This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to impose additional duties on spirits in Scotland and Ireland; and to alter the countervailing duties on spirits, the manufacture of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, or Sark, imported into Scotland or Ireland, and the countervailing duties and drawbacks on the removal of certain mixtures and compounds between Scotland, Ireland, and England respectively; and to amend the laws relating to the collecting and securing the duties of excise upon spirits.

An Act to make provision concerning the future regulation of certain appointments connected with cathedral and collegiate churches, and concerning certain of the estates of the deans and chapters of York and Carlisle.

An Act to extend the remedies for the compensation of malicious injuries to property in Ireland.

An Act to repeal the duties, allowances, and drawbacks of excise on soap.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Thomas Marriott, late of Bowden, in the parish of Henstridge, in the county of Somerset, but now of Horsington, in the same county, Clerk, Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with the direction contained in the last will and testament of his maternal uncle, William Manning Dodington, late of Horsington, in the county of Somerset, Esquire, deceased, take and use the surname of Dodington, in addition to and after the surname of Marriott, and that they may also assume and use the arms of Dodington quartered with those of Marriott; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

WHEREAS the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury did, by virtue of the powers vested in them by the 3rd section of the Act of the 8th and 9th Victoria, cap. 94, entitled "An Act for regulating the trade of the Isle of Man," by their order of the 10th November, 1845, order and declare that all or any articles legally importable into the Isle of Man and not enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, and upon which the duty of fifteen pounds per cent. is thereby imposed, should and might from and after the passing of the said before-mentioned Act be imported into the Isle of Man duty free, so long as that order or any part thereof affecting such articles should continue in force. And whereas it is also by the said 3rd section of the said Act enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury "at any time and from time to time, as they shall consider expedient, to revoke the whole or any part of such order or orders, for admitting the aforesaid articles, or any of them, duty free, such order of revocation to take effect from a day to be named therein."

We, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, by virtue of the powers above recited, vested in us, revoke so much of such order of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the 10th November, 1845, as permitted the importation of perfumed spirits duty free into the Isle of Man, and, therefore, perfumed spirits will, from and after the date of this our order, under the 2nd section of the said Act of the 8th and 9th Victoria, cap. 94, become subject to the duty of fifteen pounds per cent. ad valorem.

And we do further direct that this our order be published in the London and Dublin Gazettes, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.
