thence in a southerly direction along the boundary of the said parishes of Thoydon Garnon, otherwise Coopersale, and Thoydon Mount, as far as the Bridle Road, in the middle of the wood called Birchen Wood, belonging to W. Coxhead Marsh, Esquire, and marked B on the said plan; the boundary then proceeds from the said point marked B in a north-westerly direction along the middle of the said Bridle Road as far as the open forest; the boundary then proceeds in a south-westerly direction along the boundary of the said forest, to the north-eastern corner of a field belonging to the Coxhead Marsh, called Wintery Field; said W. then north-westerly along the top of the said field, and the field called Silver Hills, as far as the north-west corner of the latter field; whence the boundary proceeds in a south-westerly direction along a watercourse past the north-west end of a wood belonging to the trustees of Stonnard's Charity, until it crosses the road leading up to Park Hall; from whence the boundary proceeds in a north-westerly direction to the south corner of the garden attached to the house belonging to John Archer Houblon, Esquire, (and proposed to be occupied by the minister of the said district), and continues along the end of the said garden to the end of a garden attached to some cottages belonging to Mr. Alfred Adland; thence to the south-east corner of a field belonging to the said John Archer Houblon, called Godfreys, and now in the occupation of W. C. Whiteman, Esquire, where the said field joins the road from Coopersale to Epping, and then along the middle of the said road to the said point marked A on the said plan, where the boundary commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated thereon, and coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in such church, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

George, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banus and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

THEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the " last session of Parliament, for building and pro-'moting the building of additional churches in "populous parishes;" and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesi-" astical districts to churches or chapels augmented " by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, "and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave lumbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Chatham, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester, it appears to them to be expedient that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches of Saint John, in the town of Chatham, and to Christ Church, at Luton, both in the said parish of Chatham, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render 'more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical dis-'tricts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and ' for other purposes,' and that such proposed districts should be respectively named or called 'The ' District Chapelry of Saint John, Chatham,' and 'The District Chapelry of Luton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Saint John, Chatham, commences at Saint Bartholomew's Chapel, in the High-street of Chatham, and proceeds south-eastwardly along the middle of that street to Cloverstreet; then south-westwardly up the middle of Clover-street into the New-road; thence southeastwardly along the middle of the New-road to the turning to Joy's mill; thence southerly, along the middle of such turning, to Joy's mill; and from thence, including Joy's mill, to the boundary of the Ordnance land; and then along the boundary of the Ordnance land to the Maidstone Road, opposite Whittaker-terrace; then southward along the middle of the Maidstone Road to the turning to Hook and Hatchett-lane; thence along the middle of that turning, and down the middle of Hook and Hatchettlane to Robin Hood-lane; and then along the middle of Robin Hood-lane to the boundary of the parish of Chatham; thence along the boundary of
