MEMORANDUM.

*Middlesex Militia.*

Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to direct that the Royal Westminster Regiment of Middlesex Militia, and the Royal West Middlesex Regiment of Militia, shall be formed into Light Infantry Regiments.

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Charles Carter the younger, of Bideford, in the county of Devon, and of Eberly House, in the parish of Roborough, in the said county, Gentleman (only son of Charles Carter, of Bideford, Esquire), Her royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with an injunction contained in the last will and testament of Henry Hole, late of Eberly House aforesaid, Esquire, deceased, henceforth take and use the surname of Hole, instead of his present surname of Carter, and also use the arms of Hole; and that such surname and arms may in like manner be taken and used by his issue, such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise Her Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
