Port of St. Ives.—Legal Quay.

We the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the following place, within the port of St. Ives, to be a legal quay for the lading and unloading of goods; and we do hereby declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as follow; that is to say: all that open place, quay, or wharf, at the harbour of St. Ives, in the county of Cornwall, being in length from north to south four hundred feet (including the space occupied by the lighthouse), and on the sea-side four hundred and six feet, and in breadth, at the widest or south-south-west end, fifty-eight feet, and at the narrowest or north end, thirty-five feet, being the property of the trustees of the borough of St. Ives, and now in the occupation of the said trustees. And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby annul all former legal quays already set out and appointed within the said port of St. Ives.
