

Masters of the said Court, to take an account of the debts and liabilities affecting the personal estate of the said Anne Ange Josephine Barnard. The said Ann Ange Josephine Barnard came from India, to reside in England, in or about the year 1806, and on the 9th day of January 1806 was resident in Great Russell-street, Bloomsbury, in the county of Middlesex, and on the 28th day of March 1808 was resident in Duke-street, Grosvenor-square aforesaid, and on the 9th day of April 1827 was resident at No. 4, Grafton-street, Tottenham-court-road, in the same county, where she continued to reside until the latter part of the year 1829 or the beginning of the year 1830, when she went to reside in the said city of Paris, and was resident previous to and on the 11th day of October 1837, and thenceforward up to the time of her death, which happened on the 14th day of May 1846, at No. 44, in the street called Rue Basse du Rampant, in the said city of Paris.

**W**HEREAS by an Order of the High Court of Chancery made in a cause Harrison against The Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the town of Southampton and others, it is ordered that it should be referred to Richard Richards, Esq. one of the Masters of the said Court, to enquire and state to the Court, who, at the time of the death of Henry Robinson Hartley, the testator in the pleadings of this cause named, was the heir at law of the said testator, and who is now such heir at law, and also to enquire who at the time of the death of the said testator, was or were his, the said testator's, next of kin, according to the statute made for the distribution of intestate's effects, and whether such next of kin, or any and which of them, have since died, and if so, who is or are his, her, or their legal personal representative or legal personal representatives, all persons claiming to be such heir at law or such next of kin, and also the legal personal representative or representatives of such of them (if any) as have since died, are, on or before the 26th day of June 1851, by their Solicitors, to come in and make out their claims and prove their heirship and kindred, before the said Richard Richards, Esq. at his chambers, in Southampton-buildings, Chancery-lane, London, or in default thereof such next of kin and representatives will be peremptorily excluded the benefit of the said Order.

The above-named testator, Henry Robinson Hartley, Esq. formerly resided in Southampton, and at Newington, in the county of Surrey, and at the time of his death, which happened on or about the 24th day of May 1850, he was residing at Calais, in France. His father was Henry Hartley, who it is believed came from Lancashire, and his mother's maiden names were Susannah Lavender, and it is believed she came from some place in Dorsetshire.

The above-named Raymond John Long was a Lieutenant in Her Majesty's 1st Regiment of Dragoons, and on the 2nd August 1839, exchanged into the 25th Regiment of Infantry, and was for some time quartered at Cork; he sold his commission in this regiment in the month of November 1839, and went to reside at Port Adelaide, in Australia, about the month of March 1840, where he died shortly after his arrival.
