to W.N.W. in a northerly direction (or within Sin-clair's Bay) it will be coloured Red. The lantern is elevated 175 feet above the level of the sea; and the light will be seen at the distance of about 15 miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere; and, to a near observer, in favourable weather, the light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness. The Commissioners hereby further give notice

that, by virtue of a warrant from the Queen in Council, dated 11th August 1848, the following tolls will be levied in respect of this light; viz.:
