NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty will hold a Levee at St. James's-Palace, on Wednesday, the 8th of March next, at two o'clock.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, on the Monday previous to the Levee, in order that they may be submitted for The Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee, are to deliver a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, on the Monday previous to the Levee above announced; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on this occasion, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the subchanter of the cathedral church of Salisbury, for certain property belonging to him as such subchanter.

"Whereas, by and under the provisions of the said Acts, the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the dignity or office of subchanter in the said cathedral church, will (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), upon the first avoidance of such dignity or office become absolutely vested in us, for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required:

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing

under the hand of any dignitary or officer of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such dignitary or officer, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments :

" And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend George Ingram Fisher, the present subchanter of the said cathedral church of Salisbury that, with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council :

" We, therefore, with the consent of the said George Ingram Fisher, testified by his having signed this scheme, humbly recommend and propose that, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and except also the hereditaments and premises described in the schedule hereunder written), now belonging to the said George Ingram Fisher, as aforesaid, or to or in which he has or ought to have any estate, right, title, or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title, and interest therein (except as aforesaid), be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred and conveyed by and from the said George Ingram Fisher to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall be paid by us to the said George Ingram Fisher, the sum of one thousand two hundred and twenty-eight pounds sterling; provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, shall, since the fifth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five have been, or shall be granted or made by the said George Ingram Fisher :

" And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

THE SCHEDULE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

All that the site of the Subchantry House, situate in the Cathedral Close, at Salisbury, and now or late in the occupation of the Trustees of the Diocesan Training School.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the fourth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act concerning banns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that on or about the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, your Majesty's said Commissioners (with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the diocese of Worcester), made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient, and they therefore humbly prayed, that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches situate at Attleborough and Stockingford, in the parish of Nuneaton, in the county of Warwick, and in the said diocese of Worcester, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that such proposed districts should be respectively named or called 'The Chapelry District of Attleborough,' and 'The Chapelry District of Stockingford;' and that the boundaries thereof should be such as were mentioned or described in the said representation.

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners also represented that it appeared to them to be expedient that baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said churches at Attleborough and Stockingford, and that the fees to arise therefrom, should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of each of the said churches for the time being.

" That by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, your Majesty was graciously pleased by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the assignment of the said districts, and to order that the same should be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of your Majesty's said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms, churchings, and burials, and of the fees arising therefrom, should be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said chapelry districts of Attleborough and Stockingford, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that banns of marriage should hereafter be published, and that marriages should hereafter be solemnized in the said churches at Attleborough and Stockingford aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the ministers or incumbents of those churches for the time being, and that a supplemental Order for such purpose, should be made pursuant to

the provisions of the fourth section of, an Act of Parliament, passed in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act concerning banns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels.'

"That the consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is by this supplemental Order in Council ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages in the said consecrated churches of Attleborough and Stockingford, both in the parish of Nuneaton, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this supplemental Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," or of any other powers in that behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; namely:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Bishopwearmouth, in the county and diocese of Durham, it appears to them to be expedient that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches of Saint Paul, at Ryhope, Saint Mary, at South Hylton, and Saint Paul, at Hendon, in the said parish of Bishopwearmouth, under the powers contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An

' Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or of any other powers in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed districts should be respectively named or called, 'The District Chapelry of Ryhope,' 'The District Chapelry of South Hylton,' and 'The District Chapelry of Hendon;' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the district chapelry of Ryhope is to consist of the three townships of Ryhope, Burdon, and Tunstall, and is bounded on the east by the sea; on the north, by the boundary line which separates the township of Bishopwearmouth from the townships of Ryhope and Tunstall, till it meets the boundary line of the township of Silksworth; on the west, by the said boundary line which separates the township of Silksworth from the townships of Tunstall and Burdon, till it meets the point of the road from Ryhope to Durham, which is intersected by the Hetton Waggon Way; on the south-west, by the parish of Houghton; and on the south, by the boundary line which separates the townships of Burdon and Ryhope from the parishes of Dalton-le-Dale and of Seaham, as such district chapelry of Ryhope is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured blue.

"The district chapelry of South Hylton, otherwise Ford, contains the whole of the township of Ford, and parts of the townships of Bishopwearmouth and Silksworth; it is bounded on the north by the river Wear; on the east, by the district chapelry of Saint Andrew, Deptford; on the south, partly by the township of Bishopwearmouth, and partly by the Newbottle Waggon Way, which separates the district from the remaining parts of the townships of Bishopwearmouth and Silksworth; and on the west, by the parish of Houghton-le-Spring, as such district chapelry of South Hylton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured yellow.

"The district chapelry of Hendon comprises that portion of the township of Bishopwearmouth which is bounded by the township of Ryhope on the south; by the sea on the east; by the parish of Sunderland and the district of Saint Thomas Bishopwearmouth on the north; and on the west, by a line drawn in a southerly direction along the middle of the New-road till it reaches the Hendon Burn; it then proceeds westerly along the course of the Burn till it reaches the road which leads from Bishopwearmouth to Ryhope; it then proceeds in a southerly direction along the middle of that road till it reaches the boundary line which separates the township of Bishopwearmouth from the township of Ryhope, as such district chapelry of Hendon is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published or continue to be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed, or continue to be solemnized or performed, in the said church of

Saint Mary at South Hylton, and also in the said church of Saint Paul at Ryhope and Saint Paul at Hendon aforesaid; and that the fees to arise respectively therefrom should belong to the minister or incumbent of each such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of district chapelries to the consecrated churches of Saint Paul at Ryhope, Saint Mary at South Hylton, and Saint Paul at Hendon, all in the parish of Bishopwearmouth, be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said churches, and the fees to arise respectively therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the diocese of Durham.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

For the guidance of vessels passing through the Little Belt, a mark, in form of a Tower, 20 feet high from the ground and forty feet above the level of the water, has been placed on the west coast of Fyen, $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile ($2\frac{1}{2}$ miles English) north of Assens, in $55^{\circ} 18' 25''$ N. lat., and $9^{\circ} 53' 48''$ E. long. of Greenwich, Kjerte Church in a line with Sandager Church.

It will be kept white, and is furnished with a red "balloon" on the top.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Letter from the Agent in this country of the King of the Sandwich Islands, inclosing the subjoined Notification respecting the increase in the duties to be levied on the importation of certain kinds of merchandise into those Islands.

AN ACT TO INCREASE THE IMPORT DUTIES ON CERTAIN KINDS OF MERCHANDISE.

Approved May 24th, 1853.

Be it enacted by the King, the Nobles, and the Representatives of the Hawaiian Islands, in Legislative Council assembled:

Section 1. That there shall be levied on all goods, wares, and merchandise imported into this Kingdom, from any port in China or the Phillipine Islands, a duty of fifteen per cent. *ad valorem* upon the invoice cost thereof; provided, however, that no more than five per cent. duty shall be levied on the article of rice, and further provided that this shall not be construed into a repeal of any part of "An Act levying specific duties on sugar, syrups of sugar, and coffee," passed June 6th, 1852.

Section 2. The increase of duties provided for in the first section of this Act shall not affect goods, wares or merchandise, which are the growth or manufacture of any foreign country having a treaty with this Kingdom.

Section 3. In order to prove that any goods, wares, or merchandise, imported into this Kingdom, from any of the ports of China or the Phillipine Islands, are the growth or manufacture of some other country having a treaty with this Kingdom, it shall be necessary for the person entering the same at the Custom House, to present to the Collector of Customs a certificate to that effect from the resident Hawaiian Consul, or in default of such Consul, from the Consul or Commercial Agent of such other country, at the port in China or the Phillipine Islands from whence such goods, wares, or merchandize shall have been brought to this Kingdom; and the person entering the same at the Custom House shall make oath, that such goods, wares, or merchandize are not the growth or manufacture of China or the Phillipine Islands, to the best of his knowledge and belief.

Section 4. This Act shall take effect at the expiration of six months from the date of its publication in the Polynesian newspaper.

IN accordance with the provisions of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for better preserving the Navigation of the River Mersey," the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Liverpool do hereby give you notice, that the said mayor, aldermen, and burgesses, their agents, lessees, or assigns, propose to make, construct, and erect quays, wharves, breasts, and embankments, in or adjoining to the River Mersey, and which will extend beyond the line of the high-water mark of a tide uninfluenced by the wind, of the height of twenty-one feet, as measured from the top of the cill of the gates of the Old Dock, in Liverpool, being the datum in the said Act mentioned; and that one part or portion of such quays, wharves, breasts, and embankments, is intended to be made, constructed, and erected in front of a piece of land belonging to the said mayor, aldermen, and burgesses, in that part of the township or chapelry of Birkenhead, in the county of Chester, which lies between other land adjoining to a certain place, called the Monks Ferry, and a certain other place, called the Birkenhead Ferry, in a straight line, or nearly so, from north to south, between the said places, and in length nine hundred and forty-eight feet, or thereabouts, and extending into the said River Mersey, beyond the line of high-water mark of a tide of twenty-one feet, uninfluenced as aforesaid, and measured as aforesaid, two hundred and forty-six feet, or thereabouts, in the widest part thereof, and one hundred and twenty-seven feet, or thereabouts, in the narrowest part thereof, such difference of width arising from the irregularities of the present line of high-water mark; and also that another part or portion of such quays, wharves, breasts, and embankments, is intended to be made, constructed and erected in front of another piece of land, in the said township or chapelry of Birkenhead, lying between other land adjoining Monks Ferry aforesaid, and other land adjoining a certain other place called Woodside Ferry, in a straight line, or nearly so, from south to north, between the last-mentioned places or boundaries, and in length six hundred and seventeen feet, or thereabouts, and extending into the said River
