# PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the ninth and tenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to amend an Act for regulating the sale of "waste land belonging to the Crown in the "Australian Colonies, and to make further pro-"vision for the management thereof," after reciting that it might be expedient that various rules and regulations should be made respecting the more effectually making demises or licences for any term of years, not exceeding fourteen, of any such waste lands as therein mentioned, and respecting the reservation on such demises or licences of any such rents or other pecuniary services, and respecting the insertion therein of such conditions and clauses of forfeiture as are therein mentioned, and respecting any other matters and things which might be requisite either for carrying into more complete effect the occupation in manner therein mentioned of such waste lands as aforesaid, or for preventing the abuses incident thereto, it was enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to make and establish all such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty should seem meet for the purposes aforesaid, or for any of them, and any such rules and regulations again to repeal, renew, alter, and amend; and that all such Orders in Council should have the force and effect of law in the colonies aforesaid.

And whereas Her Majesty, by an Order in Council, dated the nineteenth June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, did establish certain rules and regulations relative to the occupation of the waste lands of the Crown in the colony of South Australia, more particularly with reference to pastoral purposes.

And whereas it is expedient that additional rules and regulations, as hereinafter contained, should now be made and established for demising lands supposed to contain minerals, not auriferous, and for working the same. It is hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, that within the said colony of South Australia it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said colony to demise lands supposed to contain minerals, not auriferous,

same, on the following conditions:-

- 1. The extent of land so to be granted shall be fixed from time to time by the Governor, with the advice of his Council.
- 2. That the term of the lease shall be for a term not exceeding fourteen years, at a rental of ten shillings per acre per annum, payable yearly in advance. The lessee, on payment of such rent in advance, being entitled to the right of search during the first year, and to the option of giving up the lease. The lease to date from the commencement of the second
- 3. Any person claiming a lease on the above conditions who shall remove, or cause to be removed, any ore from the land before a lease thereof shall be accepted by him, shall forfeit his claim thereto.
- 4. At the termination of the lease, the land shall be open to sale, by public auction, to the highest bidder.
- 5. Should the land not be purchased by the lessee, the value (to be estimated) of any improvements he may have made, or buildings he may have erected thereon, will be added to the upset price of the land, and he will be allowed compensation for the same, if sold.
- 6. The lease to become void and forfeited if the rent is not duly paid in advance, and if the land is not bona fide applied to mining purposes. And it is further ordered that the terms defined in the Order in Council of the nineteenth June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, whenever they herein occur, shall respectively have the same significations as in the aforesaid Order in Council.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An "Act for the better amendment of the Church "Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words following;

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Saint Chad and Saint Alkmund, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop, and diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said two parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Bieton, in the said parish of Saint Chad, Shrewsbury, under and by virtue of the power and authority for such purpose, contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further accordance. for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The 'Consolidated Chapelry of Bicton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The consolidated chapelry of Bicton is bounded on the north-west, north, and north-east, by the river Severn; on the south-east, by the parish of Saint Julian, Shrewsbury, and the township of Shelton and Oxon, and the township of Woodcott and Horton, in the said parish of Saint Chad, Shrewsbury; on the south, by part of the said township of Woodcott and Horton, and by the parish of Pontesbury; and on the south-west, by the parish of Ford, which said consolidated chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pink and green.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and also the consent of the Right Honourable Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (Patron, in right of the Crown, of the parish churches of the said parishes of Saint Chad and Saint Alkmund, Shrewsbury), have been obtained to the formation of the said con-solidated chapelry of Bicton, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the said Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, as such Patron as aforesaid, in right of the Crown, of the said parish churches of Saint Chad and Saint Alkmund, Shrewsbury, is willing, and has agreed, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said John Bishop of Lichfield, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Bicton aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said parish church of the said parish of Saint Chad, Shrewsbury.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners, therefore,

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the "further amendment of the Church Building Acts," as enlarged and extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fiftythree, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the consolidated chapelry of Highgate, the parish of Saint Pancras, and the district chapelry of Kentish Town, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said consolidated chapelry of Highgate, the said parish of Saint Pancras, and the said district chapelry of Kentish Town, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint Anne, situate at Brookfield, in the said consolidated chapelry of Highgate, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged and extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act of Parliament passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Church Building 'Acts;' and that the same should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Anne, Brookfield, Highgate Rise,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously mentioned; that is to say: to commence in pleased to take the premises into your royal confootway leading from Maiden lane aforesaid, to the gates of the Highgate Cemetry, thence passing along the said footway in a south-westerly direction to the said gates, thence in a southerly direction to the south-east corner of the said cemetery, thence in a south-westerly direction along the southern wall of the said cemetery to the south-west corner thereof, thence in the same direction along the southern side of the pleasure grounds of Holly Lodge, belonging to Miss Burdett Coutts, to the turnpike-road known as Highgate-hill, leading from Kentish Town to Highgate, thence in the same direction across the said turnpike-road and along the southern wall of the entrance lodge, to certain premises in the occupation of John Lawrence Tatham, thence in a southerly direction along the eastern boundary of such last-mentioned premises, thence in a westerly direction along the southern boundary of such last-mentioned premises to Millfield-lane, thence in a north-westerly direction up Millfieldlane to a certain footway leading from Millfieldlane aforesaid across two certain fields belonging to William David Earl of Mansfield, the one called or known as the Four Acre Field, and the other called or known as the Clump Field, to Hampstead Heath, thence in a westerly direction along such footway to Hampstead Heath aforesaid, thence in a southernly direction along the eastern sides or hedges of the said Clump Field and three other fields belonging to the said Earl, and called or known as the Eighteen Acre Field, the Parliament Hill Field, and the Park Field, the same being also the boundary line of the parishes of Saint Pancras and Hampstead, thence in an easterly direction along the south-eastern side or hedge of the said Park Field and of certain land known as the Saint Pancras Church Land, to the western corner of a certain other field belonging to the said Earl, called or known as the Home Field, thence in a south-easterly direction along the south western sides or hedges of the said Home Field, and of a certain paddock belonging to certain premises of the said Earl and known as the Gothic, thence in a north-easterly direction along the southern boundary of the said lastmentioned premises to the aforesaid turnpike-road, thence in the same direction across the said turnpike-road and along the front or southern side of the premises at the north end of Grove-terrace, in the occupation of Mr. Mainson, thence in the same direction along the northern wall or boundary of No. 27, Grove-terrace aforesaid, in the occupation of Thomas Seddon, thence in a straight line north-easterly with such last-mentioned wall along the southern side or hedge of a certain field belonging to the Earl of Dartmouth, and now in the occupation of Mr. Edward Lawrance, or his undertenant, to a certain brook or ditch called or known as the Fleet, thence in a south-easterly direction along the said brook or ditch to the southern corner of a certain field belonging to the Master and Wardens of St. John's College, Cambridge, thence in a north-easterly direction along the southern sides or hedges of such last-men-tioned field, and of another field belonging to the said Master and Wardens to Maiden-lane aforesaid, and thence in a north-westerly direction up and along Maiden-lane aforesaid to the said footway in Maiden-lane where the boundary commenced, and as such consolidated chapelry of Saint Anne, Brookfield, Highgate Rise, is more particularly delineated in the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured blue, pink,

and green.
"That the consents of the Right Honourable Rishop of the

said diocese of London, and also patron (in right of his see) of the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Highgate, of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, London, patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Saint Pancras, and of the Reverend Thomas Dale, vicar and incumbent of such last named parish church, and patron (in right of his vicarage) of the church of the said district chapelry of Kentish Town, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Anne, Brookfield, Highgate Rise, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Charles James, Bishop of London, and Thomas Dale, have signed and sealed this representation; and the said Dean and Chapter have caused their common seal to be hereto affixed.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Charles James, Bishop of London, the said Dean and Chapter, the said Thomas Dale, as such respective patrons as afore-said (testified as aforesaid) and Anne Barnett, of Highgate Rise, in the said county of Middlesex Spinster (in whom, her heirs and assigns, the right of presentation and appointment of a minister, to serve the said church of Saint Anne, at Brookfield aforesaid, is now vested, under the powers contained in the twenty-third section of the Act of Parliament firstly hereinbefore mentioned, as amended by the fourth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the law relative to the assignment of ecclesiastical districts'), testified by her signing and sealing this representation (with the appro-bation of your Majesty's said Commissioners testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said Charles James, Bishop of London, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint Anne, at Brookfield aforesaid, shall during the life of her, the said Anne Barnett, be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by her, the said Anne Barnett, and from and after her decease, then such right of presentation and appointment as aforesaid shall become vested in, belong to, and shall be exercised, whenever occasion may require, by the Bishop of the said Diocese of London for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

His Lordship in Council, regretting the loss that has been incurred, fully appreciates the service that has been done, and he requests the Major-General Commanding the troops in Ava, to convey to Brigadier-General Sir John Cheape, to the officers and soldiers whom he has specially named, and to all who were under his command, the approbation and cordial thanks of the Supreme Govern-

Extract of a letter from Major-General H. Godwin, C.B., Commanding the Forces in Ava, Arracan, and the Tenasserim Provinces, to C. Allen, Esq., Secretary to the Government of India, April 1st, 1853.

I HAVE the honour to forward, for the information of the Governor-General in Council, reports from Sir J. Cheape, dated the 13th and 25th ultimo, detailing the proceedings of his force since his report of the 3rd ultimo, forwarded in my despatch, of the 15th instant.

The Governor-General in Council will see and appreciate this most arduous service; protracted as it has been from time to time by the difficult nature of the country, added to which unwilling, if not false guides, leading him in wrong directions.

The Brigadier-General so forcibly represents his various attacks, and the gallantry of the troops on every occasion, that I can add nothing more than my high sense and appreciation of their admirable conduct.

Extract of a Despatch from Brigadier General Sir J. Cheape, K. C. B., Commanding the Bengal Division, to the Deputy Adjutant-General of the Army of Ava.

Donabew, March 25th, 1853. WHILE at Kyomtano I ascertained the jungle to the westward to be quite impenetrable, and that there were only two routes to Kyomenzeen, one to the Southward via Gyet-thoun-zeen, and the other to the northward, by Ngyoung-youn; the distance by these routes was said to be about equal, and the same opposition and obstacles were to be expected by either. I resolved to follow the latter route.

| ning of the 17th instant, at 2 P.M., I sent on the right wing under Major Wigstone, 18th R. I., consisting of H. M.'s 18th R. I. Regiment, H. M.'s 80th Regiment, and the 4th Seikh Local Regiment, with a detail of Sappers and some rockets, to take post at a breastwork about three miles in advance, in the middle of the forest and on the verge of a large lake. It was of importance to clear the road so far, to enable the force to march early next morning without waiting for the fog to clear off.

Major Wigstone found the road clear till within about a mile of the breastwork; he had then to cut his way through many obstructions, and to open the road round felled trees and to clear away abattis. On reaching the breastwork, he found it occupied, and it was most gallantly carried by the 18th R. I. who were leading, and by the 4th Seikh Local Regiment in support; several jingals and arms of different sorts were captured. Major Armstrong, 4th Seikh Local Regiment, on this ? occasion personally distinguished himself, and I beg to send a copy of Major Wigstone's letter of date the 20th instant, reporting most favourably of the conduct of the troops. A prisoner was taken upon this occasion, who was of some use in our further advance in describing and pointing out the enemy's position.

Major Wigstone bivouacked here for the night and was undisturbed; and early next morning (the 18th instant), I moved on with the force from Kyomtano, carrying seven days' provisions. passed Major Wigstone's party, and moved with our left wing, under Lieutenant-Colonel Sturt, consisting of H. M's 51st K. O. L. I., and the 67th B. N. I. in front, followed by the guns, and irregular cavalry, and leaving the right wing to bring up the rear and to furnish the rear guard.

As the road was greatly obstructed and the progress slow, I took the opportunity to send back to Kyomtano, with some irregulars, the sick and wounded of Major Wigstone's party; the escort rejoined us again with the empty doolies.

After going about two miles through forest and passing breastworks from which only an occasional shot was fired, our guides, instead of going further by the road we had traversed on the 11th instant, turned sharp off to the left; along this path the obstructions and felled trees continued for about a mile, and the road was so rough that one of the ammunition waggons was overturned and the pole broken; it was necessary to leave it, and the ammunition boxes were packed on spare hackeries.

We arrived at noon at a piece of water on our right, where I halted for an hour to refresh the men; and at 1 P.M., we moved on; the obstructions were very great, and it occupied about two hours getting a mile further; there was some firing also, and the enemy were reported to be in a position close at hand.

We at last had a very sharp fire opened on us from the left. A fire had been lighted in that quarter to obscure the vision, and the whole place was obstructed and entangled with abattis in front and along the left; part of the 67th N. I., with the rifles, engaged the enemy to the left; and we managed to clear the path to the front so as to advance the 51st K. O. L. I., and to bring the guns and rockets to bear upon the enemy, whose position, however, was so covered and hidden that we could only judge of it from the direction of the fire on our troops.

The road or path was at length sufficiently cleared, and the charge was ordered; the breastwork was most gallantly carried by H. M's 51st It was desirable to give the enemy as little K. O. L. I., and the 67th N. I., Captain Singleton, time as possible for preparation, and on the eve- 51st Regiment, leading the advance. Ensign

Boileau, of the 67th N. I. was, I regret to say, killed, while gallantly attacking the enemy on our left flank.

The enemy's loss I was unable to ascertain, but his force here consisted of 1,000 men, with one gun, which was carried off, and Myat-toon was present in person. This I learned from a prisoner who was taken.

We lost no time in following up the enemy, but, after proceeding along an open road for about a mile, I thought it advisable, it being nearly 5 P.M., to halt at a piece of water, Ngyoung-Kymug, said to be distant about three miles from Kyomtano, but with a heavy jungle intervening, in which the

enemy were reported to be in force.

At 8 p.m. I fired, at the request of Captain Smith, Deputy Commissioner, three signal rockets, for the information of Captain Fytche, who had promised to cooperate to the westward and northward of Kyomcazeen; they were replied to by guns; and during the night, on the report that the enemy were felling trees close in our front, a few shot and shells were fired at them, with good effect I believe.

On the morning of the 19th instant, at 7 A.M., we moved on, the right wing leading, and the left wing in rear of the Artillery. H. M. 80th Regiment formed the advance guard, and was followed by the Sappers clearing the road; the enemy's position was described as being at Na-young-Goun-lya, the head of the piece of water on our right, and along the edge of which or very near it the road lay. I expected to find the enemy posted on the opposite bank, and that we should have to come under a flanking fire before being able to reach his right and turn the position where the nullah is dry. It did not seem reasonable to expect that his left flank would be found unprotected, and I, therefore, did not think it worth while to pass a party across the water to try that flank; it would have been useless, as I afterwards found that an extensive and impassable marsh, though invisible from our side, covered his left flank; the forest was so dense on our left that to cut a new road direct from the nullah, entirely round the enemy's right, would have been very laborious, and would have occupied a very long time, and the sickness amongst our troops had became so alarming that great danger would have accrued from the delay. I was withal unwilling to diverge from the path our guides led us; there had been already so much uncertainty and difficulty about finding the road, that it seemed the safest plan to get at the enemy as speedily as we could, and I trusted to a rapid advance, supported by our guns and rockets, and relied on carrying the enemy's breastwork on the right the moment we should reach it.

On coming opposite his left flank, the firing commenced, and here our rockets were advanced and opened fire; the 4th Seikh Local Regiment were sent on to support the 80th Regiment, and the 18th Royal Irish in support of them; the Sappers worked away at the path, which was much entangled with wood, and the guns were shortly got into position and opened; the firing had, however, become very heavy, and it was reported to me that Major Wigstone was wounded. On reaching the front I found that Major Armstrong was also wounded, as well as many other officers and men, and that the fire of the enemy on the path leading up to the breastwork was so heavy, that our advanced party had not succeeded in carrying it; the most strenuous exertions were made, and Lieutenant Johnson, the only remaining officer of the 4th Seikh Local Regiment, persevered most bravely, but it only increased the

loss. The 80th and Seikhs then went on in the hopes of getting round the extreme right of the enemy; the jungle, however, was so thick, and the abattis so strong, that our men got dispersed, and could not get through it.

It was at this point that the 18th Royal Irish came up, and the fire of musketry and grape was so heavy, that they also got scattered and sustained great loss. Lieutenant Cockburn was wounded. I was here joined by Major Holdich, now in command of the Right Wing.

Although it was difficult from the dense smoke, and under so heavy a fire, to discern exactly what was between us and the breastwork to be assailed, I succeeded, at last, in ascertaining that there was no water, and no obstacle that could not be easily surmounted, if the troops could pass through the enemy's fire, a distance of only 20 or 30 yards. The "assembly" was accordingly sounded, with a view of getting together as many men of the right wing as could be collected.

In the mean time Major Reid, of the Artillery, brought up in the most gallant manner his 24-pounder howitzer. It was dragged through the bushes by the hand, chiefly by men of the 51st Regiment, and opened within 25 yards of the enemy with marked effect; it was, however, in a much exposed position, and I regret to say Major Reid was almost immediately wounded: the fire from this gun was kept up in the most spirited manner by Lieutenant Ashe.

Finding the right wing much weakened from the loss they had sustained, and the number of men it was necessary to employ as skirmishers on the bank of the nullah, for the purpose of keeping down the enemy's fire, I ordered a reinforcement from the left wing, they were joined by the men of the right wing that had been collected by Major Holdich, and who were led by Ensign Wolsely, and the whole advanced in a manner that nothing could check. The fire was severe, and I am grieved to say, that gallant young officer, Lieutenant Taylor, 9th M. N. I., doing duty with H. M.'s 51st K.O.L.I., fell mortally wounded. Ensign Wolsely, H. M.'s 80th Regiment, was also struck down, as well as many other gallant soldiers; but the breastwork was at once carried, and the enemy fled in confusion, the few who stood being shot or bayoneted on the entrance of our men.

Lieutenant Trevor, of the Engineers, with Corporal Livingstone and Private Preston, of H. M.'s 51st K. O.L.L, first entered the enemy's breastwork, the two former each shooting down one of the enemy opposing their entrance. The lead devolved on them, and on Sergeant Preston, of H. M.'s 51st K. O. L. I., and Serjeant-Major Quin, of H. M.'s 80th, when Lieutenant Taylor, Ensign Wolsely, and Colour-Serjeant Dunahoe, fell in the advance.

Our two guns, which fell into the enemy's hands on the 4th of last month, were here recaptured; they had been fired with the most deadly effect, and were well served to the last; in attempting to carry off one of them 12 men were left dead by a discharge from our 9-pounder gun.

The enemy sustained, I understand, a heavy loss in killed and wounded. His whole force and means were concentrated in this position, and I imagine he must have had about 4,000 men in these breastworks, which extended 1,200 yards in length.

The Chief, I am sorry to say, escaped, but I lost no time in sending on Major Cotton, of the 67th N.I., with 100 men of his own regiment and 100 of the 51st K.O.L.I., under Captain Irby, to Kyomtano, about two miles distant. Here they

found Captain Fytche on the opposite bank of the nullah.

Myat-toon's force being broken up and dispersed, it remained for Captain Fytche and Captain Smith, the Deputy Commissioners, to take measures for his pursuit and apprehension. Parties of Captain Fytche's Kareens were immediately detached for the purpose; the report brought in stated that he was moving about with merely a few followers in different quarters; and a number of his principal followers surrendered themselves.

The inhabitants, of whom there was a very large number, probably 10,000 to 20,000, had concealed themselves in the jungle, but began to come in on the 20th, and, under directions from Captain Fytche, commenced to move off, with such property as they had, in boats, of which there were an immense number in the creek or nullah.

He had given them notice of his intention to burn the place down immediately on our leaving it.

On the morning of the 20th, Captain Tarleton, R.N., to whom I had forwarded intimation on the previous day of our having forced Myat-toon's position, arrived at Kyomcazeen, with several boats. He had been long lying at the mouth of the creek with steamers and gun-boats to cut off Myat-toon's retreat in that direction.

His cooperation was now most valuable, and the exertions of his officers and men must have been very great, in cutting through felled trees thrown across a narrow nullah, and in removing stakes and obstructions of every description impeding the passage along a distance of 15 miles.

Difficulties and impediments seemed to vanish before him and his boats' crews, and by 1 r.m. of the 21st we had a sufficient number of the boats found in the nullah prepared for the conveyance of our sick and wounded men and of our Artillery. The whole started off, were shipped on board the steamer on the following morning, and carried up to Donabew the same day; every bad case of the "Phelegethon" on passing Yandoon, which vessel was dispatched to Rangoon. Such dispatch, under no ordinary difficulties, seems to me well worthy of being recorded.

We reached Kyomtano on the night of the 22nd, and Akyo on the following day, and on the evening of the 24th, the whole force, with baggage and stores, had arrived at Donabew.

I grieve to say the sickness was very great from cholera, in particular at Kyomtano. A return is appended of the loss we have sustained from sickness as well as in engagements with the enemy.

A return of the captured ordnance is also forwarded. The guns and rocket tube belonging to the steamers have been made over to Captain Tarleton.

I propose to embark immediately with the whole of the troops, and return to Prome. Such of the men as cannot be conveyed in the steamers, will proceed in country boats.

I trust the manner in which the service has been performed, will be approved of by the Major-General;—Myat-toon's force has been dispersed and scattered; his guns taken, and his stronghold and villages, containing his supplies and resources, burnt down, and the population removed; he himself is a fugitive and an outlaw; and although he will probably be joined by some of the worst and most desperate characters amongst his former followers, he will never be able to regain his former importance and power, and will, no doubt;

ere long, be captured by the exertions and vigilance of the civil authorities.

On the conclusion of this service it is my duty to bring to the notice of the Major-General the excellent conduct of the troops.

Major Reid, and the officers and men of the Artillery, have rendered the most efficient service during the whole of the operations, and the brave and gallant manner in which the guns were brought forward and worked on the 19th instant, will, I trust, receive the especial notice of the Major-General.

To Lieutenant McGrath, who was slightly wounded, and Lieutenants Ashe and Dobbin, my acknowledgements are due for their gallant conduct, and also to Mr. Conductor Lisby, who was always in advance with the rockets, which he fired on every occasion with such precision and effect, as to be of essential service to us; he was, I am grieved to say, very severely wounded after firing almost his last rocket on the 19th instant; he may, I trust, recover, and I would recommend him most strongly to the Major-General's notice and the favour of Government.

To Lieutenant Mullins, and the detachment of Madras Sappers and Miners, the greatest praise is due; the work executed by the men was most laborious, and the zeal and talent with which their energies were directed by Lieut. Mullins, are most creditable to him. He was ably seconded by Lieut. Trevor, and I am mainly indebted to these officers and the men under them for enabling the troops to reach the enemy's position.

To Lieut.-Col. Sturt, commanding the left wing of the force, and to Major Wigstone, commanding the right wing, my best acknowledgments are due, for the aid I have received from them, and for the gallant manner in which they brought their troops into action.

I beg to bring to the Major-General's notice Major Holdich, H.M.'s 80th Regiment, Major Cotton, 67th N.I., Major Armstrong, 4th Seikh Local Regiment, Captain Irby, H.M.'s 51st K.O.L.I., and Captain Armstrong, of H.M.'s 18th R.I. Regiment, and the officers and men of the detachments under their respective commands: the whole of them behaved with great gallantry, and are entitled to my best acknowledgments.

My best thanks are due to Captain Bruce, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General, for the able manner in which he has performed his duties, and for the assistance he has afforded me on every occasion.

To Captain Garden, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, I have to tender my best acknowledgments, for the very efficient aid I have received from him in his department, the duties of which have been very arduous.

I would bring to the notice of the Major-General Lieutenant Pilmer, H.M.'s 51st K.O.L.I., Brigade Quartermaster 1st Madras Brigade, who, by permission, accompanied this expedition. He has rendered the most essential service to the force, in carrying orders and in seeing them executed, in many cases of emergency and urgency, and has undergone great fatigue and shown much zeal for the service. He is a most able Staff Officer, and I would recommend him strongly to the Major-General's notice.

Lieutenant Thompson, my Aide-de-Camp, has been of the greatest service to me, and has shown great intelligence as well as displayed great gallantry, and I would recommend him strongly to the notice and favour of the Major-General.

To Surgeon Andrews, 67th N. I., and the Medical department, I have to return my best thanks for the performance of their very arduous

duties in the care of the sick and wounded; and to Assistant-Surgeon Murphy, Staff Surgeon to the Division, in particular, my special thanks are due; he was the senior medical officer until the arrival of the reinforcements from Rangoon, and all the arrangements made by him have been most perfect. On the 19th instant, the wounded men were attended to by him under a very heavy fire, and though wounded (I am happy to say very slightly), it did not deter him a moment from the zealous discharge of his duties; he has performed them throughout in the most unwearied and able manner, accompanying the men in the boats to the steamers, and seeing them carefully attended to and disposed of: I consider the force fortunate indeed in having a medical officer of his talent and character in such trying circumstances, and I feel assured the Major-General will accord his approbation of the services of this officer.

The deficiency in the Commissariat Department was supplied from Rangoon, Lieutenant McKellar being sent from thence. The duties have been most ably and creditably performed by this officer; and the force, ever since his arrival, has been most regularly and amply supplied with provisions, although under circumstances of great difficulty from want of transport. His very efficient subordinate, Mr. Conductor Horton, I am grieved to say, died on the march from Kyomtano, on the 18th instant, of cholera, brought on, I fear, by over exertion and fatigue in the discharge of his He was a most energetic officer, and is a duties. loss to the service.

Captain Smith, the Deputy Commissioner, has accompanied the force throughout this service, and has been most zealous in obtaining for us

every aid the country could supply.

The cooperation of the Naval force has been most effective, and has conduced greatly to the success of the expedition; and I feel deeply indebted to Commodore Lambert, and to Captain Tarleton and his officers and men, for the aid and assistance they have so promptly given us on every opportunity or occasion of difficulty.
