WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts;" or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority vested in them by the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighth day of June one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Sundridge, Chèvening, and Chiddingstone, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Ide Hill, in the said parish of Sundridge, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts;' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in

your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Ide Hill,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the consolidated chapelry of Ide Hill is bounded on the east by the parish of Sevenoaks, on the north by a line drawn in a westerly direction from the boundary line of the said parish of Sevenoaks from the point where it crosses the road or track through the forest leading to Dibden, and proceeds along the northern side of that road or track until it reaches a cottage and garden, No. 320 on the tithe commutation map of the parish of Chèvening, and passes along the eastern and western fences of such cottage and garden to the north-western corner thereof (so as to exclude the same from the consolidated chapelry), and then takes a straight line north-westerly to the northern corner of the fence of a cottage and garden, No. 192 (a) on the said map; then proceeds in a straight line westerly from such fence (crossing the road to River Head), until the boundary line reaches the northern fence of the cottages and gardens situate on the northern side of the junction of the roads from Brasted Chart, Ide Hill, and River Head, follows such line of fence westerly until it reaches the road leading to Brasted Chart, then continues along the northern side of that road until it reaches a row of cottages and gardens, No. 343 on the tithe commutation map of the parish of Sundridge, follows the line of fences of such cottages and gardens, northerly, westerly, and southerly (so as to include the same within the consolidated chapelry), and again joins the road to Brasted Chart, and proceeds westerly along the northern side thereof until it reaches the eastern fence of a farm-house and garden, Nos. 350 and 352 on such last-mentioned map, and passing along the eastern, northern, and western fences thereof, again enters the aforesaid road to Brasted Chart, and continues along the northern side thereof until it reaches the boundary line of the parishes of Sundridge and Brasted; the consolidated chapelry from that point is then bounded on the west by the parishes of Brasted and Hever as far southwards as the south-western corner of a fence of enclosure No. 16 on the tithe commutation map of the parish of Chiddingstone, and on the south is then bounded by a line proceeding in an easterly direction along the southern fences of enclosures marked Nos. 16, 17, 18, 19, 60, 62, 74 and 73 on such last-mentioned map, and from the south-eastern corner of No. 73,

in a straight direction partly along the fence of No. 72, until it reaches a brook, along the course of which brook it proceeds north-easterly to the boundary line separating the parish of Chiddingstone, from the parishes of Sundridge and Chevening, and proceeds easterly along such boundary until it meets the parish of Sevenoaks on the east, and which consolidated chapelry of Ide Hill is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, pink, and yellow :
