*The Governor-General of India in Council to the Secret Committee of the East India Company.*

*Fort William, June 2, 1852.*

(Extract.) No. 23.

WE beg to transmit herewith a copy of further correspondence connected with Rangoon affairs.

*Lieutenant-General H. Godwin, C.B. commanding the Forces in Ava, Arracan, and Tenasserim Provinces, to C. Allen, Esq. Secretary to the Government of India.*

*Head Quarters, Rangoon, May 14, 1852.*

(Extract.) "IN my report of the 18th of April, I had the honour to recommend to the favourable consideration of the Governor-General in Council the valuable service I had received during the operations of the 12th, 13th, and 14th, from Brevet Major Boulderson, the Deputy Judge Advocate General of the Force, who had requested to follow me in the Field; and who, when Captain Allan, the Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, was wounded at the White House Stockade, was appointed to officiate for him. He has been of the greatest assistance to me in both departments by his ability and zeal, and I therefore venture to bring to notice the omission of his name in the General Orders of the 28th of April, which I entirely attribute to oversight, and earnestly request may be rectified.

"A few omissions and errors, inseparable from the recent formation of the Forces I command, have occurred in the preparation of my Dispatch of the 18th of April, which I solicit the favour of being allowed to correct, should his Lordship in Council see fit to extend his grace.

"Brigadier Warren, whose absence from the Army I greatly regret, has reported to me the services of the companies of the 18th Royal Irish, which under his immediate command assisted in the "Tenasserim" at the destruction of the three stockades at the entrance of the Rangoon river on the 5th of April. The Brigadier was with the same companies under the heavy fire of the stockades on the Dalla and Rangoon sides of the river, on the 11th of April. He also was in command of his brigade during the greater part of the 12th of April.

"Major Fraser has brought to my notice the very gallant conduct of his Adjutant, Lieutenant Williams, of the Engineers, at the White House Stockade, where he was very prominent. The Major has also pointed out that Lieutenant Ford was the officer who commanded the detachment of Madras Sappers and Miners at Martaban, and who should have received the thanks of Government instead of Captain Rundall, who had not joined the force, and who very honourably disclaims the praise.

"Captain Christie, of Her Majesty's 80th Regiment, has been brought to my notice as the officer who commanded the portion of the storming party from that corps at Martaban; he partook in the subsequent operations on that day.

"The Commandant of Artillery has also pointed out the omission, on my part, of the services of Brevet Major Back, in command of the Madras Artillery contingent, who directed the heavy battery in the action of the 14th of April, which I commended as having been served with precision and effect.

"The services of Brevet Captain Scott, of the Madras Brigade of the Artillery, have also escaped my notice; he has been mentioned in very complimentary terms by the officers commanding the Bengal and Madras contingents of Artillery."

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such warrant, and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided that the power thereby given should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage:

And whereas in consequence of a communication opened with the Post-office of Prussia, it is considered expedient to alter the rates of postage payable on letters conveyed between the German Postal Union and the United Kingdom, via Belgium.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling us in that behalf, direct that on every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the German Postal Union, and transmitted between any part of the United Kingdom and any place in the German Postal Union, and on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted between any foreign country through any part of the German Postal Union and any place in the United Kingdom (the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet boat), there shall be charged and

taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of three pence halfpenny.

And we direct that on every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the German Postal Union, transmitted by the Post between any part of the German Postal Union and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any Foreign Country, through the United Kingdom, and on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted between any Foreign Country through any part of the German Postal Union and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any Foreign Country, through the United Kingdom (the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet-boat), there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of three pence halfpenny for the conveyance of every such letter between Belgium and any part of the United Kingdom, and also such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such letter between the Port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the Colony or Foreign Country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the Port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such Port, and such Colony, or Foreign Country.

And we further direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this warrant exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and taken progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates following (that is to say):

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as one additional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters passing by the post between the United Kingdom and any part of the German Postal Union via France or the Netherlands, or Hamburg, nor to any letters passing by the post between the United Kingdom and any part of the German Postal Union, via Belgium, sent otherwise than in the Prussian closed mails, which respective letters are to be charged with the same rates of postage as if this present warrant had not been signed.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, or by an Act made and passed in the first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the management of the Post-office;" and that all such exemptions and privileges shall remain in full force.

And we further direct that the term "German Postal Union," used in this warrant, shall include the kingdoms, states, and countries of Austria, Baden, Bavaria, Bremen, Brunswick, Hamburg, Hanover, Lubeck, Luxemburg, Mecklenburgh Schwerin, Mecklenburgh Strelitz, Oldenburgh, Prussia, Saxony, Wurtenburgh, and the countries included in the postal district of the principality of Tour and Taxis (Lippe excepted) and that the other terms and expressions used in this warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

And we further direct, that this warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
