Zolkiew, Fanuary 6. HE Count de Schaftgotz, who hath for some time resided at this Courtas Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, parted from hence this Week for Moldavia and Valachia, having acquainted the King of Poland, that he had Orders from his Imperial Majesty, to sollicite those Princes to call off the Subjection hey are under to the Ottoman Port, and to join their Arms with those of the Emperor and his Allies. from the Cham of Tartary, though the Proposals he made on the part of the Turks are absolutely rejected, is still here, and, it's believed, he will not be sent back, till we have an account of the arrival of the Polish Ambassadors at Moscow, and of the Success they are like to have in their Negotiation there, according to which, it's probable, some Overtures may be made to the Tartars, to separate them from the Tarks. Several Persons who come from Persa, report, that that King having heard of the great Successes of the Christians against the Turks, had resolved likewise to make War upon them, and that his Forces began to march for that purpose towards Bagdet. The King continues in his Resolution to command his Army in Person the next Campagne, and has again affured the Pope's Nuncio, in an Audience he had of his Majesty this week. That he will be in the Field before the end of May.

Genoud, Jan. 19. The Devonshire, the Reserve, the Mary and Thomas, and the Samuel, are on their departure for Leghorne, and the Enston for Palerno. By a Vessel arrived in this Port from Toulon, we have advice, that several light Frigats are fitting out there, to cruise against the Pyiats of Sally. The Prince of Monaco parted from hence the 15th Instant in one of this States Gallies, to return home.

Venice, Fan. 26. Captain General Morosini has fent hither a great many Vessels which are to transport the Soldiers that arrive daily at the Lido, as well as Provisions to Corfou. The Duke of Hanouer has let the Senate know, that 2600 Men of his Troops are marching towards the place where they are to embark for the Morea, part of which are to recruit those he has already in the Service of this Republick. The Troops of the Milaneze are expected the next Month at the Lido, the Difficulties that remained about the execution of the Treaty concluded with the Count de Melgar, being wholly removed. The Landtgrave of Hesse-Cassell has, we are told, likewise promifed to affift the Republick with 2000 Men; And with these Succors, and the Troops now raising by this State, we are assured the Republick will have the next Compagne an Army of 30000 fighting Men. The Captain General Morofini has formed a Regiment of Maynotes, which is composed of 24 Companies, 100 Men in each, of which he has

made Signior Paelo Maeri Colonel. They write from Cattare, that the Heydukes and Morlaques continue their Incursions into the Ottoman Territories, from whence they return for the most part laden with Plunder. We have received Letter? from Coron, which give a more particular Account than we had before of the Action that lately hap-pened in their Neighborhood. They tell us, that the Turks having drawn together to the number of 4000 Men, polted themselves not far from Coron, with an intention to attack that place, of which the Governor Signior Grioti having given notice to Signior Molino, who was Cruiling in those Seas with the Ships under his Command, he sailed towards Calamata, and took on Board his Ships 800 Men of that Garifon, and a confiderable number of Grecians and Maynotes, who very readily offered their Service in this occasion, which he afterwards landed again near Coron, with 600 Men drawn out of his Ships, with rhese joined 1500 of the Garison of Coron; The Turks in the mean time made feveral Retrenchments to secure their Camp, but were of able to defend them when attacked by the Cristians who in a short time made themselves Masters of those Works, and then engaging the Enomies Horse, entirely routed them, above 500 of the Turks were killed upon the place, as many wer taken Prisoners, and the rest fled in great confusion, leaving their Baggage, and a great quantity of Arms and Provisions in the hands of the Christians.

Vienna, Jan. 24. The Emperor has appointed Commissioners to treat with the Envoys from Transilvania, who, we are told, offer a Sum of Money to free that Country from Winter-quar-ters; but it is still believed, that this is not the onely Bufine's they are fent hither upon. General Caraffa has intercepted a Letter from Count Teckeley, written with his own hand, to his Wife the Princess Rugotzi, in which he acquaints her, that he was reliored to his Liberty, and should return very suddenly, but this is lookt upon as a politick Contrivance of the Turks, who, it's believed, obliged Teckeley to write this Letter, and then ordered it so, that it should fall into the hands of the Imperialifts, thereby to dispose this Court to accept of their Proposals of Peace. An Express arrived here this week from Berlin, with a List of the Troops his Electoral Highness intends to send to the Emperor's affiftance, in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between them, which will be commanded by General Schoning, and will begin their march the first of April; But we do not hear that the Treaty with the Elector of Saxony for 6000 Men is yet concluded. The Count de Herberstein, who is to command the Gallies of Malta the next Summer against the Turks, embarked the 6th Instant at Zeng; And the Count de Strosoldo is made Governor of Carelstade during his absence.

Vienna, Fan. 27. The 22d Instant arrived here! an Express from Caschaw, with the News (which was brought thither by some Hungarian Gentlemen that came from Zolnocke) of the Defeat of 3000 Turks, who, it was said, were marching with a great Convoy towards Buda, by the Imperial and Hungarian Troops, commanded by Major General Heuster, of which we have already told you the Particulars, as they were related by the faid Express; But the Letters we have fince received from Zolnocke, discover the mistake of that Advice, and inform us, That General Heuster and Count Peterbasi had indeed been abroad with 4000 Horse, but that it was only to put some of the Turkish Territories under Contribution; And that having done it, they advanced to Segedin on the River Their, and after having defeated part of the Garison, who sallied out upon them, plunder'd and burnt the Suburbs, and then returned with a The Envoys from confiderable Booty to Zolnocke. Transilvania have had their Publick Audience of the Emperor, with the Ceremonics that are obferved towards the Ministers of Princes which hold of the Emperor. General Caprara has sent to his Imperial Majesty the stately Furniture for a Horse, befor with Pearls and precious Stones and the Sable, and Staff or Scepter of Mailive Gold, likewife enriched with Diamonds, which the Visier of Buda presented, by Order of the Grand Signior, to Count Teckeley, upon his entring into his Engagement with the Turks, and confirming the same by Oath at Buda in the year 1682; These were found among other Riches belonging to Teckeley, and the principal Hungarians that joined with him in the Rebellion at a place called Regetz, which the Imperialiffs made themselves Masters of presently after the taking of Cafebaw.

Hamburgh, Jan. 29. The Letters from Copen bagen of the 26 Instant tell us, that the King of Denmark intends to begin his Journey for Hollein towards the end of March; And that in the mean time the Troops that are to attend his Maj.fly there, are ordered to be in a readiness for their march. They write from Stockholme, that the King of Sueden would part from thence the 18th of this Month, to take a general review of his For-And that the Count de Nostitz Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, had frequent Conferences with the Ministers of that Court. Letters from Berlin inform us, that the Elector of Brandenburgh is sending a Minister to Vienna, to adjust all matters concerning the march of the Troops he is to assist the Emperor with, which his Electoral Highness is to maintain for fix Months at his own charge, in confideration whereof he is to receive from his Imperial Majesty 150000 Crowns before they begin their march.

Bruffels, Febr. 5. On Saturday last our Gover-nor General made his Publick Entry into this City, with all the Solemnity usual on the like occasions. His Excellency has, we are told, resolved to recruit all the Regiments of Foot in the Service of these Provinces, and to make them 800 Men each, fo foon as he receives the Supplies he expects from The Prince de Savoy is preparing to return to his Command in Hungary; He will begin his Journey the next week, which he intends to take by the way of Moland. They write from Maefiricht of the 2d Instant, that a French Party, composed of about 20 Men, had possessed themselves of the Castle of Walkrade, not far from Erkelens, on pretence that it is a Fief of Luxemburgh. Letters from Madrid of the 10th past inform us, that the King hath declared Don Diego Espinosa, at prosent Governor of Gaunt, Maistre de Camp General of his Forces in these Countries.

Bruffels, Febr. 8. The Letters from Vienne of the 24th past told us, They had Advice by an Express which arrived there the day before from Caschew, that the Imperialists had descated a Turkijh Convoy-near Segeain, and had afterwards made themselves Malters of that place; but this News is contradicted by the Letters of the 27th, which give the following Account; That Lieutenant General de Mercy, and Major General Heufler, had made an incursion with 4000 imperial and Hungarian Horse into the Enemies Countrey to raise Concributions, and that advancing under the Cannon of Segedin, part of the Garison sallied out, and skirmilhed with them, but that several of the Turks being killed, and some Prisoners taken, the rest retreated into the Town; The Christians thereupon entered the Suburbs, which they plundered, and afterwards burnt. The Enemy had there a Magazine of Forage and Provisions, as well for the service of the Garison, as the Troops that frequently passed and repassed that way from Buda, Agria, Hatwan, and other Turkish places on that fide, of which the Imperialists carried away what they could, and destroyed the rest, returning to

Zolnocke with very little loss on their side.

Paru, Febr. 13. The Prince de Tingry, Son to the Duke of Luxemburgh, was married on Monday last to Madamoiscile de Chevreuse. The Government of Tripoli have confirmed the Peace which the Mareschal d'Estrée lately concluded with them. We have an account from Vienna, that the Count de la Vauguyon, Envoy Extraordinary from his most Christian Majesty, was arrived there, and had

had Audience of the Emperor.
