HE Prince de Monaco arrived here on Weinelday lait; He is lodged in the Convect of the Carmelites, where he has been Complimented on the part of the Republick. The 6th Inftant parted from hence one of this States Gallies for Marfeides, to bring from thence the Marquis de Marini, late Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick at the Court of France. The Governor of Milan is expected here against the Carnaval, We have an account from Rome, that the Pope has granted the Tenths of the Ecclefiaftical Revenues in Spain for the War against the Turks. Naples, Decemb. 5. The 2d inftant arrived in this Port the Spanifb Gallies, 21 in number, which are to winter here. The Refident of Venice has demanded of our Viceroy, that in purfuance of the Leave obtained by the Venetian Ambaffador at Madrid, he may make in this Kingdom a Levy of 2000 Men for the Service of that Republick, but the Orders from the Court of Spain not being politive in this matter, his Excellency has not yet given any Aufwer therein. His Excellency has received directions from Madrid, to remit 50000 Crowns to the Governor of Milan. The Fort built in the Province of Abruzzo, to ftop the Incurfio s of the Banditi, is quite finithed, and 200 Spaniards are put into it.

Spaniards are put into it. Venice, Decemb. 22. The Senate have, we are told, made an agreement with the Princes of Lunenburgh for 4000 Foot, which are to march to Triefle, to embark there. Part of the Troops, for which they have treated with the Governor of Milan, arrived in the beginning of this week at the Lido, and the reft are expected in few days. Count Coningfinarke who is to command the For-ces of this State, under the Captain General, is expected here the next Month, by which time he hop s, as he has written hither, the Levy he is making for the fervice of the Republick will be compleated., The Count de Lodron, General of the Croats, is now here, with feveral other Officers who came with him to ferve the Republick. Signior Cornaro is preparing for his departure for Dalmatia, being to fucceed Signior Pietro Valier as Provedicor General of that Province; The laft Letters we had from thence, informed us, that the Turks had had a defign upon Cattaro, but had not fucceeded in it. We have advice from the Morea, that Ifmael Baffa had of late appeared feveral pimes with firong Parties of Horie in the Neighborhood of Coron, but that the Garifon of that place had as often fallied out upon them, and obliged them to retire. And that the Bacha of Romania having fent an Aga to endeavor to regain the Mainotes, who have put hemfelves under the Protection of the Republick, by promifing them an Exemption

for Five years from all manner of Contributions, they had given him a very ill Reception, shaving cut off his Ears, Nofe and Lips, to thew how littly they thought of returning under the Obedience 3af the Grand Signior. The Duke of Manfua is gone home, but it's believed will be here again againft the Carnaval. The Count de St. Paul it going to quit the Command he has in the Service of the Republick, the ill flate of his health making him defirous to retire from Publick Employment.

Warfaw, Decemb. 15. The Forces of this Crown are gone into their Winter-quarters; having full fered very much for the fhort time they mere at the Field through the want of Provisions, as well as through the condinual Skirmidnes they had with the Enemy for 12 days together. The Officers have Orders to recruit their refrective Compannics; And we are told that leveral new Regiments will be railed. The Tartars make frequent Incurfions into the Province of Volbinial The Seralquier Solyman has put his Troops into Winterquarters in Valachia.

Fienna, Decemb. 23. Frequent Councils are held here, at which the Emperor is for the moft part present, to regulate the Operations of the approaching Campagne, which will be begun much, carlier than the lait, by the h-lp of the great Magazines that are providing at Compare, and other places, for the sublishence of the Troops. Ine Ex-1 preffes that were fent to Poland and Kenice with the Propofals of Peace made by the Jurkifh Aga at Comorra, being come back with the Refolutions of that King and the Republick thereupon, the faid Aga will now be dispatched with an Answer in the Name of all the Allies. They write from Zolzockey that the Baron de Mercy having received advice that the Turks of Gyula had fallen upon an Imen nerial Convoy that was going to Sarauss, he im-mediately fent out a flrong Detachement under the Command of Colonel Heusler, who coming up with the Enemy, had a very fharp Dispute with them, in which, its faid, 2000 of the Enemywere flain, and that the reft retired in great diforder towards Gyula, being purfued by the Imperialifts, but this account, though it comes from feveral hands, full needs a Confirmation. The Advices concerning Teckeley are very different, but the best account we have, is, that he is fiill at Belgrade, kept there under a Guard, but with more favour and liberty than he was at first, and that he may hope to be yet better treated, if the Proposals the Turks have made for a Peace be rejected by the Emperor. The Prince of Transitvania offers to furnish Provisions and Forage for the fublifience of the Garifons of Zolnocke, Saravas, St. Nicholas, and fome other places on that fide, upon condition his Countrey may be cafed of the Imperial Troops that have taken their Winter-quarters there under the Command * of General Caraffa. Cardinal Bonvife, the Pope's NunNuticio, has acquainted the Emperor, that his Hor linefs has given Orders for the remitting hither 400000 Florins to be employed in the Preparations for the next Campagne.

Ratisbonne, Decemb. 26. The Count de Windisferance is returned hither from Vienna. The States 'of Suabia are now allembled at Nuremberg, to refolve about the recruiting their Troops at prefent in the Service of the Emperor.

Cologne, Dec.29. Our present Burghers have fent Deputies to Bonne, to make their Compliment to his Electoral Highness upon their being reflored to the Magistracy, who have been verywell receiv'd at that Court, The Imperial Sub-Commissioners are expected here again the next Week, to finish the fettlement of the Affairs of this City. The Lift Letters from Vienna gave an account, that a Project of Conditions hath been drawn up, to be delivered to the Turkish Aga at Comorra, in the Name of the Emperor, the King of Poland, and the Republick of Venice, upon which they are willing to begin a Treaty of Peace, and to agree to fome convenient place to meet in for that purpose. The Letters from Hangary give an account of a sharp Ren-The Letters counter between the Turks and Imperialis, not far from Saravas, in which the former are faid to have loft two thousand Men. They write from Caschaw, that General Caprara having scut again to furmion the Princes Ragetzi to furrender the Cafile of Montgatz, the Hungarians in Garifon there had fired upon the Imperialifis that were charged with the Melfage.

Hamburgh , Decemb. 28. The Letters from Eqperbagen of the 2 }th Inftant tell us, that the Count, de Nostitz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empe-ror, had paffed through that City in his Journey And that Deputies were arrived there to Sueden. from the West-India Company of Brandenburgh, who had been in Conference with the Ministers at that Court, upon fome Agreement that is propofed to be made between the faid Company and that. of Denmark. They write from Berlin, That the Elector of Brandenburgh hath written to the Em-peror on the behalf of this City, that their Deputies at Vienna may be admitted to an Audience of his Imperial Maj fly, which they have not hi-therto been able to obtain. The Sicur Kaunitz, who we told you in our laft was returned hither, has fince had a Conference with fome of our Magiftrates, to remove the difficulties which hinder the compolitre of the differences between the Duke of Zell and this City, but we cannot fay with what fuccefs. The Letters from Poland do not fpcak of any thing but the Preparations that are making for the next Campagne, which, they fay, are carried on with all the diligence and application imaginable.

Hague, Jan. 4. The States General have, we are told, given the neceffary Orders for the making the first Payment of the Arrears of Subfidies, being 140000 Gilders, to the Heer Van Stilte, the Brandenburgh Minister, who is thereupon gone to Amsterdam to get Bills of Exchange for the remitting this Money to Berlin or Hamburgh. The Heer Guldenstelpe, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sudden, was yelferday again in Conference with the Deputies of this State, on the Subject of the Alliance that's going to be renewed with that Crown.
