THE Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland do hereby give

notice, that, on Thursday the 19th instant, at one o'clock, they will be ready to treat with such persons as may be willing to contract for supplying and delivering into Her Majesty's Victualling Stores, at Deptford, the undermentioned articles; viz.:

Tea (Congou), 50,000 lbs.; half to be delivered in a month, and the remainder in two months.

Sugar (the produce of the British Possessions), 100 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards.

Soap (Mottled), 50 tons; half to be delivered in three weeks, and the remainder in three weeks afterwards.

Peas, 500 quarters; half to be delivered in a fortnight, and the remainder in a fortnight afterwards.

No tender will be received after one o'clock on the day of treaty, nor any noticed unless the party attends, or an agent for him duly authorized in writing.
