**Newton Abbott Union.—Dawlish Parish.**

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Dawlish, in the county of Devon;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

**WHEREAS** the population of the parish of Dawlish, in the county of Devon, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Vestry Room, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday the thirty-first day of March last, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order, under their Seal of Office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this parish, as regards that portion of it only which relates to the providing of accommodation for holding Vestry meetings.”

And whereas, at another meeting of the Vestry

of the said parish, held at the Vestry Room, after public notice in that behalf, on Tuesday the twelfth day of April last, it was resolved,—

“That (the parish of Dawlish containing, according to the census last taken preceding the present time, a population far exceeding two thousand persons) it is desirable that all Vestry and other meetings, heretofore holden in the church in this parish, or in the Vestry Room of such church, shall cease to be holden there; and that it is desirable, and resolved and determined (on, and subject to, the approval of the Commissioners for administering the Laws for the relief of the Poor in England), that a fit and proper room, place, and building, within the said parish of Dawlish, shall be provided for the holding of all Vestry and other meetings heretofore holden in the said church, or in the said Vestry Room of such church, in pursuance and according to the provisions of a certain Act of Parliament, passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks.’

“Also, that it is desirable, resolved and determined (with the like approval and sanction of the said Commissioners), that a piece of land be purchased by the Churchwardens and Overseers for the time being of the said parish, on which to erect and build fit, proper, and suitable buildings, for the purpose of holding Vestry and other meetings for the transaction of any business of or relating to the said parish of Dawlish; and that the said land, which shall be so purchased, be conveyed to such Churchwardens and Overseers and their successors, in trust, for the purposes of the said Act, and be accepted, taken, and held by them as a body corporate, under the provisions of the said Act.

“Also, that it is resolved and determined (with the like approbation and sanction of the said Commissioners) to erect and build on the said land, so to be purchased as aforesaid, such fit, proper, and suitable buildings for the purposes aforesaid; and that the purchase money for the said land so to be purchased as aforesaid, and for the erection and completion of the said buildings so proposed to be erected and built as aforesaid, shall not exceed the sum of five hundred pounds.

“Also, that the sum of five hundred pounds so as aforesaid stated to be for the purchase and for the erection and completion, &c., be (with the like approbation and sanction of the said Commissioners) raised and borrowed by the Churchwardens and Overseers for the time being of the said parish, for the purposes of the purchase of the said land, and for erecting and building such fit, proper, and suitable buildings for the purposes aforesaid, under the provisions of the said Act; and that the poor rates be charged with the repayment of the sum so to be raised and borrowed, and the interest thereof; and that the sum so raised and borrowed be repaid by five equal annual instalments.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the before-recited resolutions.

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and

direct, that so much of the Act aforesaid, as relates to the providing of a room or buildings, for the purpose of holding Vestry or other meetings for the transaction of any business of or relating to the said parish of Dawlish, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish of Dawlish.

And we do hereby authorize the said Churchwardens and Overseers to borrow a sum not exceeding five hundred pounds, and to charge the poor rates of the said parish with the repayment of the sum so borrowed, by five equal annual instalments, together with the interest which shall from time to time accrue on the respective balances; and we order and direct the said Churchwardens and Overseers to apply such sum, when so borrowed, to defray the cost of purchasing the aforesaid land, and erecting the said buildings thereon, for the purpose of holding Vestry or other meetings for the transaction of any business of or relating to the said parish as aforesaid.

And we do hereby order and direct, that a copy of this order shall be published in the London Gazette.
