Now We, the General Board of Health, do hereby revoke the said Order, in so far as to authorize the said Churchwardens to bury the three persons aforesaid in their family graves respectively; provided always, that in each case a quantity of chloride of lime, amounting to not less than twelve pounds' weight, be strewn beneath and above the coffin.



Whereas by the Act eleventh and twelfth Victoria, cap. 123, intituled "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the tenth year of Her present Majesty, for the more speedy removal of certain nuisances, and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases," and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, directing that the provisions of the said Act be continued in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; We, the General Board of Health, are authorized to issue such directions and regulations as the said Board shall think fit for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases;


And whereas various parts and places included in the parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth, appear to be affected by formidable epidemic or endemic disease:

We, the General Board of Health, do hereby order the execution of the directions and regulations hereinafter contained to extend to the said parish of Saint Mary, Lambeth; and we do hereby order and require you, the said Guardians, to carry into effect the said directions and regulations forthwith:

That five additional properly qualified medical

officers be immediately appointed, or (in case so many properly qualified medical men cannot be obtained) advanced medical students be selected, to devote their whole time to a regular house to house visitation of the affected districts of the aforesaid parish, and that they carry medicines with them and administer them on the spot to all who may be attacked by cholera or any of its premonitory symptoms.

Whereas by the Act twelfth and thirteenth Victoria, cap. 3, intituled "An Act to amend the Nuisances' Removal and Diseases' Prevention Act, 1848," it is provided, "That it shall be lawful in England or Wales for the General Board of Health to cause inquiry to be made by the superintending inspector, or by such other ways and means as the General Board of Health may deem fit to direct, into the state of the burial grounds in any part of England or Wales excepted from the powers of the Public Health Act, 1848, or in any populous city, town, or place in England or Wales, to which for the time being the said Act has not been applied, and if it appear to the General Board of Health that any such burial ground is in such a state as to be dangerous to the health of the persons living in the neighbourhood thereof, it shall be lawful for the said General Board of Health in England and Wales, under the seal of the said Board, and under the hands of two or more Members thereof, to issue such orders as the said Board may think fit for the application of such disinfecting substances, and for the adoption of such other measures of precaution in relation to the premises as may, in the opinion of the said Board, tend to lessen or remove the danger to health;"

We, the General Board of Health, being of opinion that in order to lessen or remove the danger to health at present arising from the said burial ground, it is expedient that interments should be discontinued therein for the present, do hereby order and require the aforesaid Churchwardens, and other persons having the care and control of the same, to cause the discontinuance of interments in the said burial ground until further order, and to make such provision for interment elsewhere as to them may appear necessary, under the tenth section of the Nuisances' Amendment Act aforesaid, or otherwise;

And we further order the said Churchwardens to spread over the entire surface of the said burial ground a quantity of chloride of lime, dissolved in water, in the proportion of not less than four ounces to the imperial gallon, and to the amount of not less than six gallons per week for four weeks from this date, to the surface of each grave,

or, in lieu of chloride of lime, to cover the entire surface of the said burial ground with quicklime to the thickness of not less than six inches.

3rd. That five dispensaries, situated in convenient parts of the said township, be opened, and continue open every day and every night; each dispensary to be provided with a person in constant attendance, capable of administering medicine to all necessitous applicants; and that one of the medical officers of each district shall, in rotation, attend during every night at the dispensary of his district, who shall attend to all calls throughout the district during the night.

4th. That a staff of thirteen medical officers be provided and located in the five medical relief districts, in such proportions as the necessities of each district may require, and who shall take the medical charge of all persons who may apply, or who may be referred to them within their respective districts; and that all necessitous cases be attended without a relieving officer's note.

5th. That nine medical visitors be appointed to make a daily visitation from house to house in the said districts, or some of them, according to the necessities of each, and that such visitors have with them a sufficient quantity of medicine for the treatment of cholera or its premonitory symptoms.

6th. That a house of refuge, with sixty beds, and suitable accommodations, be provided for the reception of persons whom it may be desirable to remove from infected localities.

7th. That an additional cholera hospital be provided in a convenient situation, with suitable accommodation, and a sufficient number of nurses.

8th. That a supply of nurses for attending on cholera patients, in their own houses, be provided.

9th. That a supply of blankets be provided at the dispensaries, to be lent out to the poor on the recommendation of the district medical officers or superintendents.

10th. That notices be printed and carefully distributed from house to house, throughout the districts, clearly detailing the arrangements made, and the places where application is to be made, in case of attack.

11th. That if the superintendents shall report to the Guardians that additional medical aid is necessary, the Board of Guardians shall immediately provide such additional aid, and the superintendents shall transmit copies of such reports to the General Board of Health.

And in further exercise of the powers vested in us by the said recited Act, We do hereby direct, authorize, and require you, the Guardians of the Poor of the said union, forthwith to provide in the

manner specified in the above directions and regulations, for the dispensing of medicines, and for affording to persons afflicted by or threatened with any epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, such medical aid as may be required; and by yourselves or your officers, or by any persons employed by you in the administration of the laws for the relief of the poor, or by officers specially appointed in that behalf, forthwith to superintend and to see to the execution of the above directions and regulations, and to do and provide all such acts, matters, and things, as may be necessary for executing the same.
