

cap. 38, for a Provisional Order upon the terms following :

To reduce the rate of interest on the mortgage debt charged or secured on the tolls or revenues of the said road from the sum of five pounds per centum per annum to the sum of two pounds per centum per annum, and to extinguish the whole of the arrears of interest due upon the said debt.

And whereas the said application, dated the eighteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, is signed by four of the said trustees, who therein certify that the persons entitled to more than two-thirds of the money charged or secured on the tolls of the said road, and remaining unpaid, have signified their consents in writing under their hands to the said application.

And whereas it appears desirable to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department that the aforesaid application should be granted upon the terms herein set forth.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority of the said Act of the 14th and 15th of Victoria, cap. 38, given to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, I do by this Provisional Order under my hand declare, subject to the confirmation hereof by Parliament, that from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, the rate of interest shall be reduced from five pounds to two pounds per centum per annum upon the mortgage debt of four thousand seven hundred and forty-five pounds, charged or secured upon the tolls of the said road, and that the whole of the arrears of interest due and remaining unpaid upon the said debt shall be extinguished.

NEW INNER LIGHT IN CORK HARBOUR, SOUTH COAST OF IRELAND.

THE Corporation for Preserving and Improving the Port of Dublin hereby give notice, that a Lighthouse has been erected on the Spit Bank, in Cork Harbour, from which a Light will be exhibited on the evening of the 1st of March 1853, and thereafter will be lighted every night from sun-set to sun-rise.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the Light by Mr. Halpin, Inspector of Lighthouses:—

Spit Bank Lighthouse is erected on the North East point of the bank, in lat. 51 deg. 50 min. 41 sec. N. and long. 8 deg. 16 min. 20 sec. W. and bears

The Lighthouse is placed in a depth of 9 feet water at low water, and is based on screw piles, forming, with the bracing, an open framing, coloured red. The superstructure in dwelling of octagonal form is coloured light grey.

The Light will be a fixed red light, elevated 32 feet over the level of high water, spring tides, and open to seaward and to the harbour, from S. S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to N. W. b W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

Masters of Vessels are cautioned not to cross the bank between the Lighthouse and Haulbowline Island, and to give the Lighthouse and the detached Beacon Pillar sufficient berth in passing.

After the 1st of March next, the floating light heretofore moored off the North East point of the bank, will be discontinued.

Bearings stated are Magnetic—Var. 28 deg. W.
