In common with all your Majesty's subjects, we have observed with admiration the virtues which adorned the character of that illustrious lady. Whether as the consort of a reigning monarch, or in her subsequent comparative retirement, her pure and exemplary life, her unceasing deeds of charity and munificence, her enlightened support of all that tended either to ameliorate the condition and to elevate the moral and religious character of the poor, or to improve society at large, combined to shed lustre over her exalted station.
