"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend an Act for making better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for altering the bounds of the district of Treleigh, in the county of Cornwall, and diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it is by the herein secondly-recited Act enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority provided in the herein first-recited Act, at any time or times within twelve months after the date of the license of the minister first licensed to any separate district constituted under the provisions of the same Act, to alter the bounds of such district, although any alteration be not required with a view to the constituting of another separate district: Provided always, that the scheme for making any such alteration shall be subject to all the provisions relating to schemes for constituting separate districts under the said first-recited Act:

"And whereas it is by the herein thirdly-recited Act enacted, that the powers and authority relating to the alteration of the boundaries of districts contained in the said secondly-recited Act may, as to any such district now existing, notwithstanding the limitation in the same Act contained, be exercised at any time within five years from the passing of the said thirdly-recited Act:

"And whereas the said district of Treleigh was duly constituted out of the parish of Redruth, in the said county and diocese, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, by a scheme prepared by us, and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and duly gazetted:

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and appears to us to be expedient, that the bounds of such district should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that the boundaries of the said district of Treleigh shall hereafter be altered and extended so as to include

all that part of the said parish of Redruth, situate on the south of the existing district of Treleigh, and bounded on the south, south-east, south-west, and west by an imaginary line extending from Basset-road towards the south-west, along the middle of the great road from Redruth to Truro, as far as Drump-lane; and thence along the middle of such lane, into the great road leading from Redruth to Saint Ann's, and along the middle of such road, towards the north, to Treleigh Gate; and thence westward along the middle of such lane, and of Pond-lane, to the great road from Redruth to Portreath; and thence towards the north-west along the middle of such road as far as the original southern boundary of the said district; all of which is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto annexed, and shall be added to, and included in, and shall form part of the said district of Treleigh.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the said district, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has been given in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, and no objections have been made thereto:

'to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the subdean of the cathedral church of York, for the property belonging to him as such subdean.

"Whereas, by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the dignity or office of subdean in the cathedral church of York, will (excepting any right of patronage), upon the first avoidance of such dignity or office become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the hand of any dignitary or officer of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such dignitary or officer, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Walter Levett, the present subdean of the said cathedral church of York, that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement

should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the said Walter Levett, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of patronage) now belonging to the said Walter Levett as subdean of the said cathedral church as aforesaid, which said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, or the chief part thereof, are alleged by him to be granted and demised by and under the several leases mentioned in the schedule hereunto annexed, shall, together with all his estate, right, title, and interest therein (except as aforesaid) be, and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from him the said Walter Levett to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said Walter Levett, the sum of four thousand pounds, provided that no renewal of any or either of the said leases, nor any new lease, of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments respectively, or of any part thereof, shall have been or shall be granted or made by the said Walter Levett subsequently to the respective dates mentioned in the said schedule.

"And we farther recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of North Bradley, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate at Road Hill, in the said parish of North Bradley, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes;' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Road Hill,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary of the said district chapelry follows a line drawn up the centre of Chancefield's-road from a point at the south end thereof, at its junction with Poplar-lane, and proceeds up the middle of such road to the north end thereof, where it enters the road called Hogginton-road, up the middle of which latter road it then proceeds in a westerly direction to the turnpike-road leading from Frome and Beckington to Bradford, and continuing northward, along the middle of such turnpike-road, as far as the boundary of North Bradley parish against the parish of Wingfield; the district chapelry is then bounded on the north by the said parish of Wingfield; on the west by the parishes of Tellisford and Road; and on the south by other part of the said parish of Road; which said district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured buff:

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the incumbent thereof for the time being:

"That the consent of the Right Reverend

Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the respective parishes of Lyth, Whitby, and Pickering, in the North Riding of the county of York, and in the diocese of York, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Matthew, situate at Grosmont, in the township of Egton, in the said parish of Lyth, under and by virtue of the power for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should comprize certain portions (all lying contiguous to each other) of the following places; that is to say, of the hamlet of Newbeggin and the township of Egton, both in the said parish of Lyth; of the township of Eskdaleside or Sleights,

in the said parish of Whitby; and of the township of Godeland, in the said parish of Pickering; and further that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Grosmont,' with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned:

"The boundaries of the consolidated chapelry of Grosmont commence on the north bank of the river Esk, where Hilda's Beck, which there divides the said parish of Lyth from the said parish of Whitby, falls into the same, and pursue the course of such beck in a northerly direction as far as the high road leading from the village of Aislaby to the village of Egton, and then follow such high road in a westerly direction to the point where a certain beck, called Pithill Beck, crosses the same road from north to south, running down a hollow, called Greendale, towards the river Esk, and then follow the course of the said Pithill Beck in a southerly direction as far as a certain bridge, called Cat Scar Bridge, and from thence in a south-westerly direction to a certain hill, called Friar Hill, then proceed in a westerly direction along the northern boundaries of Grosmont Hags and Beck Side Farms as far as a certain beck, called Far Carr Beck, which there divides the estate of Robert Cary Elwes, Esquire, from the estate of Richard Smith, Esquire, then follow the course of such beck till it falls into the river Esk, from thence up the midstream of the said river Esk westerly to where a certain beck, called Blue Beck, falls into such river from the south, and ascending the course of such beck southerly to the point where the high road from Grosmont to Egton Bridge is joined by the high road from Egton to Pickering, and thence along such last mentioned road in a southerly direction to the place where a certain beck, called Buby Beck, crosses the said road, then follow the course of such beck in a south-easterly direction till it falls into the Mirk Esk river, thence up the midstream of the said Mirk Esk river (which there divides the said parish of Lyth from the said parish of Pickering) to a point opposite the high road to Sill Hows, in the said parish of Pickering, and leading from the foot of the inclined plane on the line of the Whitby and Pickering Railway, from thence along the said Sill Hows road in a north-easterly direction past Beck Hole, in the said parish of Pickering, as far as a place called Green End, from thence, in nearly the same direction, along the south-east or outside line of boundary of the old enclosed lands, in the said township of Godeland, to their extremity at a beck called Lythe Beck, which there divides the said parish of Pickering from the said parish of Whitby, then crosses such beck into the said parish of Whitby, and passes along in nearly the same direction along the outside boundary of the old enclosed lands at Fairhead, in the said township of Eskdaleside, to a beck called Holey Gill Beck, then follow the course of such beck northerly till it falls into the river Esk, from thence down the midstream of the said river Esk easterly (which there divides the said parish of Whitby from the said parish of Lyth) to its junction with Hilda's Beck, where the boundaries of the said consolidated chapelry of Grosmont commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured red, yellow, and blue.

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thomas, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, and also patron, in right of his see, of the parish churches of the said parishes of Lyth and Whitby, of the Very Reverend William Cockburn, Doctor in Divinity, Dean of

the cathedral church of Saint Peter, York, and patron, in right of his deanery, of the parish church of the said parish of Pickering, have been respectively obtained to the proposed formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Grosmont, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, and William Cockburn have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty that it has been mutually agreed between the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, and William Cockburn, as such respective patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned), and of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Matthew at Grosmont should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, and his successors, archbishops of York, for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Matthew, at Grosmont, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a report from the General Board of Health, dated the twenty-fourth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"We, the General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1848, have, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Havant, in the county of Southampton (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole), directed Robert Rawlinson, a superintending inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make public inquiry, and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the

inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, or other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said superintending inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

That at the first election of the said Local Board, the Reverend Thomas Goodwin Hatchard, Rector of Havant aforesaid, should have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the Chairman of the Local Board of Health by the Public Health Act, 1848, in relation to the election by owners of property and rate-payers, and should perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election; and in case the said Thomas Goodwin Hatchard, from illness or other sufficient cause, should be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then that William Snelling, Gentleman, of Havant aforesaid, should exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.
