"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the Precentorship of the cathedral church of Wells, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property herein-after described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an

Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said Precentorship (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us on the vacancy of the said office of Precentor, which occurred on or about the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, by the decease of the Reverend John Watson Beadon, the then Precentor, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said Precentorship, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by

and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a French Imperial Decree, dated the 14th instant (a translation of which is hereunto subjoined), by which Chinese Crape Shawls, of Foreign Manufacture, imported into France for the purpose of being embroidered, and subsequently re-exported, are, under certain conditions, to be temporarily admitted into France free of duty.

(Translation.)

PLAIN China crape shawls (*Unis*) of foreign origin, intended to be embroidered in France, may be temporarily admitted, free of duty, on condition of being re-exported within six months, under the bonds and formalities prescribed by the 5th Art. of the Law of 5th July, 1836, and upon the particular conditions hereinafter indicated.

2. The shawls shall be declared to the Customs, under legal penalty, by number, dimensions, and net weight. Every declaration shall comprehend the number of shawls which it is intended to include in each transaction.

3. The Customs will place on each shawl a flying seal in wax, the expenses of which shall be reimbursed by those interested at the rate of 10 centimes per seal.

4. Chinese crapes, admitted temporarily by virtue of the present Decree, can only be imported at the ports of Marseilles, Bordeaux, Nantes, Havre, Rouen, and Dunkirk, and by the Custom-houses of Lille, Forbach, Strasbourg, Saint Louis,

and Pont-de-Beauvoisin. They can also be withdrawn from the entrepôts of Paris and Lyons, where they may have arrived by way of transit. The re-exportation must take place through the same ports and Custom-houses.

5. Every substitution, deficiency, or subtraction, proved by the Customs authorities, will involve the application of the penalties and interdictions prescribed by Article 5 of the Law of 5 July, 1836.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Chargé d'Affaires at Naples, transmitting a translation of the New Quarantine Regulations issued by the Neapolitan Board of Health, a copy of which is hereunto subjoined.

(Translation.)

THE Supreme Board of Health, in their ordinary sitting of the 29th of November last, have resolved,

That henceforth vessels coming from the city of Dundee should be subjected to a quarantine of ten days for passengers and goods, if no sickness has broken out during the voyage, the quarantine and purification of the goods to take place in a lazarette of the first class, and should be refused pratique if any sickness has broken out during the voyage; the quarantine of ten days for passengers alone, with the purification of their effects on board the vessel, for ships coming from the other ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain remaining in force as before.

The Supreme Board of Health, in their ordinary sitting of the 2nd instant, have resolved,

1st. That henceforward vessels coming from France, from Algeria, as well as from Corsica and other French islands, shall be subjected to a quarantine of ten days for the passengers alone, their effects being aired on board the vessel, and any letters which the said vessels may carry shall be fumigated.

2nd. That passengers who arrive by land, as well as by sea, from places where no sickness prevails, but who originally proceeded from France, should prove that they have been 10 days in a place where the public health is good.

3rd. That all vessels coming from French ports, carrying susceptible goods, must bring a certificate from the Royal Consul, testifying that the said goods do not come from Paris; in default of which, they are to be subjected to the same process of purification required for goods coming from infected places.

4th. That orders should be sent through the regular channels to all the diplomatic and consular agents in the Italian States, not to sign passports or to deliver new ones to those persons who come from France, unless they have remained ten days in a place where the public health is good.
