THE following Regulations are to be observed in relation to the construction of the vessels to be moored at the places appointed under the provisions of an Act of the 14 and 15 Queen Victoria, chap. 67, sect. 6, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of an Act of the 12th year of King George the Third, relating to the making and carriage of gunpowder as exempt therefrom certain gunpowder magazines and stores, near Liverpool, and to make certain temporary provisions with regard to the said magazines and stores." Any person failing to observe these Regulations will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punished accordingly:

1. That no iron be employed in the construction of any part of the vessel.
2. That wing passages are to be constructed between the sides of the vessel and the magazine for powder.
3. That the door or doors into the magazine shall in no case be opposite to a scuttle or door-way through ship's side or gangway.
4. That the ladder-way from the deck be protected by a close bulk-head on each side.
5. That every vessel be fitted with a lightning conductor, on the plan of Sir Snow Harris; and that the mast or spar in which the conductor is fitted shall be in height above the deck at least two-thirds of the length of the vessel from stem to stern.
6. That no bull-eyes or convex or plano-convex glasses be used in the decks, scuttles, or any part of the vessel.
7. That all glass used in the scuttles through the ship's side, ports, &c. shall be plate glass, not ground, of not less than half inch in thickness; and copper wire gauze to be used in the scuttles for the admission of air.
8. Means on deck are also to be provided for the admission of water through the bottom of the vessel, through two or more circular apertures of not less than one foot in diameter, on either side of the keel.
9. The quantity of powder to be deposited at any one time in such vessels is limited by the Master-General to 10,000 barrels, of 100 pounds each.

When the magazines or vessels are constructed, Regulations will be issued for the mode of storing, safe keeping, and receiving and delivering gunpowder to and from the vessels.

Spanish Financial Commission.

HER Catholic Majesty's Finance Minister, under the date of the 16th instant, has communicated to the undersigned, the following Royal Decree:

"Taking into consideration the reasons submitted to us by our Minister of Finance, President of the Council, and in conformity with the opinion of the said Council, We have decreed as follows:

"Article 1st. At the time of announcing the payment of the dividend of the Spanish Inscriptions at 5 per cent. due on the 8th of March next, it shall be advertised also by the Spanish Financial Commission in London that when the payment of the following dividend takes place, the said Commission will take up and cancel, in the name of the Government, the above-stated inscriptions, paying to the holders their respective amounts at the rate of 60 per cent. of their nominal capital, in conformity with the Convention of the 28th January 1828.

"Article 2nd. Our Finance Minister will propose to us the means and resources necessary to carry this operation into effect, taking at the same time the proper measures for the execution of the present Decree.

"Given at our Palace, this 16th day of February 1852. Signed by the Royal hand.—The Minister of Finance, Juan Bravo Murillo;"
