

2nd. That a dispensary, situated in a convenient part of the said union, be provided, to be open, and continue open, every day and every night; such dispensary to be provided with a person in constant attendance, capable of administering medicine to all necessitous applicants.

3rd. That a house of refuge, with beds and suitable accommodations, be provided for the reception of persons whom it may be desirable to remove from infected localities.

4th. That notices be printed and carefully distributed from house to house throughout the affected localities, clearly detailing the arrangements made for affording medical aid and assistance, and where application is to be made in case of attack.

And in further exercise of the powers vested in us by the said recited Act, We do hereby direct, authorize, and require you, the said Guardians of the Poor of the said union, forthwith to provide in the manner specified in the above directions and regulations, for the dispensing of medicines, and affording to persons afflicted by or threatened with any epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, such medical aid as may be required; and by yourselves or your officers, or by any persons employed by you in the administration of the laws for the relief of the poor, or by officers specially appointed in that behalf, forthwith to superintend and see to the execution of the above directions and regulations, and to do and provide all such acts, matters, and things, as may be necessary for executing the same.
