The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the episcopal income of the Bishop of Ripon.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon hath, with a view to the regulation of his episcopal income, according to the provisions of the said Act, entered into an agree-

ment with us, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"Agreement made this eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, between the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the one part, and the Right Reverend Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, of the other part.

"Whereas by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," after reciting that Her Majesty had issued a Commission to certain persons therein named to inquire, amongst other things, whether any and what improvement could be made in the existing law and practice relating to the incomes of archbishops and bishops, so as to secure to them respectively fixed instead of fluctuating annual incomes, and that it was expedient that until the said Commissioners should have made their report and Parliament should have determined upon some permanent mode of effecting the object last aforesaid, temporary arrangements should be made for that purpose; it was enacted that, notwithstanding the provisions of the therein first-recited Act, and any Order or Orders of Her Majesty in Council founded thereon relating to or providing for the payment to or by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of fixed annual sums, it should be lawful, by the authority and in the manner by and in which the arrangements for carrying into effect the recommendations in the said Act recited might then be made (that is to say, by a scheme of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, confirmed and ratified by an Order of Her Majesty in Council), so to regulate from time to time the amounts, times, modes and conditions of payments to be made to or by the said Commissioners as the case might be, by or to any archbishop or bishop who should have succeeded to a see upon any avoidance thereof happening after the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, or any other archbishop or bishop who might signify his willingness to accept such annual income as thereafter mentioned in lieu of his present income, as to secure to every such archbishop or bishop the annual income named for the archbishop or bishop of his see, in the same or any other Act then in force, or in any Order of Her Majesty in Council duly made and published, and no more:

“ And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-second day of December one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and duly published in the London Gazette, it was provided that the average annual income of the Bishop of Ripon for the time being should be four thousand five hundred pounds; and that, in order to make up the income of the said Charles Thomas, who was then and is now bishop of the said see, to that amount, there should be paid to him by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, the annual sum of two thousand two hundred pounds, by equal half yearly payments in every year :

“ And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and duly published as aforesaid, it was provided that, in consideration of the transfer to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments therein described and referred to, with all the right, title, and interest of the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, in the same, there should be paid to him by the said Commissioners the further fixed annual sum of five hundred pounds by like equal half yearly payments :

“ And whereas the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, hath signified his willingness, in accordance with the provisions of the said herein-recited Act, to accept, as from the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, the said annual income or yearly sum of four thousand five hundred pounds and no more, in lieu of the present and future income arising from his said see, or receivable by him under the provisions of the said recited Orders in Council, or either of them, or any other ecclesiastical profits or emoluments of any kind or description whatsoever, received or enjoyed by him, and to enter into an agreement with the said Commissioners for regulating the income to be received by him as from the said first day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, in manner hereinafter mentioned :

“ Now, it is hereby agreed by and between the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, as follows; that is to say :

“ 1. That the said bishop shall forthwith deliver to the said Commissioners, in such form as they shall direct, a correct account in writing, certified under his hand, of all monies actually received by him, whether consisting of arrears or otherwise, accrued due since the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in respect of the revenues of his see, or of such other ecclesiastical profits or emoluments as aforesaid, during the half year ending on the thirtieth day of June now last past, and also of all monies remaining unpaid in respect of the said see, or of any such other profits or emoluments as aforesaid, on account of such arrears as aforesaid, or otherwise at the date of such account. And that the said bishop shall henceforth, half yearly, on the twenty-ninth day of September, and the twenty-fifth day of March, in every year, deliver a like account in writing, certified as aforesaid, of all monies actually received by him, whether consisting of arrears or otherwise, accrued due since the said thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in respect of the revenues of his see, or of such other ecclesiastical profits or emoluments as aforesaid, during the half year ending on the thirtieth day of June, or the thirty-first day of December, as the case may be,

then last past, and also of all monies remaining unpaid in respect of the said see, or of any such other profits or emoluments as aforesaid, on account of such arrears as aforesaid, or otherwise at the date of such account; and in such account to be forthwith delivered, and in every such future half yearly account, shall be included as money actually received by the said bishop, such a sum as shall from time to time be agreed upon between him and the said Commissioners, or in case of their disagreement, then as shall be determined by two indifferent persons, one to be chosen by the bishop, and the other by the said Commissioners, or in case of the disagreement of such two persons, then by an umpire to be chosen by them, as a fair and reasonable occupation rent to be charged against the said bishop, for such parts of the estates of the said see (other than and except the palace belonging to the said see, at Ripon, with the grounds, plantations, and premises thereunto belonging, containing by estimation twenty acres, or thereabouts; and also excepting certain pasture lands, adjoining the said grounds and premises, containing by estimation sixty-two acres, or thereabouts, which by reason of the costs, charges, and expenses to which the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, has been and will be put to, by reason of planting, draining, and other improvements necessary for the convenient occupation thereof, and of the said palace and premises, are not likely to yield him any profit during his incumbency), as shall have been in the possession or occupation of the said bishop, or of any person or persons under his authority or permission (other than and except under any lease, or agreement for a lease, to be granted or entered into after the execution of these presents, with the consent of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as hereinafter mentioned), during the preceding half year, or any part thereof, and according to the term of his, her, or their having been in such possession or occupation; and if it shall appear by any such account, that after allowing all such reasonable and customary payments and deductions as shall be allowed by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, or their surveyor, or receiver, the net amount actually received has exceeded two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds, being one half of the said amount of the annual income so fixed for the said see as aforesaid, the surplus shall at the same time be paid by the said bishop; and he doth hereby agree to pay such surplus to the credit of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at the Bank of England; and that upon the account so delivered being examined and approved by the Treasurers of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for the time being, their receipt for the amount of such surplus shall be given to the said bishop, but if it shall appear upon due investigation of any such account, that after allowing such payments and deductions as aforesaid, the net amount so received is less than one half of the said annual income so fixed as aforesaid for the said see, there shall be paid by the said Commissioners, and they do hereby agree to pay the said bishop, on the first day of November, or the first day of May, as the case may be, then next following, such a sum of money as shall make up the deficiency, and such payment shall be in full satisfaction and discharge of all and every of the said augmentations or payments of two thousand two hundred pounds, and five hundred pounds, to which such bishop is, or would have been, entitled under the provisions of the said Orders in Council, of the twenty-second day of December one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and the eleventh day of February one

thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, or either of them.

“2. Provided always, and it is further agreed by the said bishop, that subject to the right of apportionment (if any), hereinafter mentioned, after the delivery of such account, all arrears of rent due or other payments in respect of the see, or of any such profits or emoluments as aforesaid, which may have remained unpaid at the end of the half year to which such account shall relate, shall form part of the future revenues of the said see, and shall, when received, be included in the account for the then current half year, so to be delivered to the said Commissioners as aforesaid; and the said bishop shall take and use all lawful means and remedies for obtaining and compelling payment of all such monies as last-mentioned, within a reasonable time, or it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, if they shall think fit, to use the name and act as the attorneys of the said bishop, in demanding, obtaining, or compelling payment of such monies, and giving good and sufficient discharges for the same, and all monies so recovered, after payment of the costs of obtaining or compelling payment thereof, and of all incidental expenses, shall be carried over to the common fund of the said Commissioners.

“3. Provided nevertheless, that with respect to all such sums of money as were accruing in respect of the said revenues, profits, or emoluments on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and have been since, or shall be hereafter, received by the said bishop, he, the said bishop, shall be entitled to such apportioned part thereof (if any), as his legal personal representative would have been by law entitled to, in case he had died on that day, and the said see had thereby become void.

“4. Provided also, and it is hereby further mutually agreed between the said bishop and the said Commissioners, that all monies which shall be due to the said bishop on account of his said see, or any such other ecclesiastical profits or emoluments as aforesaid, at the time of his avoidance of the said see, whether by death or otherwise, or, which in case of the avoidance thereof by death, shall accrue to his legal personal representatives, including all arrears accrued due since the said thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty, subject to such right of apportionment (if any) as aforesaid, shall be considered as belonging to the said Commissioners, and shall and may be received or recovered by them, or by the said bishop, or his representatives, on their behalf, and paid over to them with as little delay as practicable; and upon such avoidance, an account shall forthwith be made and rendered by the said bishop, or his representatives, as the case may be, to the said Commissioners, in such form as they shall require, of all monies received or to be accounted for as monies received by him, or them, since the then last half yearly account, and also of all monies then remaining unpaid in respect of the said see, or such other ecclesiastical profits or emoluments as aforesaid, and if it shall appear by such account, that after allowing all such reasonable and customary payments and deductions as aforesaid, the net amount received, or to be accounted for, has exceeded so much of the current half yearly payment of the said annual income, or sum of four thousand five hundred pounds, as would be in proportion to the number of days which shall have intervened between the thirty-first day of December, or the thirtieth day of June, whichever shall have happened next before such avoidance of the said see, and in that event, then the said bishop, or his representatives, as the case may be, shall pay

over such surplus to the credit of the said Commissioners, at the Bank of England, or if it shall appear upon the examination of such account, that after allowing such payments and deductions as aforesaid, the net income so received, and to be accounted for, is less in amount than so much of the current half yearly payment of the said annual income of four thousand five hundred pounds as shall be in proportion to such intervening number of days as last mentioned, then the said Commissioners shall pay to the said bishop, or his legal personal representatives, such a sum of money as shall make up such deficiency.

“5. And the said bishop doth further agree that, before granting any lease, or entering into any agreement for granting a lease, by way of renewal, or in any other way disposing of the possession of any property belonging to the said see, except as hereinbefore is excepted, or any such other profits or emoluments as aforesaid, on the property from whence the same shall arise, for any estate, term, or interest whatsoever therein, whether by parole or otherwise, and whether for valuable consideration or not, he will submit to the said Commissioners, for their approval, a statement in writing of his proposal to grant, enter into, or make such lease, agreement, or disposition, and of all the considerations (if any) whether by way of fine, premium, rent, royalty, or other nature, kind, or description whatsoever, to be received, taken, reserved, or rendered, for the granting or making thereof, together with all other terms of such intended lease, agreement, or disposition, and an explanation of the principle upon which such fine, or other like consideration, (if any) shall have been calculated, and that no such lease shall be granted, or agreement entered into, or other disposition made, without the consent of the said Commissioners, in writing under their common seal, and if it shall appear that the amount of any fine, or other like consideration, shall in any case exceed one half of the said annual income of four thousand five hundred pounds, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to direct such fine to be paid to them, and the said bishop doth hereby agree that the same shall be so paid accordingly.

“6. Provided always, that this agreement, with all matters herein contained, is subject to the approval and ratification of Her Majesty in Council, and the said Commissioners do hereby agree forthwith to prepare and lay before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, recommending and proposing that Her Majesty should approve and ratify the same accordingly, so that the same, when ratified, shall remain in force until Parliament shall otherwise direct.

“In witness whereof the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have hereunto set their common seal, and the said Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, hath hereunto set his hand, the day and year first above written.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the said agreement be approved and ratified by your Majesty in Council, so that the same shall remain in force until Parliament shall otherwise direct.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures

relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act, and shall remain in force until Parliament shall otherwise direct; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the established church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage;' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues;' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Bishop of Ely for certain estates belonging to his see:

"Whereas it was by the secondly and thirdly

recited Acts enacted that, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, or of the said first-recited Act, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any bishop, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to the see of such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Ely, is seised, in right of his see, of the lands, tithes, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, subject nevertheless to the subsisting leases thereof; and the said bishop is now entitled to grant renewals of the said leases by the insertion therein of additional lives, but the holders of such leases, respectively, are unwilling to take such renewals, except upon payment of inadequate fines:

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund that the said land, tithes, and hereditaments should be transferred from the said see of Ely to us, and that a money payment to the said Thomas, Bishop of Ely, should forthwith be substituted for his interest in the same:

"And whereas the said bishop has consented to accept a money payment accordingly, and that the same shall be the sum of ten thousand six hundred and forty-six pounds eight shillings and seven pence, and thereupon to relinquish all further benefit, by renewal of the said leases or otherwise, in respect of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Ely, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his corporate seal, that from and after the day of the due publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the manors, lands, tithes, and hereditaments particularly described and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed (excepting any ecclesiastical right of patronage), and all the estate, right, title, and interests therein and thereto of the said Thomas, Bishop of Ely, and of his successors, bishops of Ely, shall be and become conveyed and transferred from the said bishop and his successors, bishops of Ely, and shall be absolutely vested in us, subject to the said subsisting leases thereof, for the purposes of the said Acts:

"And we further recommend and propose, that at the same time there shall be paid by us to the said Thomas, Bishop of Ely, as a consideration for such transfer, so far as it applies to all his estate and interest in the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments as aforesaid, the said sum of ten thousand six hundred and forty-six pounds eight shillings and seven pence:

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

## "SCHEDULE.

"All that the manor, rectory, and church of Kenninghall, in the county of Norfolk, with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions) in the tenure or occupation of William Jones and William Littleton, their heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the twenty-eighth day of September one thousand eight hundred and four, granted by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all that tenement, with the appurtenances, commonly called the King's Head Tavern, in Chancery-lane, London, sometime in the tenure or occupation of Gibbons Bagnall, then of Samuel Salt, Vintner, since of Thomas Walker, Vintner, and afterwards in the tenure of Hugh James, or his copartners, situate between the mansion place called Serjeant's Inn, in Chancery-lane aforesaid, on the north side, and the King's highway, called Fleet-street, on the south side, the one head whereof abutteth on a tenement formerly of Francis Larkin, Pewterer, since of Thomas Edwards, Pastry Cook, and afterwards of the said Hugh James, on the east, and the other head abutteth on the King's street called Chancery-lane on the west, which said hereditaments, with the appurtenances thereunto, are now in the tenure or occupation of the said Hugh James, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the thirteenth day of October one thousand seven hundred and seventy, granted by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all that the parsonage of Madingley, in the county of Cambridge, with the appurtenances thereto belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions) in the tenure or occupation of James Hallett, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the seventh day of July one thousand eight hundred and twelve, granted to him by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all that the rectory or parsonage appropriate of Roughton, in the county of Norfolk, with the appurtenances thereto belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions) in the tenure or occupation of Edward Lord Suffield, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, granted to him by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all that the rectory of West Dereham, in the county of Norfolk, with the rights and appurtenances to the late dissolved monastery of West Dereham, in the said county of Norfolk sometime belonging, all which are now (with certain exceptions) in the tenure or occupation of George Leonard Jenyns, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the twenty-seventh day of December one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven, granted by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all those eleven several pieces or parcels of fen land; part of the site of the manor or park of Downham, and the demesne and fen grounds and appurtenances unto the same belonging, in the parish of Downham, in the Isle of Ely, formerly demised to William Martin, containing in the whole one hundred and eighty-five acres, little more or less, abutting towards the north on a certain large drain, called the Commissioners' Drain, and towards the east on a certain other drain, Nine Feet Drain, and towards the west on a certain drove-way, leading from the town of Downham to the Commissioners' Drain, and abutting south on closes respectively called

Gravel Close, Fordham's Horse Close, Bushy Frith, Betty's Piece, and Old Mill Ground, all which several closes are part of the site of the manor and park or demesnes of Downham aforesaid, and also all that draining-mill, situate near the centre of the northern extremity of the said lands hereinbefore described, and on or near the edge of the said Commissioners' Drain for the purpose of draining the same lands, and other particulars of lands, formerly demised to William Martin, which said several pieces or parcels of land, and the appurtenances thereunto belonging (with certain exceptions), are now in the tenure or occupation of George Grant, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the sixteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and four, granted by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

"And also all those closes, pieces, or parcels of land, situate, lying, and being in Inham Field, in Wisbeach Saint Mary's, in the Isle of Ely, and in the county of Cambridge, containing by estimation one hundred and twenty-two acres, two roods, and twenty-eight perches, little more or less, but on a late survey found to contain one hundred and twenty-two acres, two roods, and twenty-two perches, now or late in nine several pieces, abutting on Bevis-lane in part, and land late of George Grindle in other part east, and land late of John Waddington in part, and land late of the Reverend James Harris in other part west, on other lands late of said James Harris south, and the common green or highway north, with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, which said pieces of land, and the appurtenances thereto belonging, are now (with certain exceptions) in the tenure or occupation of Samuel Nicholls, his heirs, assigns, or undertenants, by virtue of a lease thereof, dated the thirtieth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, granted by the then Bishop of Ely, for the term of three lives.

THE following Regulations (in addition to those published in the Gazette of 5th March 1852), are to be observed in relation to the construction of the vessels to be moored at the places under the provisions of an Act of the 14th and 15th Queen Victoria, cap. 67, sec. 6, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of an Act of the 12th year of King George the Third, relating to the making, keeping, and carriage of gunpowder, as excepts therefrom certain gunpowder magazines and stores near Liverpool, and to make certain temporary provisions with regard to the said magazines and stores;" and also fixing the quantity of gunpowder to be kept in such vessel. Any person failing to observe these Regulations will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punished accordingly.

1st. That in vessels for the stowage of gunpowder, a clear passage or wing shall be left between the powder store and the ship's side, in case of collision from other vessels passing up or down.

2nd. That in addition to the wing passage round the vessel, a crown of planking shall be attached of four inches thick, fastened on the lower part of the beams, for the whole extent of the powder rooms, and that the entrance scuttle shall be fitted with a penthouse covering on the deck, for a further security of the magazine scuttles only.

3rd. That no cabins with fire-places can be allowed.

And the Master-General of the Ordnance is pleased to allow that the quantity of gunpowder to be kept in the new floating magazines, at Liverpool, may be increased from 10,000 to 15,000 barrels, of 100 lbs. each.

### ADMIRALTY NOTICE RESPECTING LIGHTS TO BE CARRIED BY SEA-GOING VESSELS TO PREVENT COLLISION.

*By the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. &c.*

BY virtue of the power and authority vested in Us by the Act 14 and 15 Victoria, Cap. 79, dated 7th August, 1851, we hereby require and direct that the following Regulations be strictly observed:—

#### *Steam Vessels.*

All British Sea-going Steam Vessels (whether propelled by Paddles or Screws), shall within all Seas, Gulfs, Channels, Straits, Bays, Creeks, Roads, Roadsteads, Harbours, Havens, Ports, and Rivers, and under all circumstances, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit Lights of such description, and in such manner, as hereinafter mentioned, viz:—

*When under Steam.* { A Bright White Light at the Foremast Head.  
A Green Light on the Starboard Side.  
A Red Light on the Port Side.

1. The Mast Head Light is to be visible at a distance of at least five miles in a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, and the Lantern is to be so constructed as to shew a uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the Compass, being ten points on each side of the Ship, viz. from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side.

2. The Green Light on the Starboard side is to be visible at a distance of at least two miles in a dark night, with a clear atmosphere; and the Lantern is to be so constructed as to shew a uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the Compass, viz. from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the Starboard side.

3. The Red Light on the Port side is likewise to be fitted so as to throw its light the same distance on that side.

4. The side Lights are moreover to be fitted with screens, on the inboard side, of at least three feet long, to prevent the lights from being seen across the bow.

*When at Anchor.*—A Common Bright Light.

#### *Sailing Vessels.*

We hereby require that all Sailing Vessels when under sail, or being towed, approaching or being approached by any other Vessel, shall be bound to shew between sunset and sunrise a bright light in such a position as can be best seen by such vessel or vessels, and in sufficient time to avoid collision.

All Sailing Vessels at anchor in Roadsteads or Fairways, shall be also bound to exhibit between sunset and sunrise, a constant bright light at the Mast-head, except within Harbours or other places where regulations for other Lights for Ships are legally established.

The Lantern to be used when at anchor, both by Steam Vessels and Sailing Vessels, is to be so constructed, as to shew a clear good light all round the horizon.

We hereby revoke all Regulations heretofore made by us relating to Steam Vessels exhibiting or carrying Lights; and we require that the preceding Regulations be strictly carried into effect, on and after the 1st of August, 1852.

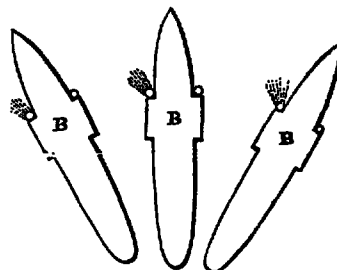
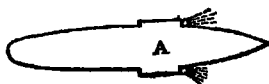

## 1ST SITUATION.

In this situation the Steamer A. will only see the Red Light of the Vessel B. in whichever of the three positions the latter may happen to be, because the Green Light will be hid from view. A. will be assured that the Port side of B. is towards him, and that the latter is therefore crossing the bows of A. in some direction to Port. A will therefore [if so close as to fear collision] Port his helm with confidence, and pass clear. On the other hand the Vessel B. in either of the three positions, will see the Red, Green, and Mast-head Lights of A. appear in a triangular form, by which the former will know that a Steamer is approaching directly towards him.—B. will act accordingly.



It is scarcely necessary to remark that the Mast-head Light will always be visible in every situation till abaft the Beam.

## 2ND SITUATION.

Here A. will see B's Green Light only, which will clearly indicate to the former that B. is crossing to Starboard. Again A's three Lights being visible to B. will apprise the latter that a Steamer is steering directly towards him.



## 3RD SITUATION.

A. and B. will see each other's Red Light only; the screens preventing the Green Lights from being seen. Both Vessels are evidently passing to Port.



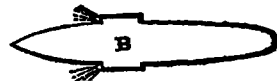
## 4TH SITUATION.

Here a Green light only will be visible to each; the screens preventing the Red Lights from being seen. They are therefore passing to Starboard.



## 5TH SITUATION.

Here the two coloured Lights, visible to each, will indicate their direct approach towards each other. In this situation both should put their helms to Port.



## DIRECTIONS FOR FITTING THE LIGHTS.

The manner of fixing the Coloured Lights is to be particularly attended to. They should be fitted, each, with a screen of wood, on the inboard side, in order to prevent both being seen at the same moment from any direction but that of right-a-head.

This is important, for without the screens (a principle first introduced with this plan) any plan of bow-lights would be ineffective as a means of indicating the direction of steering.

This will be readily understood by a reference to the preceding illustrations, where it will appear evident, that in any situation in which two vessels may approach each other in the dark, the coloured lights will instantly indicate to both the relative course of each—that is, each will know whether the other is approaching directly or crossing the bows, either to starboard or to port. This intimation is all that is required to enable vessels to pass each other in the darkest night, with almost equal safety as in broad day, and for the want of which so many lamentable accidents have occurred.

Patterns of the Lanterns to be carried, and of the mode in which the Screens are to be fitted, may be seen at the Custom Houses of the principal Commercial Ports of the United Kingdom.
