PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words and figures following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of King's Norton, in the county and diocese of Worcester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Moseley, in the said parish of King's Norton, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Moseley,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district is bounded on the west by the

parishes of Northfield and Edgbaston, as far as Edgbaston-lane, on the north by part of the parish of King's Norton, from which the said district chapelry is separated by a line proceeding easterly along the middle of Edgbaston-lane, as far as the turnpike-road, from Birmingham to Alcester, and then turning northerly proceeds up the middle of that road until it reaches a new road, made through fields Nos. 3912 and 3913 on the tithe apportionment map of the parish of King's Norton, when it takes an easterly and southerly course along the middle of the said new road as far as the fence which divides field No. 3919 from fields Nos. 3916 and 3921, on the said map, and then along such fence until it meets the Birmingham and Gloucester Railway, when it crosses over that railway to the fence, which divides fields Nos. 3942 and 3948, from fields Nos. 3941 and 3947, on the said map, when it proceeds along that fence until it arrives at Lady Pool-lane, and then crosses that lane over to the fence dividing fields Nos. 4037, 4036, 4034, and 4031 from fields Nos. 4039, 4040, 4064, and 4065, on the said map, and then proceeds along such fence easterly until it arrives at Stony-lane when it crosses such lane to the boundary line which separates the parish of King's Norton, from the parish of Yardley, the said district chapelry is then bounded on the east by the said parish of Yardley, as far as a road or lane called the Haunch-lane, numbered 3089 on the said map, and on the south is bounded by other part of the said parish of King's Norton, from which the said district chapelry is separated by a line proceeding westerly along the middle of the said lane called the Haunch-lane, until such lane meets another lane No. 3078, on the said map, and then along the middle of such last-mentioned lane until it enters the turnpike-road to Alcester, at a place called Alcester-lanes-end, it then crosses over such turnpike-road, and proceeds in a south-westerly direction, along the middle of the lane called King's Arms-lane, No. 2970 on the said map, and then proceeds along such lane south-westerly, until it reaches another lane, No. 2936 on the said map, then in a northerly direction up the middle of that lane to another lane called Black-lane, No. 2858 on the said map, then along the middle of that lane, south-westerly, until it meets a lane or fore-drove, No. 2805 on the said map, leading towards Bullie's-barn and cottage, it then proceeds along such lane or fore-drove, crossing the railway at or near a mile post marked G 48 on one face, and B 5 on the

other, till such boundary line arrives at a field, No. 2741 on the said map, then along the fence which divides the field and premises and the foredrove Nos. 2741, 2740, 2739, 2738, and 2736, from fields Nos. 2811 and 2812, the Foredrove and field No. 2819, all on the said map, till it reaches the Osier Bed and the boundary of Moundsley Yield, when it proceeds along such boundary by the main way till it arrives at the boundary line of the parishes of King's Norton and Northfield, as such district chapelry of Moseley is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary, at Moseley aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should belong and be paid to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Moseley, in the parish of King's Norton, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, in such church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.
