The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in the words following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Headington, in the county and diocese of Oxford, and also of the adjoining extra-parochial place called Shotover, in the same county and diocese, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, situate at Headington Quarry, in the said parish of Headington, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such particular

district should comprise a portion of the said parish of Headington, and also portions of the said extra-parochial place called Shotover, and should be called 'The District Chapelry of Headington Quarry,' with boundaries, as hereinafter mentioned:

"The boundary of the district chapelry of Headington Quarry commences at the north-western corner of the allotment marked No. 1 on the Award Inclosure Map of the parish of Headington, and proceeds easterly along the boundary line separating the said parish of Headington from the parish of Saint Clement, Oxford, on the north side of such allotment, and of the Warneford Lunatic Asylum, as far as the public road called China-lane, along the middle of which said China-lane it proceeds south-easterly as far as Windmill-lane, and then proceeds northerly up the middle of Windmill-lane, as far as the north-west corner of the allotment marked No. 30 on the said Headington Award Map, and then proceeds easterly along the northern boundary thereof to its north-eastern corner, from which point the boundary proceeds in a straight line north-easterly across allotments marked No. 36, 37, and 38, on the said award map, to the north-eastern corner of allotment No. 38, when it enters the turnpike-road leading from Stokenchurch to Oxford, and then proceeds along the middle of that road in an easterly direction as far as the north-eastern corner of the first allotment awarded under the Shotover-hill or Quarry-coppice Inclosure Act to T— Schutz, Esquire, for tithes; the boundary then proceeds southerly by the eastern boundary of the said Shotover-hill or Quarry-coppice, to the before-mentioned public-road called China-lane, at or near the South-western corner of the fourth allotment awarded to Thomas Hewlett, under the said Shotover-hill or Quarry-coppice Inclosure Act, along the middle of which said China-lane it proceeds north-westerly as far as the point at which the boundary of the said Shotover-hill or Quarry-coppice leaves the said lane on the south-western side thereof; it then proceeds in a like north-westerly direction by the south-western boundary of the said Shotover-hill or Quarry-coppice to Riding's-lane, along the middle of which last-mentioned lane it proceeds southerly as far as the parish of Horsepath, and then proceeds westerly along the boundary line separating the parish of Horsepath from a certain extra-parochial plot of common land called Open Brasenose, as far as Bullingdon-green; it then proceeds northerly up the eastern sides of Bullingdon-green and the

hundred acres to the north-eastern corner thereof; it then proceeds north-westerly, south-westerly, and southerly along the north-eastern, north-western and western sides of the said hundred acres, as far as the north-eastern corner of Bullingdon-green, and then south-westerly along the northern side of the said green as far as Lye-hill; the boundary then proceeds northerly up the eastern side of Lye-hill, and westerly along the boundary separating the northern side of the said Lye-hill from the southern side of the before-mentioned allotment, No. 1, on the Headington Award Map; and then proceeds along the boundary of the said allotment, No. 1, in a northerly, easterly, north-easterly, westerly, and northerly direction (and which said last-mentioned boundary divides, or is supposed to divide, the parish of Headington from the adjoining parishes and extra-parochial places) as far as the point where the boundary commenced, and as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink and green:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized and performed in the said church at Headington Quarry aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should belong and be paid to the incumbent thereof for the time being:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned: in testimony whereof the said Samuel Bishop of Oxford has signed and sealed this representation:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Oxford.
