REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOM.

The Ladies, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *legibly* written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presencechamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies who are to be presented at the Drawing-Room on the 3rd of June next, are hereby informed, that it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on *Tuesday* the 1st of June next, before twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which name shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested, that in every case written cards only be delivered.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the carriages proceeding to Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, at St. James's-Palace, on Thursday the 3rd of June, are to fall into line and go down the left-hand side of St. James's-street, enter at the iron gate nearest the Palace, set down at the Arcade, turn round, and go out by the iron gate nearest Marlborough-House, to wait in St. James's-square. When called, they are to pass from the square through Charles-street, into Regent-street and Jermynstreet, go down St. James's-street as before, take up, and pass away through Pall-Mall.

No hackney carriages will be admitted within the gates.

For all persons having the privilege of the entrie, carriage-tickets will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, on Tuesday, from eleven till three o'clock; their carriages are to pass through Constitution-hill-gate, into St. James's-Park: those belonging to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers are to set down at the Ambassadors'-entrance in Marlborough-court, at the east end of St. James's-Palace, and wait there till called to take up, when they are to pass away by Constitution-hill. The carriages of Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State are to set down in the Middle-court, and wait there: the others are likewise to set down in the Middlecourt, but are to wait in Stable-yard, or St. James's-Park: when called to take up, they are, on leaving the Palace, to pass away up St. James'sstreet.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket; to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hillgate, and Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by a Marshalman in attendance; and no carriage can be allowed to approach or leave the Palace by any other route than as above directed.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend " and render more effectual an Act, passed in the "last session of Parliament, for building and pro-"moting the building of additional churches in "populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better pro-"vision for the assignment of ecclesiastical "districts to churches or chapels augmented by " the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, " and for other purposes," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in Her Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, and also to the consecrated chapel at Little Berwick, both situate in the said parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend 'and render more effectual an Act, passed in 'the last session of Parliament, for build-ing and promoting the building of additional 'churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical 'districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed districts should be respectively named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Shrewsbury,' and 'The District Chapelry of Little Berwick, Shrewsbury,' and that the respective boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line of the district chapelry of Saint Michael, Shrewsbury, commences at the bound stone on the western side of the road leading to Market Drayton, at Bow Bridge, and proceeds along the boundary line separating the parish of Saint Alkmond, Shrewsbury, from the parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, in a north-westerly, westerly, south-easterly, and again in a westerly direction, until such boundary line meets the boundary line of Saint Julian's Parish, Shrewsbury; then follows that line of boundary westerly and southerly until it reaches the southernmost corner of the boundary line of the said parish of Saint Julian and westerly of Bagley Brook; from which said corner the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Saint Michael, Shrewsbury, proceeds in a straight line about one chain southeasterly to Bagley Brook, and then follows the course of that brook in a southerly direction to the boundary line of the said parish of Saint Alkmond, and proceeds south-easterly along such boundary to the corner of the Red Lion Inn, in Castle Foregate-street, and up that street northerly to the corner of the Plough Inn Yard; then easterly along the street leading to Gas House Bridge, and from thence along the wall at the south side of Birchesbuildings as far as Beacall's-lane, then along that lane southerly to the point opposite the terrace wall on the north side of the gaol, and along such wall as far as the walk leading to the steps on the river Severn side from the Daria; then along the said river easterly and north-easterly as far as the northern corner of the field, called Jenny Woods Field, where it meets the boundary line of the said parish of Saint Julian (following such line in a south-westerly direction as far as Robin Hood Inn); then proceeds north-easterly up the road leading to Market Drayton as far as the bound stone at Bow Bridge aforesaid, where the said district chapelry of Saint Michael, Shrewsbury, commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured green :

"The boundary line of the district chapelry of Little Berwick, Shrewsbury, commences at the southern corner of the middle Purditches Field, adjoining the river Severn, and proceeds north-easterly along the fence of that field to the point where it meets the road leading from the Shrewsbury-road to Gravel-hill, and then turns south-easterly along that road to its junction with the said Shrewsbury-road, up which latter road it proceeds northerly as far as the south-western corner of the fence separating the lands belonging to the Honourable Henry Wentworth Powys from the lands belonging to Messieurs Braine and Bather, and then north-easterly along the said fence to the south-east corner of the field called the Anvils; thence to the division of the town-ships of Coton and Almond Park, where the boundary line of the said parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, meets the said parish of Saint Alkmond, and proceeds along the boundary line separating the two parishes northerly and northeasterly until they meet the parish of Battlefield at the south-east corner of the fence of the field called Little Huffley Leasow; then northerly along the boundary line separating the said parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, from the said parish of Battlefield as far as the south-east corner of the fence of the field called Perril Meadow; then northerly along the eastern fence thereof to the northern extremity thereof, and turning westerly proceeds along the northern fences of fields called Perril Leasow, Steen Lane Piece, Little Wol-

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lascott Piece, and Big Wollascott Piece, crossi the line of the Shrewsbury and Chester Railwav to the northern corner of the fence of the field called Wollascott Slang; then south-westerly along the fence of that field, and then westerly along the northern fences of fields called Far Well Leasow, and Near Well Leasow, as far as the road leading to Preston Gobalds, and then westerly along the boundary line separating the township of Great Berwick from the townships of Wollascott and Leaton until it reaches the river Severn, and then follows the course of that river southerly until it reaches the southern corner of the middle Purditches Field, where the said district chapelry of Little Berwick, Shrewsbury, commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Michael, and in the said chapel at Little Berwick, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the ministers or incumbents thereof for the time being.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Postmaster-General to charge on all letters conveyed by the post between places within any of Her Majesty's colonies, or conveyed by packet-boats between one part of Her Majesty's dominions and another part of the same dominions, or between Her Majesty's dominions and foreign parts, or between one port in any foreign country and another port in the same or any other foreign country where post communications shall be established, and where rates of postage have not hitherto been authorized by law; and also to charge on all letters conveyed by any vessels to or from any of the colonies, or between any of the colonies, or between any of the colonies and a foreign port, and on all letters which shall be brought by the master of any vessel to the Postoffice in any of the colonies, such rates of postage as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by warrant under their hands, shall from time to time direct :

And by the same Act, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters, or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such warrant,

and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid. to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof:

And whereas it is expedient that regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters and newspapers hereinafter mentioned :

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this warrant under our hands, direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to the Falkland Islands, and transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom and any port or place in such islands, either direct or viâ Monte Video (the sea conveyance being by British packet-boat) there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform British rate of one shilling.

And we further direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to the Falkland Islands, and transmitted by British packet-boat between any port in such islands and the port of Monte Video, without in any case such letters passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform British rate of four pence.

And we direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

- On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.
- On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.
- On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And we further direct, that such printed newspapers as are hereinafter mentioned, may be sent by the post according to the regulations and rates hereinafter set forth, which rates shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such newspapers (that is to say):

British newspapers and such British publications as are allowed to pass by the post as newspapers in the United Kingdom, may, if posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Falkland Islands, be sent from the United Kingdom to the Falkland Islands direct, or via Monte Video, by packet-boat, free of postage, and by private ship, at the rate of one penny each.

Newspapers published in the Falkland Islands may be sent from thence to any part of the United Kingdom direct, or viâ Monte Video, by packetboat, free of postage, and by private ship at the rate of one penny each.

British, colonial, or foreign newspapers may be sent between any port in the Falkland Islands and Monte Video by packet-boat (without passing through the United Kingdom), at the rate of one penny each.

penny each. And we direct, that every printed supplement or additional sheet to any newspaper shall, for the purpose of charging the postage under this warrant, be deemed a distinct newspaper, unless sent in the same cover or together with the newspaper to which it is a supplement or addition.

And we direct, that no such printed newspapers shall be sent by the post at the rates aforesaid, unless the following conditions shall be observed :

- First. Every such newspaper shall be sent without a cover, or in a band or cover open at the sides or ends. Second. There shall be no word or communication
- Second. There shall be no word or communication printed on the newspaper after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon it, or upon the cover of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

Third. There shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such newspaper.

And in case any one of such conditions shall not be fulfilled, the whole paper or packet shall be charged with the letter rates of postage.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, or by any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Postoffice, and that all such exemptions and privileges shall remain in full force.

And we further direct, that the several terms and expressions used in this warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act; and that vessels employed in the conveyance of post letters, under contract with Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, shall be included in the term packet-boat used in this warrant, in addition to any other ships or vessels, which under the Post-office Acts are included in such term.
