intituled "An Act to make better provision for "the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act 'to make better provision for the spiritual care of 'populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the Dean and the Chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle, and now yested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase-money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain "modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of poputious parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An 'Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of 'Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better 'provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes, and also for compensating certain spiritual persons whose emoluments have been diminished by reason of proceedings under the lastly-recited Act.

"Whereas by the first-recited Act it is enacted, that, except as therein otherwise specified, all the moneys and revenues to be paid to us, and all the rents and profits of the lands, tithes, and other hereditaments vested and to be vested in us by and under the authority of the same Act, together with all accumulations of interest produced by and arising therefrom, shall be from time to time carried over by us to a common fund, and by payments or investments made out of such fund, or if in any case it be deemed more expedient, by means of an actual conveyance and assignment of such lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of a portion thereof, additional provision shall be made by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by Orders of your Majesty in Council, ratifying schemes prepared by us,) for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required, in such manner as shall, by the like authority, be deemed most conducive to the efficiency of the established church; provided always, that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments to be vested in us, or out of the rents and profits thereof, due consideration shall be had of the wants and circumstances of the places in which such tithes now arise or have arisen:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the said common fund, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C, the fixed annual sum set opposite to the name of such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year; provided nevertheless, that the amount of the first payment on the first day of May next, in respect of each of the annual sums specified in the said schedule, shall be calculated from such date as according to the circumstances of each case shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the lands and premises particularly described and numbered in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked F, now vested in us for the purposes of the said Act, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the gazetting thereof, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the lands, situate in the parish of Allensmore, described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 1, shall be transferred to and vested in the Reverend Francis Baker, Vicar of Allensmore, in the county and diocese of Hereford, and his successors; the land, situate in the parish of Barton St. David, described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 2, shall be transferred to and vested in the Reverend Ebenezer Smith, Perpetual Curate of Barton St. David, in the county of Somerset and diocese of Bath and Wells, and his successors; the lands and premises described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 3, shall be transferred to and vested in the Reverend John Gibson, Perpetual Curate of Muggleswick, in the county and diocese of Durham, and his successors; the lands and premises described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 4, shall be transferred to and vested in the Reverend James Stovin, Vicar of Beckingham, in the county of Nottingham and diocese of Lincoln, and his surcessors; and the land and premises described in the same schedule, and therein numbered 5, shall, subject to the subsisting lease thereof, be transferred to and vested in the Reverend William Williamson, Vicar of Welton, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, and his successors.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit, when there shall be sufficient means for that purpose; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any benefice, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

that in making any such additional provision out of any tithes, or any lands or other hereditaments allotted or assigned in lieu of tithes, so vested or the assigning at any time, and from time to time.

to the incumbent of any church or chapel whose fees, dues, or other emoluments shall be diminished by or in consequence of any proceeding under the provisions of such secondly-recited Act, of such an annual sum as shall, upon due inquiry, appear to be a just and reasonable compensation for such diminution.

"And whereas by certain duly gazetted Orders of your Majesty in Council ratifying certain schemes prepared by us, pursuant to the same Act, the new parishes mentioned in the schedule hereunto annexed marked G., have been duly constituted, and the perpetual curates thereof respectively have become entitled to receive certain fees, dues, and other emoluments arising therein, and we deem it just and reasonable that compensation should be made to the incumbents, chaplains, or vicars hereinafter referred to, whose fees, dues, or other emoluments have been diminished by or in consequence of such proceedings, and that the annual sums hereinafter also referred to should be assigned to such incumbents, chaplains, or vicars respectively:

"We therefore further recommend and pro-

pose, that in respect of the new parishes mentioned in the first column of the said schedule hereunto annexed, marked G, there shall be paid by us, to the several spiritual persons, incumbents, chaplains, or vicars, named and described in the second column of the same schedule, so long as they shall respectively remain such incumbents, chaplains, or vicars, and no longer, the annual sums mentioned in the third column thereof, by way of such compensation as aforesaid, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year; and that the payment to be made in each case on the first day of May next shall be a sum calculated at the annual rate applicable to such cases from the day on which the fees, dues, and other emoluments became so as aforesaid receivable by the perpetual curates of such new parishes respectively.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for assigning the right of patronage of the new parish of Baldhu, in the county of Cornwall, and diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying such scheme), at any time to assign the right of patronage of any district or new parish constituted under the provisions of the said Act, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any ecclesiastical corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such

person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person or persons, contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as shall be approved by the like authority:

"And whereas by a scheme duly prepared and laid before your Majesty in Council by us, and an Order ratifying the same, made by your Majesty in Council, on the nineteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and duly gazetted, the district of Baldhu was duly constituted out of the parishes of Kenwyn and Kea, and the district of Chace-water, in the said county of Cornwall, and diocese of Exeter:

"And whereas by the said scheme and Order the right of patronage of the said district and the nomination of the minister thereof, for the first such nomination, was, for the consideration therein mentioned, assigned to and vested in the Right Honourable George Henry Earl of Falmouth, since deceased:

"And whereas, on the passing of the said scheme, it was agreed by us to recommend that the right of patronage of the said district and the nomination of the minister thereof should be assigned in perpetuity to the said George Henry Earl of Falmouth, and his heirs, upon condition of his providing a fit church for such district, and

also a repairing fund for such church:

"And whereas a church has since been provided within the said district by the said George Henry Earl of Falmouth, and such church has been duly approved by us, and consecrated as the church of the said district for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district has accordingly become, under the provisions of the said Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes:

"And whereas the said agreement has not yet

been carried into effect:

"And whereas a sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been provided by the Right Honourable Evelyn Viscount Falmouth, the heir-at-law, of the said George Henry Earl of Falmouth, to be applied, in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, as a permanent fund towards the repairs and maintenance of the fabric of the said church; and it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in pursuance of our said agreement, and in consideration of the premises, the patronage of the said new parish should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Whereas by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said Prebend of Grantham Australis will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of the said prebend, become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where

such assistance is most required:

Alteration of line during progress of Bill.

HEREAS a Bill is now pending in Parliament, intituled "A Bill to enable the London and North Western Railway Company to construct a railway from near Tring to Oxford, with a branch at Oxford, and for other purposes; and whereas during the progress of the said Bill, and since the deposit of the plans and sections therein referred to, which plans and sections were deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Oxford, at his office, in Oxford, in the month of November, in the year 1852, it has been found expedient with a view to meet the requirements of the committee of the House of Commons to whom the said Bill was referred for the protection of the Oxford Observatory, that the rail-way by the said Bill intended to be authorised should, between the points on the line of such

railway in the parishes of Marston, St. Giles, and Woolvercott, or the liberty or extra-parochial place of Godstow, hereinafter mentioned, be constructed according to a different line from that delineated upon the said plans deposited as aforesaid.
