HEREAS by an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England," it is, among other things, enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that the said Act be put in force in such county or counties as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit, and to divide the whole or part of any such county (including all counties of cities and counties of towns, cities, boroughs, towns, ports, and places, liberties and franchises therein contained or thereunto adjoining) into districts; and to order that the County Court should be holden for the recovery of debts and demands, under the said Act, in each of such districts; and, from time to time, to alter such districts as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit; and, from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to declare by what name, and in what towns and places, the County Court should be holden in each district:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council, of the ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order that the said Act be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas it hath been represented, that it would be to the advantage of the public, if the following alteration were made in certain of the districts of the Courts, as specified or set forth in the aforesaid Order:

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, so much of the district of the County Court of Brecknockshire, holden at Crickhowell,

as is included within a line drawn from the point where the three counties of Monmouth, Glamorgan and Brecon meet, northward along the boundary between the said counties of Glamorgan and Brecon to the place called Rhyd-y-Milwr (being the place where the boundary between the hundreds of Penkelly and Crickhowell, in the said county of Brecon, meets the said boundary of the county of Glamorgan); thence in a straight line in a north-easterly direction across the mountain called Trefil Ddû to the place called the Duke's Table, being at or near the source of the river Sirhowy; thence in a straight line in an easterly direction across the mountain called Trefil Glas, and Llangattock Hills to a stone boundary-post standing on the bank of Clydach Brook, a little to the north of the Farm House called Blaen Clydach; thence first in a south-easterly direction, and thence in an easterly direction, along the middle of the said last-mentioned brook or river to the mouth of a certain brook called Llamarch Brook, which empties itself into the Clydach Brook or river; and thence in a southerly direction up the middle of the course of the said Llamarch Brook to where it meets the northern boundary of the county of Monmouth; thence westward along the said northern boundary of the county of Monmouth to the point where the three counties of Monmouth Glamorgan and Brecon meet as first described, sha'i be within and form part of the district of the County Court of Monmouthshire holden at Tredegar.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle-' siastical Duties and Revenues,' and also in pursunnce of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesias-'tical Commissioners for England,' and also in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better 'provision for the spiritual care of populous 'parishes' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing an arrangement respecting all the estates in the parish of Saint Pancras, in the county of Middlesex, formerly belonging to the Prebend of Saint Pancras, in the cathedral church of Saint Paul, London, and now vested in us, subject to the leasehold interest therein vested in the representatives of the late William Agar, Esquire, deceased, and respecting the money to be paid to us by way of compensation for our interest in certain portions of the same estate taken by certain railway companies under the authority of certain Acts of Parliament duly authorizing them in that behalf.

"Whereas it is by the said lastly mentioned Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or other

"And whereas a provisional arrangement has been entered into by us (subject to the approval of your Majesty in Council) with the representa-tives of the said William Agar, that in consideration of a yearly rent charge of one thousand two hundred pounds, and of such further yearly sum, if any, as shall be sufficient to make up with the said yearly sum of one thousand two hundred pounds, three equal fifth parts of the net yearly income arising from the annual rents and profits of the said prebendal estate in the parish of Saint Pancras, and from the dividends and interest of the railway compensation moneys therein mentioned, after providing thereout for the improvement and management of the said prebendal estate to be granted and secured to William Talbot Agar, Esquire, his executors, administrators, and assigns, on behalf of the said representatives for the term of eighty years, to be computed from the twentyfourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, the representatives of the said William Agar shall concur with us in surrendering and conveying the whole of the said estates so as that the same may become vested in us in fee simple in possession, subject to the reservation to such representatives of a term or interest in certain parts thereof, with suitable provisions for securing the said rent charge, but subject to proper powers and provisions for enabling us to dispose of and manage the said estates according to the purposes of the said Acts.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act, passed in the first and second years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual the Church Building Acts," and extended by the third section of an Act, passed in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in

Council a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the district parish of Saint Peter, Pimlico, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Gabriel, situate in or near Warwick-square, in the said district parish of Saint Peter, Pimlico, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the 'last session of Parliament for building and pro-'moting the building of additional churches in 'populous parishes,' as enlarged by the twelfth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual the 'Church Building Acts,' and extended by the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the 'Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Gabriel, Pimlico,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Commencing at the River Thames, at the mouth of the Grosvenor Canal, it then proceeds in a northerly direction as far as Ebury Bridge; then in a south-easterly and easterly direction along the middle of Saint George's-row, to the termination thereof; and then northerly to Warwick-street, proceeding in an easterly direction along the middle of Warwick-street, as far as Tachbrook-street, and then along the middle of Tachbrook-street in a south-easterly direction to the termination thereof; and then through the Gas Works, following the line of the sewer to the River Thames; and then in a westerly direction along that river to the point where the boundary commenced, which said district chapelry of Saint Gabriel, Pimlico, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or per-formed in the said church of Saint Gabriel, Pimlico, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be equally divided between the Reverend Thomas Fuller, Master of Arts, the present Incumbent of the said district parish of Saint Peter, Pimlico, and the Minister or Incumbent of the said Church of Saint Gabriel, during such time as the said Thomas Fuller should remain Incumbent of the said district parish of Saint Peter, Pimlico, and that upon his avoidance thereof, the whole of the said fees should belong to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said church of Saint Gabriel.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the several Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, and also the consent of the said Thomas Fuller (as

such incumbent as aforesaid of the said district parish of Saint Peter, Pimlico), as required by the Act and section secondly hereinbefore mentioned, in order that the sub-division of such district parish, by forming thereout a district chapelry as aforesaid, should take effect from the assignment of such district chapelry, in testimony whereof the said Charles James, Bishop of London, and Thomas, Fuller, have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the said consecrated church of Saint Gabriel, Pimlico, be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

A CHAPTER of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, having been summoned for this day, the following Knights Brethren, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Palace;

The Earl of Aberdeen, the Duke of Roxburghe, the Earl of Rosebery, the Earl of Mansfield, the Duke of Montrose, and the Earl of Camperdown, attended by the undermentioned Officers of the Order, in their mantles and wearing their chains and badges; viz.: Sir John-Stewart Richardson, Bart., Secretary of the Order, and Frederic-Peel Round, Esq., Gentleman Usher of the Green

At three o'clock the Knights Brethren were called over by the Secretary, when (Her Majesty and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert having passed into the Throne-room) they proceeded, with the Officers of the Order, into the presence of the Sovereign.

The Queen being seated in the chair of state, and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert at the table on the right hand of Her Majesty, the Sovereign was pleased to command the other Knights Brethren to take their seats at the table, according to their seniority in the Order, the Officers of the Order standing in their places at the bottom of the table.

The Sovereign was then pleased to signify Her royal pleasure touching the election of a Knight into the Order; whereupon the Knights Brethren proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Secretary (commencing with the junior Knight), were by him, kneeling, presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to declare, that the Right Honourable Archibald-William, Earl of Eglinton, had been duly elected l a Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

Then, by command of the Sovereign, the Earl of Eglinton was received, at the door of the Chapter-room, by the Duke of Montrose and the Earl of Camperdown, the two junior Knights Brethren present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by the Secretary (bearing on a velvet cushion the ensigns of the Order) and by the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod.

The sword of state being thereupon delivered to the Sovereign, by His Royal Highness the Prince Albert, the senior Knight, the Earl of Eglinton, kneeling near the Queen, was knighted therewith; after which his Lordship had the honour to kiss Her Majesty's hand; the Earl rising, the oath was administered to his Lordship by the Secretary.

The Earl of Eglinton, then again kneeling, and the Secretary, on his knee, presenting to Her Majesty the ribband and jewel of the Order, the Queen was graciously pleased to place the same over the Earl's left shoulder.
