The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on the *Monday previous* to the Levee on the 24th of March instant, *before twelve o'clock*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

THIS day the Right Honourable Orlando George Charles Bridgeman (commonly called Viscount Newport) and the Right Honourable Sir John Trollope, Bart. were, by Her Majesty's command, sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

AT the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the district of Christ Church, in Saint Pancras, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapel or chapelry, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it shall be lawful, by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel, in use for the purposes of divine worship; and to fix and declare the name of such district; and it is by the same Act provided, that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district shall be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapel or district out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken; in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, may have an opportunity of offering, or making to us, or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme shall not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next

after such copy shall have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons shall, in the meantime, consent to the same; and it is by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we shall recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, shall be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same shall be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as thereafter provided:

"And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation aggregate or sole; or to either of the universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively; or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as shall be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas the said district of Christ Church, in Saint Pancras, is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of such district hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel, in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas a sum of Three Pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, sufficient to produce the annual sum of two hundred pounds, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our names in the books of the governor and company of the Bank of England, by the Reverend Edward Stuart, of Munster-square, Regent's Park, in the said county of Middlesex, towards the permanent endowment of the minister of the district herein recommended to be constituted, and, so soon as such district shall have become a new parish, of the perpetual curate thereof; and it is also the intention of the said Edward Stuart to provide a church or chapel for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants of such district or new parish; and it has been proposed to us by the said Edward Stuart, that the patronage of such district or new parish shall be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of London, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that all that part of the said district of Christ Church, in Saint Pancras, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof,

is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly; and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary Magdalene, in Saint Pancras.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that the minister of the district so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the said Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, the perpetual curate thereof shall be permanently endowed in the manner following; that is to say, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, to such minister or perpetual curate, as the case may be, when duly licensed according to the said Act, the sum of two hundred pounds; and that the first such half-yearly payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of such perpetual curate as aforesaid, as the case may be.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the patronage of the said district or new parish, as the case may be, of Saint Mary Magdalene, in Saint Pancras, and the right of nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall, for the first three nominations, be assigned to and shall and may be exercised by the said Edward Stuart, his executors, administrators, and assigns, and that after such first three nominations, the patronage of the said district or new parish, and the right of collation of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall be permanently assigned to and vested in the Bishop of London for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" SCHEDULE.

"The District of Saint Mary Magdalene, in Saint Pancras, being,—

"All that part of the district of Christ Church, in Saint Pancras, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate on the southern side of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked *a* on the map or plan hereunto annexed), on the eastern boundary of the said district, and opposite to the middle of William-street; and thence proceeding westward along the middle of such street as far as the middle of Albany-street; and thence northward along the middle of such last-mentioned street to a point (marked *b* as aforesaid), opposite to the middle of the street or road through Cambridge-place; and thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned street or road, and continuing in the same direction till it meets the western boundary of the said district."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has been given, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, and no objections have been made thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law imme-

diately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," or under and by virtue of any and every other power and authority vested in the said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Thorpe, which is situate partly in the county of Norfolk and partly in the county of the city of Norwich, and in the diocese of Norwich, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Matthew, situate in the hamlet of Thorpe, in the said parish of Thorpe, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power and authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Thorpe,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: on the south-east and east by the boundary line that divides the hamlet from the parish of Thorpe; on the north-east by the parish of Sprowston; on the north and north-west by the boundary line of the hamlet of Pockthorpe; and on the west and south by the river Wensum, as such district chapelry is more

particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Matthew; that two-thirds of the fees to accrue therefrom should be reserved for, on account of, and paid over to the Reverend James Maxwell, Master of Arts, Rector or Incumbent of the parish church of the parish of Thorpe, during his incumbency thereof, and that after the next avoidance of such parish church, the said two-thirds of the said fees should belong to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said church of Saint Matthew, and that the remaining one-third of the said fees should forthwith belong to such last-mentioned minister or incumbent, and his successors :

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich, has been obtained thereto as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Norwich.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the "Church Building Acts," or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in the said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that they did, on the twenty-third day of August one thousand eight hundred and

fifty-one, represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Treeton, in the West Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of York, it appeared to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of the Sacred and Undivided Trinity, situate at Ulley, in the said parish of Treeton, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of the reign of your Majesty, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical district to churches or chapels, augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in that behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should consist of the townships of Ulley and Brampton-en-le-Morthen, and should be called 'The District Chapelry of Ulley,' with boundaries as thereafter mentioned; that is to say: on the south and west by the parish of Aston, on the north by a stream which separates the said district chapelry from the respective parishes of Whiston, Rotherham, and Wickersley, and on the east by the parish of Laughton-en-le-Morthen, as such district chapelry was more particularly delineated on the map or plan thereunto annexed, and was thereon coloured pink; and that your Majesty's said Commissioners further represented to your Majesty that it also appeared to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Ulley; and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being :

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thoms, Archbishop of York, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he had signed and sealed that instrument:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly prayed, that your Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereof as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom should seem meet:

"That your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Majesty's Privy Council, by your Majesty's Order in Council, dated the twenty-fifth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, to order that the proposed assignment should be accordingly made and effected, which was accordingly done and notified, registered and enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts:

"That your Majesty's said Commissioners have, since the said representation so made as aforesaid, discovered that the township of Ulley (the whole of which was included in the said district chapelry) is not confined to the parish of Treeton, but extends to and comprises a part of the parish of Aston, in the said county and diocese of York, and that instead of a district chapelry being assigned to the said church of Ulley, a consolidated chapelry should have been formed for it, under the powers contained in the ninth section of the Act of Parliament hereinafter mentioned:

"That, by reason of the premises, your Majesty's said Order in Council for the assignment of the said district is, it is apprehended, invalid:

"That your Majesty's said Commissioners, having taken into consideration all the circumstances relating to the said church of Ulley, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes of Treeton and Aston (comprising the said townships of Ulley and Brampton-en-le-Morthen), and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the said church at Ulley, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intitled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under or by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts; and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Ulley,' and that the boundaries thereof should be the same in all respects as are hereinbefore set forth, and which are more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink and green.

"That the consents of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, of the Most Noble Henry Charles, Duke of Norfolk (Patron of the parish church of the said parish of Treeton), and of the Most Noble Francis Godolphin D'Arcy, Duke of Leeds (Patron of the parish church of the said parish of Aston), have been severally obtained to the formation of the said proposed consolidated chapelry of Ulley as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, Henry Charles, Duke of Norfolk, and Francis Godolphin D'Arcy, Duke of Leeds, have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Henry Charles, Duke of Norfolk, and Francis Godolphin D'Arcy, Duke of Leeds, as such respective Patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned), and also of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Ulley, should belong to, be vested in, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the Right Honourable Sir Charles Wood, of Hickleton Hall, in the West Riding of the county of York, Baronet, his heirs and assigns, in consideration of the said Sir Charles Wood having erected such church at his own cost, and also of his intending to endow the same.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the representation hereby made into your royal consideration, and to revoke your Majesty's said Order in Council so made as aforesaid, and to make such Order for the formation of the said consolidated chapelry according to the boundaries aforesaid, agreeably to the provisions of the said last mentioned Act, and also for vesting in the said Sir Charles Wood, his heirs, and assigns, the perpetual patronage of the said church at Ulley aforesaid, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said represen-

tation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said Order of Her Majesty in Council of the twenty-fifth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, assigning a district chapelry to Trinity Church at Ulley, be, and the same is hereby revoked; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Ulley, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith enrolled, pursuant to the said Acts, and registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.
