To Her Most Excellent Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, the inhabitants of your Majesty's ancient borough and town of Alnmouth, in the chapelry of Alnmouth, in the parish of Lesbury, in the county of Northumberland, in public meeting assembled, on the 28th day of August 1850, and in the fourteenth year of your Majesty's happy reign, cannot omit the present opportunity, when your Majesty, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, and your Majesty's Royal Family are passing through this parish, for the first time, to your Majesty's palace of Holyrood, of declaring to your Majesty our most devoted attachment to your Majesty's person and Government, and of loyalty to your Majesty, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, Albert Prince of Wales, and all branches of your Majesty's Royal Family.

It is our earnest prayer that your Majesty may, by the mercy of Divine Providence, ever watching over us, be spared for a long and glorious reign, to preside as Queen over a truly pious and loyal people; that the policy hitherto pursued by your Majesty may be the foundation of that peace and concord among the nations of the world, that in all time to come the inhabitants not only of these realms, but of the world itself, may look back upon your Majesty's long and peaceful reign as glorious, chiefly in the development of arts and sciences, and in promoting the comfort and happiness of the people; that War, or even rumours of War, may never again be heard among us, but that your Majesty's reign may be truly designated as the days of good Queen Victoria.
