A PROCLAMATION.

In order to the Electing of a Peer for Scotland.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS Alexander George, Lord Saltoun was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Wednesday, the sixteenth day of November next ensuing, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said Alexander George, Lord Saltoun, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituents and proxy being qualified according to law): and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into Our

High Court of Chancery of Great Britain; and We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross, at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this twenty-fourth day of *October* in the year of our Lord, one thousand hundred and fifty-three, and in the seventeenth year of Our reign.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-second day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of the Holy Trinity Micklegate, Saint Mary Bishophill Senior, and Acomb, in the city and county of York, and in the diocese of York, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous parts of the said three parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Edward the Confessor, situate at Dring-

houses, in the said parish of the Holy Trinity Micklegate, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'the Consolidated Chapelry of Dringhouses,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Commencing at the north-east corner of an ancient lane or road called Hob Moor-lane, and proceeding thence in a south-westerly direction along the north-west side of the road leading from York to Tadcaster, to a point opposite to the end of an ancient lane leading from the York and Tadcaster-road at or near the north-east end of the village of Dringhouses, to the common pasture called Knavesmire, the fence on the north side of which said last-mentioned ancient lane having been lately taken away and the said ancient lane being now open to the common pasture, thence across the road leading from York to Tadcaster, to the south-west corner of the said ancient lane leading to Knavesmire, thence along the south side of the last-mentioned ancient lane to where the same enters Knavesmire, thence in a southerly, easterly, and south-easterly direction for the distance of about one thousand five hundred and fifty-seven yards, more or less, along the fence which divides the ancient inclosures of the township of Dringhouses, from the said pasture called Knavesmire, to a point near to the north-east corner of an ancient lane called Green-lane, thence in a south-westerly direction along the north-west side of the said last-mentioned lane to lands belonging to His Grace the Archbishop of York, thence in the same direction to an ancient lane leading from Bishopthorpe to the said York and Tadcaster-road, thence in a north-westerly direction along the north-east side of the said last-mentioned ancient lane to and across the road leading from York to Tadcaster aforesaid, thence in a south-westerly direction along the north-west side of the said last-mentioned road to the township of Askham Bryan, thence northerly along the fence which divides the township of Dringhouses from the township of Askham Bryan aforesaid, to the township of Acomb, thence north-easterly along the fence which divides the township of Dringhouses from the township of Acomb aforesaid, and along the southern boundary of the common pasture called Hob Moor to the north-west corner of the said ancient lane or road called Hob Moor-lane, thence in an easterly direction along the north side of the said last-mentioned lane to the point where the boundary of the said consolidated chapelry commences, namely, the north-east corner of Hob Moor-lane aforesaid, and which said consolidated chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured blue, green, and yellow:

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Thomas, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, of the Right Honourable Robert Monsey, Baron Cranworth, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (Patron in right of the Crown of the parish churches of the said parishes of the Holy Trinity Micklegate and Saint Mary Bishophill Senior), and of Edmund Barlow, of Essex-street, Strand, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire (Patron of the parish church of the said parish of Acomb), have been obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of

Dringhouses, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said Robert Monsey Baron Cranworth and Edmund Barlow, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said Thomas, Archbishop of York, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Edward the Confessor, at Dringhouses aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by Matthew Alexander Eason Wilkinson, of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, Esquire, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry for the consecrated church of Edward the Confessor, at Dringhouses, be accordingly made, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the eighth of August last to direct, under the provisions of the above-recited Act, that burials in the Roman Catholic burial ground of Saint John the Evangelist, in the parish of Saint Mary Islington, should be discontinued after the thirty-first March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four:

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a representation stating that burials should be discontinued in the said burial-ground on the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and not on the thirty-first March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials, in the Roman Catholic burial-ground of Saint John the Evangelist, in the parish of Saint Mary Islington, shall be discontinued from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and not after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

And whereas Her Majesty in Council was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighth of August last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-first day of September last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette; and copies thereof have been affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the said parishes, or on some conspicuous places within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before the said twenty-first day of September.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the under-mentioned parishes, from and after the thirty-first day of October instant, (except as is herein otherwise directed); viz.:

**ST. LUKE'S CHELSEA**—Wholly in the church vaults of St. Luke; and, with the reservation of existing rights in the old parish churchyard, in the old burying-ground in the King's-road; and in that portion of the churchyard which has already been used for interments, the same to cease altogether, with the same reservation, at the end of twelve months from the date hereof.

**ST. GILES WITHOUT CRIPPLEGATE**—In the church, churchyard, vaults, and White Cross-street Burial-ground.

**ST. GEORGE THE MARTYR SOUTHWARK**—In the church vaults and the Lock Burial-ground, in the Old Kent-road; and, with the reservation of existing rights, in the parish churchyard.

**ST. PAUL SHADWELL**—In the churchyard and vaults under and at either end of the church, and in the vaults under the schools.

**ST. JAMES CLERKENWELL**—In the church and churchyard; in the Ray-street or Poor Burial-ground; in the Bowling-green-lane or Middle Burial-ground; in the vaults under the Pentonville Chapel; and, with the ex-

ception of existing rights, which are wholly to cease in twelve months from the date hereof, in the burial-ground of Pentonville Chapel; and wholly in Spa Fields Burial-ground.

**ST. SWITHIN LONDON STONE, AND ST. MARY BOTHAW**—In the cloister, churchyard, and church vaults of St. Swithin; and in the churchyard and vaults of St. Mary Bothaw.

**ST. BOTOLPH, ALDGATE**—In the churchyard and vaults of the church.

**ST. MATTHEW FRIDAY-STREET, AND ST. PETER WESTCHEAP**—In the churchyard and church vaults of St. Matthew; and the burial-ground and vaults of St. Peter Westcheap.

**ST. AUGUSTINE AND ST. FAITH**—In the burial-ground of the two parishes; in the vaults under St. Paul's Cathedral used as a burial place by the two parishes; in the vault under the church of St. Augustine.

**ST. NICHOLAS COLE ABBEY, AND ST. NICHOLAS OLAVE**—In the churchyard of St. Nicholas Cole Abbey, and in the burial-ground of St. Nicholas Olave.

**ST. DUNSTAN STEPNEY**—With the exception of private graves, burials to cease in the churchyard at the end of twelve months from the date hereof; in the unconsecrated part, to cease at the end of two years additional.

**WHITECHAPEL**—In the burial-ground and vault belonging to the German Protestant Reformed Church, Hooper-square; in the burial-ground and church vaults of St. George's German Church, Little Alic-street.

**LAMBETH**—In the churchyard, in the Lambeth Burial-ground in High-street, and in the vault under the Station House; in the church vaults of *St. John Waterloo*, to be discontinued entirely, and, with the reservation of rights in private vaults and graves, in all the portion of the churchyard which has been already used for burial; and, with the same reservation, to cease entirely at the end of the present year. *St. Luke Norwood*, and *St. Matthew Brixton*—There shall in future (except in private graves and vaults already acquired) be no more than one body buried in any grave in these churchyards. *St. Mark Kennington*—In the vaults under the church to cease wholly; and, with the reservation of rights in private vaults and family graves, to cease at once in the portion of the churchyard which has been already used for burials, and wholly and entirely, with the same reservation, at the end of twelve months.

**ST. BARTHOLOMEW THE LESS**—In the churchyard and within the church.

**ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST, WESTMINSTER**—In the vaults and burial-ground.

**ST. PANCRAS**—With the exception of private rights in family graves and vaults, in all the used portion of the burial-ground; the whole

ground to be closed without reservation at the end of twelve months from the date hereof. In the Tottenham Court Chapel Burial-ground, and in the vaults under the chapel.

ST. GEORGE HANOVER SQUARE—In the vaults of St. Mark's Chapel, North Audley-street.

BERMONDSEY—In the burial-ground of St. Thomas and Guy's Hospitals, to cease on and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

ST. MARY NEWINGTON—In the burial-ground of St. John's Chapel, West-street, Walworth; in the burial-ground of Sutherland Chapel, Walworth, to cease at the end of this present year; in the burial-ground of East-street Chapel.

THE Council of Public Health of the Kingdom, wishing to prevent all disputes regarding the application of the regulations contained in the edicts of the 25th of July and 5th of December, 1850, and 3rd of July, 1851, for the conditional admission to free pratique of ships, &c., proceeding from

suspected ports, has deliberated upon, and hereby ordains the observance of the following:

Art. 1. Ships proceeding from suspected ports, and having been eight days on their voyage are to be allowed free pratique at all the ports of the kingdom.
