THEREAS by the "Pilotage Law Amend-ment Act, 1853," section 21, it was enacted that it should be lawful for every pilotage authority, by regulation or bye-law, made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, to make, and from time to time to alter, regulations for the government of the pilots licensed by them, and for insuring the good conduct of such pilots, and their constant attendance on, and effectual performance of, their duty, either at sea or on shore, and to fix, and from time to time to alter, the rates and prices, or other remuneration, to be demanded and re-ceived by pilots licensed by such authority, or to substitute other rates and prices in lieu of those for the time being demanded or received, or to alter the mode of remunerating pilots in such manner as such authority might, with such consent as aforesaid, think fit, so that no higher rates or prices should be demanded or received from the masters or owners of ships than the rates and prices which might, if this said Act had not passed. have been demanded or received; and to exempt the masters of any ships or vessels, or of any classes of ships or vessels, from being compelled to employ pilots, and to annex any terms or conditions to such exemptions, and from time to time to revoke and alter any exemptions so made, and to revise and extend any exemptions now existing by virtue of any Act of Parliament or Charter, upon such terms and conditions, and in such manner as such authority, with such consent as aforesaid, might think fit.

And whereas the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, being the Pilotage Authorities for the port of London, and the seas and channels leading thereto, according to the meaning of the said recited Act, have submitted for the consent of Her Majesiy in Council the table of rates of pilotage hereunto annexed, for the pilotage of vessels in the rivers Thames and Medway and their several channels, in lieu of those now in force under the Act of the sixth year of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, cap. 125, and likewise certain regulations (hereunto annexed) for the extension of the exemption from compulsory pilotage now existing, and for the conduct of the Pilot Service of the port of London.

And whereas the said table of rates and the said regulations appear to be proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve, of the said table of rates and the said regulations so submitted as aforesaid.

REGULATION for the Extension of the Exemptions from Compulsory Pilotage now existing under the provisions of the 59th section of the Act sixth George Fourth, cap. 125, submitted by the Corporation of Trinity House, for the consideration of Her Majesty in Council, pursuant to the provision of the 21st section of the Act sixteenth and seventeenth Victoria, cap. 129.

The masters of the undermentioned ships and vessels shall, subject to the provision contained in the 59th section of the Act of Parliament sixth George Fourth, cap. 125, in respect of the employment of unlicensed persons, be exempted from compulsory pilotage, viz.:

Of ships and vessels trading to Norway, or to the Cattegat, or Baltic, or round the North Cape, or into the White Sea, when coming up by the South Channels.

Of ships and vessels trading to ports between Boulogne (inclusive) and the Baltic, on their outward passages, and when coming up by the South Channels.

Of ships and vessels passing through the limits of any pilotage district, on their voyages from one port to another port, and not being bound to any port or place within such limits, nor anchoring therein.

REGULATIONS for the Conduct of the Pilotage Service of the Port of London, in pursuance of the provision contained in the 6th section of the Act of Parliament sixteenth and seventeenth Victoria, cap. 129.

First.—In Relation to the Pilotage Inwards from the Downs, &c., to London.

1st. The present system of rotationary employment shall continue in force.

2nd. Every London Pilot, on his landing at Dover or Deal, as the case may be, from a vessel which he shall have piloted downwards, shall report himself, together with the particulars of the vessel he shall have so piloted, to the Ruler thereat; and if he be desirous of obtaining a return vessel to pilot inwards, or his services be required to supply any deficiency in the number of pilots at the station, his name shall be placed at the bottom of the list for rotationary employment, either in the cutter or from the shore, as the Ruler may see fit; the number of London Pilots on each rotationary list at one time being regulated by the Rulers according to their discretion, with regard to the prevention of inconvenience to the service in London, as well as at the respective stations.

3rd. London Pilots shipped from the cutters shall pay to the Cutters' Fund one-half of the distance pilotage and boarding money chargeable in each case.

4th. Pilots coming round from the Isle of Wight, in the charge of ships which would have been supplied from the cutters, shall pay to the Cutters' Fund one-half of the distance pilotage and boarding money with which the ship would

have been chargeable had she taken a pilot from the cutter at Dungeness.

Second.—In Relation to the Pilotage Outwards from Gravesend to the Downs.

1st. The present system of selection of their own pilots, by the owners, masters, or agents, shall be left undisturbed.

2nd. Every Cinque Ports' Pilot shall, on his landing from a vessel at Gravesend or London, report himself, together with the particulars of the vessel he shall have piloted up, to the Ruler or at the Trinity House, as the case may be; and if he be desirous of obtaining a return vessel to pilot outwards, and there shall be any vessels for which applications for pilots shall have been made, either to the Ruler or at the Trinity House, he shall be appointed in turn to one of such vessels.

3rd. Any Cinque Ports' Pilot who, having brought up a vessel, may be selected by the owner, agent, or master of an outward bound vessel to pilot such vessel down, shall be at liberty to do so, subject to the regulation next hereinafter provided, and shall send to the Trinity House the particulars of the said vessel.

4th. In the event of any Cinque Ports' Pilot, who may take a vessel downwards, not having returned to his station in time to take his turn for a ship upwards, such turn shall be taken by the next pilot in rotation, and his name shall be placed at the bottom of the rotationary list.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Algiers, transmitting an Extract from the "Moniteur Algérien," a translation of which is subjoined, notifying the establishment of a new Lighthouse on Cape Carbon, on the coast of Algeria.

NOTICE TO MARINERS. COAST OF ALGERIA.

A LIGHTHOUSE of the first class, with a revolving light, has been erected on Cape Carbon, at the entry and on the west side of the Gulf of Bougia; and from the 1st of March next, the lighthouse will be lighted up every night from sunset to sunrise.

The lighthouse is situated in latitude 36° 49 north, and in longitude 2° 49′ 40″ east of the longitude of Paris.

The centre of the light apparatus stands at an elevation of 722 feet above the level of the sea, and 33 feet above the platform where the building is situated.

Its interval of revolution is once in every minute.

In ordinary weather the light is seen at a distance of 27 marine miles; and when the weather is clear will be visible at 40 miles.

The red fixed light which at present points out Cape Carbon will disappear, when the lighthouse is lighted up; the red light will then be removed to the roadstead of Bougia, and placed on Abd-el-Kader Point, to replace, on the 1st of March next, the present light.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, or inland postage,

payable by law, on the transmission by the post of | foreign or colonial letters, or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant; and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof; and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided that the powers thereby given should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas a postal convention has been made and entered into between Her Majesty's Government and the Government of the Republic

of the Uruguay.

Now, for the purpose of better carrying into effect the terms of such convention, we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the powers and authorities in us for such purpose vested in and by the said recited Acts, and of all other powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, direct:

That on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the Republic of the Uruguay, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any port in the Republic of the Uruguay, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform rate of British postage of one shilling.

And we further direct, that on every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the Republic of the Uruguay, transmitted by the post between any port in the Republic of the Uruguay and any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions, or any foreign country, through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, the rates of British postage following; that is to say:

For the conveyance of every such letter between any port in the Republic of the Uruguay and any part of the United Kingdom, a rate of

one shilling.

And for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and such colony or foreign country.

And we further direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be any book packet hereinbefore authorised to be

charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

For every letter, exceeding half an ounce in weight, but not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

If exceeding one ounce but not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

If exceeding two ounces but not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage. If exceeding three ounces but not exceeding

four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage. And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding half an

And we further direct, that printed books, printed magazines, printed reviews, printed pam-phlets (whether British, colonial, or foreign), posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Republic of the Uruguay, or posted in the Re-public of the Uruguay, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and the Republic of the Uruguay, subject to the several regulations and British rates hereinafter contained; that is to sav:

ounce in weight.

On every packet, consisting of a single printed book, or printed magazine or printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets or parts of which, when more than one, shall be sewed or bound together, if not exceeding half a pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of six pence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.
