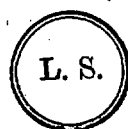

Whereas, by an Act eleventh and twelfth Victoria, cap. 123, intituled "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the tenth year of Her present Majesty for the more speedy removal of certain nuisances, and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases," and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, directing that the provisions of the said Act be continued in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; We, the General Board of Health, are authorized to issue such directions and regulations as the said Board shall think fit for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases;

And whereas various parts and places within the Wolverhampton Union, appear to be affected by formidable epidemic or endemic disease;

We, the General Board of Health, do hereby, in further exercise of the power vested in us as aforesaid, issue the directions and regulations hereinafter contained, to extend to the Wolverhampton Union:

1. That three dispensaries be forthwith established within the Wolverhampton parish of the said union, with one duly qualified dispenser to each such dispensary, to distribute appropriate and suitable medicines to all who are attacked or threatened with cholera or any of its premonitory symptoms,

2. That the existing division of Wolverhampton into three medical districts be retained and continued.

3. That one night dispensary, conveniently situated, in the Wolverhampton parish, be forthwith established for the various affected districts, and to which all applications for aid and medicine during the night may be made; and that a sufficient number of qualified medical men, in such equal proportions as may be practicable from each of the three wards, attend each night in rotation and share the night duty among them.

4. That such a sufficient number of medical men be appointed for each of the three medical districts as will raise the whole number to four in each district; that is, twelve in all.

5. That a suitable cholera hospital be forthwith established, with an adequate number of proper attendants.

6. That three legally qualified medical men be appointed to carry out a regular system of house to house visitation, in the affected districts, and to devote their whole time to the duty, carrying medicines and all other requisites with them.

7. That three legally qualified medical men be forthwith appointed for the performance of the same duties in the Willenhall parish of the aforesaid union.

8. That suitable and sufficient hospital accommodation be provided (with nurses, &c.) for those who may be attacked with cholera in the said parish of Willenhall.

9. That two legally qualified medical men be forthwith appointed to carry out a regular system of house to house visitation, in the parish of Bilston, in the aforesaid union; and to devote their whole time thereto.

10. That suitable and sufficient hospital accommodation be forthwith prepared, with proper medical attendants, nurses, and other requisites, for the treatment of those who may be attacked by cholera, or by any of its premonitory symptoms.

11. That the medical Superintending Inspector, who has been appointed for the whole union, shall take charge of the medical visitation of the said union. That he shall make up the statistics of the disease, and locate the visitors in the localities most affected, and take such general charge of the preventive measures as may appear to him to be necessary.

12. That sufficient supplies of bedding be forthwith provided for the tents which have been sent down to the Wolverhampton Union.

13. That suitable notices, one for each of the affected districts of that union, be drawn up and printed, and be freely circulated from house to house, furnishing information and directions where requisite aid in medicines, &c. may be most readily and speedily procured.

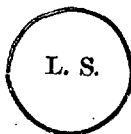

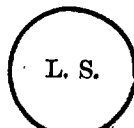

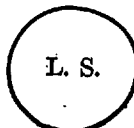

SCHOOL OF PHYSIC IN IRELAND.

PURSUANT to the fortieth George III., chap. 84, commonly called "The School of Physic Act," notice is hereby given, that the King's Professorship of the Practice of Medicine, on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dunn, in the city of Dublin, will become vacant on the 18th. of October next, and that, on Tuesday the 18th of December, at twelve o'clock at noon, the electors, appointed by and in virtue of said Act, will pro-

ceed to the election of a Professor of the Practice of Medicine, at the Provost's House, Trinity College, Dublin.
