AT the Court at *Buckingham-Palace*, the 10th day of *November* 1852,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the prebendary of the prebend of Bury, in the cathedral church of Chichester, for the property belonging to the said prebend.

"Whereas by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said prebend will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of the same, become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in

writing under the hand of any prebendary of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such prebendary, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Charles Gray, the present prebendary of the said prebend of Bury, that with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts, hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council:

"We, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Gray, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose, that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than a duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and upon and after the day of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) now belonging to the said Charles Gray, as such prebendary as aforesaid, or to or in which he has or ought to have any estate, right, title, or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title, and interest, therein (except as aforesaid) be, and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said Charles Gray to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, there shall be paid by us to the said Charles Gray the sum of one thousand six hundred pounds, provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease, of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall, since the seventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, have been or shall be granted or made by the said Charles Gray.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the

said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the *London Gazette*, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," and of the ninth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eight day of November one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of West Ham and East Ham, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Emmanuel, situate at Forest-gate, in the said parish of West Ham, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act passed, in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Forest Gate,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the boundary commences in the

Romford-road, at a point where the parish boundary line of East Ham crosses the said road, and proceeds in a northerly direction along the boundary line dividing the parish of East Ham from Little Ilford parish, thence westerly along the boundary line dividing the parish of East Ham from Wanstead parish until it meets the boundary line dividing the parish of West Ham from Wanstead parish, and thence westerly along the said boundary until it meets the boundary line dividing Church-street Ward from Stratford Ward, thence southerly along the said boundary to Forest-lane, thence easterly along the middle of the said lane to a point opposite the boundary stone placed on the south side of the lane, thence south in a straight line to the boundary stone placed on the south side of the Romford-road next the Round-houses, and continues south along the western hedge of Margery Hall Field to the boundary stone on the north side of the footpath leading from Stratford to Upton, thence east along the middle of the said footpath to Upton-lane, thence by an imaginary line drawn in a south-easterly direction through the premises now occupied severally by Ireson Joseph Dimsdale and William Wackerbarth to the boundary stone placed at the west end of the hedge dividing the properties of Samuel Shepperd and Sir John Henry Pelly, Baronet, thence easterly along the said hedge to Gipsey-lane, thence north along the middle of the said lane to a point opposite the north-west corner of the field forming allotment No. 33 in the tithe-apportionment map of the parish of East Ham, thence eastwardly along the said line forming the boundary between the southernmost side of the allotments Nos. 32 and 35 in the occupation of Mr. William Adams, and the most northerly side of allotments Nos. 33, 34, 36 and 37, now in the occupation of Mr. Joseph Ramsden, to the north-east corner of allotment No. 37, where the same joins White Post-lane and the boundary line which divides the parish of East Ham from Little Ilford parish, thence north along the said boundary line to the point where the boundary commenced in the Romford-road, as the same is more particularly delineated and described on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon tinted dark green, and pink.

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and also patron (in right of his see) of the parish church of the said parish of East Ham, and also of the Right Honourable Edward Geoffry, Earl of Derby, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury (on behalf of your Majesty as patron of the parish church of the said parish of West Ham) have been respectively obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Forest Gate, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Charles James, Bishop of London, and Edward Geoffry, Earl of Derby, as such respective patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid) with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned), and of the said Charles James Bishop of London, (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Forest Gate aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised alternately by the vicars or incumbents for the time being, of the said parishes or parish churches

of West Ham and East Ham, but that the first right of presentation and appointment as aforesaid should be exercised by the vicar of West Ham aforesaid.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Stratford Marsh, in the said parish of West Ham, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and in the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels, augmented by the governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority whatever in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Stratford Marsh,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the boundary commences at Channelsea Bridge, where the Stratford road crosses the said river, and proceeds in a north and north-westerly direction along the middle of the Channelsea River, to the point where it meets the River Lea, thence in a southerly direction along the middle of the River Lea, to a point parallel to the north front of the Three Mills, thence easterly along the north front of the said mills to the middle of the Three Mills Wall River, and thence northerly along the middle of the said river to the Harrow Bridge, in the Stratford Road, thence north-easterly along the middle of the said road to the Abbey-lane, thence south-easterly along the middle of the said lane to the Channelsea River, and thence northerly along the middle of the said river to the point where the district commences at Channelsea Bridge, as the same is more particularly delineated and described on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted light green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church, at Stratford Marsh aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the said Charles James, Bishop of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the maps or plans thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve

thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Forest Gate, be carried into effect; and also that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the said church at Stratford Marsh be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churches, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect; agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of London.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the twenty-third day of November one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1848, have, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Halstead, in the county of Essex, (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole), directed Thomas Webster Rammell, a superintending inspector appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage and supply of water, the state of the burial grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, or other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said superintending inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed;

"And it appears by the said report, that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said parish for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such parish or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act ;

"Now, therefore, we, the said General Board of Health, do hereby in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty that it appears to us to be expedient:

"1. That the Public Health Act, 1848, and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Halstead, in the county of Essex, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purpose of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

"2. That the Local Board of Health to be elected under the Public Health Act should consist of nine persons, and that the entire number should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. That the first election of the said Local Board of Health should take place on the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

"4. That one-third in number of the said Local Board of Health should go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place ; but in case the day so appointed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then such one-third should go out of office on the day next following.

"5. That every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, be resident, as in the said Public Health Act, 1848, is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than five hundred pounds, or should be so resident, and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty pounds.

"6. That at the first election of the said Local Board, the Reverend Charles Burney, Vicar of Halstead aforesaid, should have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the Chairman of the Local Board of Health by the Public Health Act, 1848, in relation to the election by owners of property and ratepayers, and should perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election ; and in case the said Charles Burney, from illness or other sufficient cause, should be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or should be absent, or should refuse to act, then that George de Horne Vaizey, Esquire, J. P., of Halstead aforesaid, should exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

"7. That the fourteen days' notice of qualification, required by the Public Health Act, 1848, to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, should be given to the said Charles Burney, at his residence, the Vicarage, situate within the aforesaid district of Halstead, or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to

the said George de Horne Vaizey, at his residence, Constantyns, likewise within the district aforesaid.

"Given under our hands, and under the seal of the General Board of Health, this twenty-third day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of the Public Health Act, 1848, order and direct :—

1. That from and after the date of this Order, the Public Health Act, 1848, and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act printed, by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish of Halstead, in the county of Essex, and that such area, places, and parts of places, shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. That the Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act shall consist of nine persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. That the first election of the said Local Board of Health shall take place on the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

4. That one-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year, subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place ; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. That every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, be resident, as in the said Public Health Act, 1848, is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than five hundred pounds, or shall be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than twenty pounds.

6. That at the first election of the said Local Board, the Reverend Charles Burney, Vicar of Halstead, aforesaid, shall have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the Chairman of the Local Board of Health by the Public Health Act, 1848, in relation to the election by owners of property and ratepayers, and shall perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election ; and in case the said Charles Burney, from illness or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then that George de Horne Vaizey, Esquire, J. P., of Halstead, aforesaid, shall exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

7. That the fourteen days' notice of qualifi-

cation required by the Public Health Act, 1848, to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said Charles Burney, at his residence, the Vicarage, situate within the aforesaid district of Halstead, or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said George de Horne Vaizey, at his residence, Constanstyns, likewise within the district aforesaid.

India Board, December 2nd, 1852.

A DESPATCH, from which the following is an extract, has been this day received at the East India House :—

From the Governor-General of India in Council to the Secret Committee of the East India Company, dated Fort William, October 25, 1852.

From the General Order, and the despatches published on the 23rd instant, you will learn with satisfaction of the capture of Prome, on the 9th and 10th idem, with but a trifling loss on our side.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

Fort William, Foreign Department, October 23rd, 1852.

THE Most Noble the Governor-General in Council has much gratification in publishing for general information, despatches received from Commodore Lambert and from Major-General Godwin, which report the capture and occupation of the city of Prome, after some resistance, and with comparatively trifling loss.

The steam squadron and the boats of Her Majesty's ships, conveying the troops upon the Irrawaddy, anchored off Prome on the 9th of October. A fire from the shore was silenced by the fire of the steamers and of the boats. The troops having been landed, drove the enemy, some three or four thousand strong, from the suburbs; and on subsequently advancing to the great pagoda and to the heights beyond, they found the position wholly abandoned by the Burman force.

The Governor-General in Council desires to express in the strongest terms his obligations to Commodore Lambert, for the care, the energy and unwearied zeal which he has shown in directing the naval preparations for advance, and which have conduced so largely to the early and successful renewal of operations in the field.

His lordship in council begs to offer his thanks to Captain Loch, and to Commander Shadwell, for their conduct of the service on the river; and to Commander Rice, for his direction of the body of seamen upon shore.

His thanks are also due to Commander Campbell, of the Indian navy, whose merit has been acknowledged by the Commodore.

The Governor-General in Council has viewed with high approbation the services of the officers and men, who, upon this occasion and for several months past, have been employed in boats upon the river, subjected to severe exposure, and engaged in harassing duties, which they have performed with the utmost alacrity and cheerfulness, and with conspicuous advantage to the public service.

To the officers, seamen, and marines of Her Majesty's ships, of the Indian navy, and of the Bengal marine, who have been serving upon the Irrawaddy, and to Commander Tarleton, who long commanded them, the Governor-General in Council is desirous of offering his hearty thanks.

The Governor-General in Council has in like manner to assure Major-General Godwin of the satisfaction with which he has viewed the skill and judgment by which the Major-General enabled the troops to obtain possession of an important post, without delay, and with but little loss.

To Major Mayhew, Deputy Adjutant-General; to Major Allan, Deputy Quarter-Master-General; to Captain Smith, Interpreter; to Captain Burne, Military Secretary; and Captain Chads, A. D. C. the Governor-General in Council tenders his thanks.

Especially to Captain Christie and to Captain Welsh, of Her Majesty's 80th Regiment, for the gallant manner in which they led their men to the attack, and to all the officers, non-commissioned officers, and soldiers of the force, the Governor-General in Council desires to give assurance of his cordial approbation.

While thus congratulating the naval and military forces on the first result of their advance, the Governor-General in Council feels it to be due to the memory of an old and gallant sailor, that he should add a public expression of the deep regret with which he has received intimation of the death of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships in the Indian Seas.

Although Admiral Austen did not survive to witness the successful conclusion of the operations in which he had shared, the Governor-General in Council desires to record his admiration of the staunch high spirit which, notwithstanding his age and previous suffering, had led the Rear-Admiral to take his part in the trying service which has closed his career.

His Excellency Rear-Admiral Austen has afforded to the Government of India at all times a cordial and constant aid.

The Governor-General in Council has been grateful for his services, and laments his death.

Commodore Lambert, R.N., to Charles Allen, Esq.

H.M.S. Fox's Boat, on Board the Fire Queen, at Prome, October 11th, 1852.

SIR,

I REQUEST you may be pleased to inform the Governor-General in Council that, having embarked on board the East India Company's steam vessels under my orders H.M. 18th and 80th Regiments, the 35th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, a detachment of Sappers and Miners, and of the Bengal Artillery with their field guns, I despatched them as they were ready to rendezvous off Yangernsia, a town situated at the upper end of the Panglang Creek, which joins the Irrawaddy to the Rangoon River.

2. The Commissariat, Ordnance, and Engineers' stores, and about 1000 followers attached to the regiments, were conveyed in the steamers, large Burmese cargo boats, five small schooners and a barque.

The cargo boats, manned by Burmese crews, advanced in three divisions under convoy of the barges and pinnaces of Her Majesty's ships, Fox, Winchester, and Hastings; the barque and schooners were towed by the steamers.

3. These arrangements being completed, I left Rangoon on the 24th ultimo, and Major-General Godwin joined me on the following day at Yangernsia.

4. Having hoisted my broad pendant on board the Fire Queen, the steamer in which the Major-General embarked, I weighed from Yangernsia.

on September 27th with the steam squadron specified in enclosure No. 1, and proceeded up the Irrawaddy to Prome, calling at Henzadah on my way.

5. On the morning of the 9th of October Prome was in sight, and on the squadron nearing the city, the enemy opened fire with a couple of guns and musketry, which was returned by the steamers as we proceeded into the bay, where I anchored in a convenient position abreast of the town for landing the troops.

6. The enemy continuing to keep up a fire after we had anchored, I sent the boats of the squadron, under the command of Captain Loch, C.B., of Her Majesty's ship Winchester, to throw in a few shells and canister shot amongst them, which had the effect of silencing it for a time, although they kept up a very spirited fire on the boats, which wounded two seamen.

7. They then brought a gun down abreast of the Fire Queen, but had only time to give us one shot before it was dismounted by the fire from the steamers, which effectually cleared a landing place.

8. Major-General Godwin now expressed his wish to land the 80th Regiment and a party of artillery with two guns, at half-past 4, which was effected without any opposition, and the lower town cleared of the enemy.

9. At daylight next morning the remainder of the troops were landed, and a brigade of 50 seamen being formed under Commander Rice, at the Major-General's request, to assist in working the guns, the pagoda and other parts of the city were taken possession of, the Burmese flying as the forces advanced.

10. Thus the important city of Prome was occupied by British troops with the trifling loss of one killed and three wounded on the part of the army, while in the squadron only four were wounded, who are named in enclosure No. 2.

11. My thanks are due to Captain Loch, C.B., for the assistance he rendered me throughout these operations, also to Commanders Shadwell and Rice, of Her Majesty's ships Sphinx and Hastings, the former for his unremitting attentions to the instructions I had sent him previously to my entering the Irrawaddy, and to the latter officer for the part he took when on shore with the brigade of seamen. Nor can I speak too highly of Commander Campbell, the officers and men of the Indian navy and Bengal marine.

The skill and perseverance displayed by the officers and men belonging to the boats appointed to convoy the cargo-boats from Rangoon to Prome, a distance of more than 200 miles, against a rapid stream, exposed occasionally to a fire from the enemy, is deserving of my highest praise.

Major-General Godwin to C. Allen, Esq.

Sir, Prome, October 12, 1852.

THE Governor-General in Council was aware of my intention, at the proper season, when the monsoon here had in some measure subsided, to break up the Army at Rangoon, and remove its head-quarters to Prome.

I have now the honour to inform you that the first division of this force is in possession of that city.

After some weeks of preparation, the embarka-

tion commenced on the 16th of September, and the 1st division, amounting to 2300 men, and consisting of one company of the Madras Foot Artillery, with two 24-pounder howitzers and four 9-pounder guns, H.M. 18th Royal Irish, H.M. 80th Regiment, the 35th Regiment Madras N.I., and 119 Sappers, were all on board by the 25th idem.

The flotilla arrived off Prome on the morning of the 9th of October; each ship was cannonaded from a projecting point on the hills, as it rounded to the city, with very little effect. This fire was returned with much spirit by the steamers.

The weather here is so intensely hot, that I disembarked the Artillery under Brigadier Foord; H.M. 80th Regiment, under Lieutenant-Colonel Hutchinson, with the Sappers under Lieutenant Allen, on the evening of the same day; and, by sunrise the next morning, the 18th Royal Irish, under Lieutenant-Colonel Coote, and the 35th Madras N.I. under Lieutenant-Colonel Apthorp.

The enemy, consisting of three or four thousand men, occupied a very fine position on a range of hills about a thousand yards east from the point where they first opened fire, commanding the town and the large pagoda, which they also occupied.

The troops were landed in the evening, in a suburb to the north of, and beyond, the town. I then ordered them to advance towards the position I had selected for the night, when, upon the head of the column approaching a dry nullah dividing the suburb from the town, a very smart fire of musketry and jingalls was simultaneously opened from some jungle and houses on our left, and a small pagoda in our front.

The grenadiers of H.M. 80th Regiment, under Captain Christie, immediately advanced at the double towards the pagoda, and a party, consisting of two companies of the same regiment, under Captain Welsh, and accompanied by Brigadier Reynolds, were detached to the left, and in a very short time most gallantly drove the enemy out of their position, with the loss of only one man killed and a few wounded, Captain Welsh's party bringing in a jingall.

The grenadiers of the 80th Regiment kept possession of the pagoda, which I made the right of my position, and the troops had excellent cover during the night, which was passed in perfect quietude.

The following morning, when the remainder of the troops were landed, I advanced through the town in a direction I had determined upon the day before, from plans of the place in my possession, covered by the flank companies of the 18th Royal Irish and H.M. 80th Regiments, and two 24-pounder howitzers, which were drawn by a party of sailors, under Commander Rice, of H.M.S. Hastings. Upon our advanced guard reaching the pagoda, it found that the enemy had abandoned that position, as well as the heights beyond it, leaving in our possession an entirely evacuated town, overrun with thick and rank vegetation, and, I regret to add, abounding in swamps.

It is evident that the enemy expected our force to land, and advance up the direct road to the pagoda, along which they had erected two or three small breast-works, as well as removed the planking of several wooden bridges leading to the pagoda and the heights beyond it; but landing at the point we did, not only gave us an excellent road, but at the same time completely turned their position, rendering it impossible for them to hold it.

I have been for a long time aware of the assemblage of a large force about ten miles east of Prome, and at which place they also had a very formidable force in the last war, which took Sir Archibald Campbell several days to disperse. I

have ascertained, from very good authority, that they have now about 18,000 men well posted in two or more stockades.

It is not my intention to disturb them at present in any way, as by their concentration at that place the fine force now assembling here will have an opportunity of striking a blow which may put an end to much future opposition. It was on this Burmese Army that the enemy retreated from Prome upon our entering it. The bravery and alacrity of the troops on this occasion was as conspicuous as it ever is.

His Lordship's thanks are deserved by Captain Christie, of H.M. 80th Regiment, for the gallant manner in which he led his company to the attack and capture of the small pagoda in our front, and to Captain Welsh, who, with two companies of his regiment, drove the enemy out of their position on our left.

The general staff—Major Mayhew, Deputy Adjutant-General; Major Allan, Deputy Quartermaster-General; Captain Smith, Interpreter to the Force; as also my personal staff—Captain Burne, Military Secretary, and Lieutenant Chads, Aide-de-Camp, were active in rendering me every assistance.

Brigadier-General Sir John Cheape, commanding the Bengal division, came up to Prome with the portion of his division embarked, and was present throughout the whole of these operations; and I have great satisfaction in being enabled to leave him in command upon my return to Rangoon, where I am required, and for which place I shall leave this to-morrow.

I leave Major Fraser, of the Engineers, and Major Allan, Deputy Quartermaster-General, at Prome, to carry out the necessary arrangements for the reception of the regiments which will hereafter arrive.

To Commodore Lambert your Lordship is deeply indebted for the unremitting exertions, calling forth all possible resources, and anxious solicitude, which have accomplished the conveyance of the force to its destination up this noble, but most difficult to be navigated, river. To Commander Rice, for the exertions of himself and men under his command, I feel greatly indebted.

I have the honour to enclose a return of the casualties which have occurred during our operations before Prome, and to remain, &c.

STORNOWAY LIGHTHOUSE AND BEACON.

THE Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses
hereby give notice that a Lighthouse has
been built upon Arnish Point, at the entrance to
the Harbour of Stornoway in the Island of Lewis,
in the county of Ross, the Light of which will be
exhibited on the night of Saturday, 1st January
1853, and every night thereafter, from the going
away of daylight in the evening, till the return of
daylight in the morning.

*The following is a Specification of the Lighthouse,
and the Appearance of the Light, by the
Engineer to the Commissioners.*

The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 58° 11' 28", and
W. Long. 6° 22' 10". By Compass, the Light-
house bears from Chicken Head N.W. distant
about 3 nautic miles.

The Stornoway Light will be known to Mariners
as a Revolving Light which shews a bright White
Light once every half minute. The Light is
elevated 56 feet above the level of high-water of
ordinary spring tides, and may be seen at the
distance of about 10 miles, and at lesser distances
according to the state of the atmosphere; to a
near observer, in favourable circumstances, the
Light will not wholly disappear between the
intervals of greatest brightness. It illuminates
an arc from about N.N.E. to about N.W. by N.
 $\frac{1}{4}$ N. facing the entrance to Stornoway, and an
arc from about S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. to about E.S.E. facing
up the Harbour, the intervening arcs being
masked.

The Commissioners further give notice, that a
Beacon has been erected on a reef running out
from Arnish Point, placed about 200 yards from
the Lighthouse, on which a Light will be thrown
from the Lighthouse Tower; and from the top of
the Beacon an apparent or Reflected Light of low
power will, in favourable states of the weather, be
visible to Vessels entering the Bay.

The Commissioners hereby further give notice, that by virtue of a Warrant from the Queen in Council, dated 11th February 1851, the following Toll or Duty to be levied in respect of that Light, shall be as follows, viz. :—

“ wholly in ballast) which shall pass or derive benefit from the said Light at Stornoway, One Farthing per Ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said Light, if on a Coasting Voyage, and double the said Toll for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said Light, on an Oversea Voyage, and for every Foreign Vessel navigated as aforesaid not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective Tolls hereinbefore specified.”
