The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee on the 9th of June next, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before Wednesday, the 7th of June next, by twelve o'clock, for the second Levee, in order that they may be submitted for The Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee on the 9th of June next, are to deliver a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, on Wednesday the 7th of June next, and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levees; one to be delivered to the Page in the

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to alter and amend the law relating to Ecclesiastical houses of residence," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend the law relating to Ecclesiastical houses of residence,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Peterborough.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared, that, by the authority of a scheme prepared by us and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds or in other security or securities, in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, aggregate or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter, with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same should be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose and in such manner as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate; and also that for any like purpose any arrangement might be made, with the consent, in writing, under

the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust, for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all moneys and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government Funds, or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer or of any individual or individuals, for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

And whereas the said dean and chapter are now seized in fee of divers manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, the whole or the greater part of which have been heretofore demised on leases for years or lives at small annual reserved rents, and upon payment of fines, and they are also beneficially interested in or otherwise entitled to certain sums of stock or cash invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked A.

"And whereas by an Order and Decree of the said dean and chapter, bearing date the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and duly confirmed as a statute by their visitor and registered in the registry of the diocese, it was provided that there should be appropriated out of the revenues of the said dean and chapter to or for the several persons or objects connected with the said dean and chapter, and enumerated and set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked B, the several yearly sums of money specified in the same Schedule, opposite to the names or descriptions of such persons or objects respectively.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said dean and chapter have proposed to us, with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments (except as hereinafter excepted) should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned; and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce as well to the improvement of the said fund as to the permanent benefit of the said dean and chapter, that the same should be dealt with accordingly.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, and of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Peterborough, as Visitor of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that in consideration of the money payments hereinafter mentioned, to be paid by us to or on account of the said dean and chapter, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments which now belong, either in possession or reversion, to the said dean and chapter (excepting any right of Ecclesiastical patronage, and excepting also the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C), and all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and chapter, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any other conveyance or assurance in

the law, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seized or possessed of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three; and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall, on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year, be paid by us to the said dean and chapter, in respect of the half year then last past, the sum of three thousand one hundred and five pounds; and that the first payment on account of such annuity, calculated from the said twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, be made on the first day of May next; and that the receipt or receipts of the Treasurer for the time being of the said dean and chapter shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us, under the authority of this scheme when ratified as aforesaid.

"Provided always, and we further recommend and propose, that in addition to the annual sums and charges, specified in the said schedule hereunto annexed, marked B, the said dean and chapter shall also pay to their chapter clerk for the time being the annual sum of two hundred and ten pounds in respect of the profits heretofore accruing to him, on account of the management of the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us.

"And we further recommend and propose, that none of the moneys or estates to be received or acquired under the provisions of this scheme, shall be applicable to the purposes of our common fund, except only so far as it may be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made thereout, under the provisions of this scheme, until, or unless by and under the like authority, the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple, of real estates, sufficient to secure to the said dean and chapter a clear annual income (after deducting therefrom rates, taxes, and other outgoing, including costs of management,) of six thousand pounds, subject, however, as well to the charges and outgoing hereinbefore mentioned, as to all other capitular liabilities, except the hereinbefore mentioned payment of two hundred and ten pounds per annum to the chapter clerk.

"And we further recommend and propose with the like consent of the said dean and chapter and of their visitor, that the said sums of stock so described as aforesaid, in the said schedule marked A, shall, as soon as conveniently may be after the gazetting of such Order as aforesaid, be sold out or transferred, and the same or the proceeds thereof, be paid or carried to our account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us, or any or either of them, or of any other real estates.

"And we further recommend and propose, that until the said dean and chapter shall have been so put into possession of estates as last hereinbefore mentioned, the operation of the provisions of the Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, relating to the incomes of the Dean and Canons of Peterborough, shall be suspended, and that the said provisions shall be in abeyance.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other

measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

#### SCHEDULE A.

The sum of one hundred and four pounds six shillings and one penny, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, to the credit of the Dean and Chapter of Peterborough, ex parte the Great Northern Railway Company.

The sum of one thousand six hundred and twenty-four pounds seven shillings and four pence, three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the names of the Right Reverend George Davys, D.D., Bishop of Peterborough, the Venerable Owen Davys, M.A., Archdeacon of Northampton, and John Gates, of Peterborough aforesaid, Gentleman, as trustees of such stock, being denominated in the books of the dean and chapter, as the Accumulating Fund.

#### SCHEDULE C.

##### IN THE CATHEDRAL PRECINCTS.

All that messuage or mansion-house called the Deanery House, with the court-yard, gardens, stables, and appurtenances to the same, adjoining and belonging, numbered or distinguished upon the map or plan of the city or town of Peterborough, annexed to the award, made in pursuance of an Act of Parliament passed, upon the Peterborough Inclosure, as number 79.

And also all those four several messuages or dwelling-houses, commonly known as the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Canonry or Prebendal Houses, with the yards, gardens, stables, and appurtenances to the same respectively belonging and usually occupied therewith, numbered or distinguished upon the said map or plan, as numbers 48, 64, 68, and 67.

And also all those three several messuages or dwelling-houses, commonly known as the Minor Canons' Houses, with the yards, gardens, stables, and appurtenances to the same respectively belonging, and usually occupied therewith, numbered or distinguished upon the said map or plan as numbers 69, 66, and 63.

And also all that ancient chapel or building now used as the Grammar School, with the Schoolmaster's house and premises adjoining towards the north, and the garden and small outhouses adjoining and occupied therewith, numbered respectively upon the said map or plan as numbers 102, 103, 104, 105, and 107.

And also all that gateway or stone building, with the room over the same, called the Music Room, and the house called the Porter's Lodge, being part of and adjoining the said building,

situate at the western entrance of the Cathedral Close, and numbered upon the said map or plan 106.

And also all that other gate house or porter's lodge, called the East Gate, and the common coach-house or stable and other premises, adjoining towards the west, called the Prebendal Coach-house, numbered respectively on the said map or plan 59, 60, and 61.

And also all that building called the Chapter House, and the Treasury Office adjoining, situate on the eastern side of the cloisters of the said cathedral church, and the vacant space of ground called the Cloister Square or Laurel Court.

And also all that newly erected building called the Almshouse, situate on the northern side of the said cathedral close, divided into several rooms, and occupied by poor people, assigned for that purpose by the said Dean and Chapter, with the yards and gardens to the same adjoining and belonging, numbered 80 on the said map or plan.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Peterborough.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of December last, to direct that burials should be wholly discontinued in the churchyard of *St. Paul Deptford*, from and after this first day of *May*;

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a representation,

stating that he is of an opinion that the time for closing part of the said churchyard may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in that part of the churchyard of *St. Paul Deptford*, called the "best ground," in ground which has not yet been broken for interments, from and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, instead of from and after this first day of *May*, subject to the conditions imposed by the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of December last.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Orders in Council of the eighteenth of February, twenty-ninth of March, and seventh of April last, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the burial-grounds and places hereinafter mentioned, from and after the time directed in such Orders;

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has represented that the time for closing the said burial-grounds may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the parish churchyard, *Cheshunt*, from and after the first of August next; in the burial-ground of *Paul's Meeting House, Taunton*, from and after the first of June next; in the burial-ground of the parish of *Lindfield*, from and after the first of July next; and in the churchyards and other burial-grounds of *Newport*, in the county of *Monmouth*, from and after the first of July next, instead of from and after this first day of *May*; and that burials be discontinued in the burial-ground of the *Temple Parish*, in the city of *Bristol*, from and after the twenty-third of June next, instead of from and after the eighteenth of April last.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish.

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned places, without the consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the ninth of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twentieth day of April last, and such Order has been published in the *London Gazette*; and copies thereof have been affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twentieth day of April.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned places without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said places be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the tenth day of May instant (except as is herein otherwise directed), viz.:

**SHREWSBURY.**—Burials to be wholly discontinued at once in *St. Mary's Church*, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in *St. Mary's Churchyard*. In *St. Michael's Churchyard* (except in private vaults and graves), no more than one body to be buried in any grave, and burials to cease wholly therein from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six. Burials to be discontinued in *St. Almond's Church* forthwith, and in the churchyard from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five. Burials to be discontinued forthwith in *St. Mary's Roman Catholic Chapel* Burial-ground and within the chapel, in *Claremont-street Chapel* Burial-ground and the chapel, and in *Swan Hill Chapel* Burial-ground; and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the *Quakers' Burial-ground*. Burials to be discontinued forthwith in *St. Julian's Church*, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the old and new churchyards. In the churchyard of *Trinity Coleham* (except in private vaults and graves), no more than one body to be buried in any grave; and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six. Burials within *St. Giles's Church* to be wholly discontinued; no more than one body to be buried in any grave in *St. Giles's Churchyard*, and no burial to take place within twenty feet of the church. Burials to be wholly discontinued within the church and churchyard of *Holy Cross*.

**Kew.**—Burials underneath the parish church to be discontinued forthwith, and in the old portion of the parish burial-ground from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

**PETERSHAM.**—Burials underneath the church, and in the churchyard within five yards of the church or the houses which adjoin the churchyard, to be forthwith discontinued; with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body to be buried in each grave; and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials to be wholly discontinued in the churchyard.

**PLYMOUTH.**—Burials to be forthwith discontinued in the churches and churchyards of *St. Andrew* and of *Charles the Martyr*, in the burial-ground of *St. Andrew's parish* in *West Well-street*, in the *Presbyterian Chapel-yard* in *Batter-street*, and in the *Ebenezer Methodist Chapel-yard*, except in vaults in the open air, in which each coffin buried shall be imbedded in peat charcoal, and separately entombed in concrete or masonry.

in the Supplement of the Commercial Gazette, on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April last, containing certain regulations with regard to trade, which have been issued in consequence of the Declaration of War.

Supplement to the Commercial Gazette of the 1<sup>st</sup> of April, 1854.

Declaration from the Ministry of Finance.

IN consequence of the information received of the Declaration of War against Russia by England and France, the Ministry of Finance considers it its duty to make universally known the measures which will be adopted by the Imperial Government, with respect to the English and French Subjects, their mercantile vessels and property.

In conformity with the Declarations of the English and French Governments the Imperial Government has, in its sincere desire to remove as much as possible from private individuals the ruinous consequences of War, established the following rules.

A term of 6 weeks shall be allowed to English and French Merchant Vessels, at present in our Harbours to load and sail, without hindrance to foreign ports. This term will count from the 25th April, in the Ports of the Black Sea, the Sea of Azoff and the Baltic, but in the White Sea from the day on which the navigation opens.

As an exception to this rule, for military considerations, two English vessels, the "Ann McAlister" and the "William Broderick," of which the former is lying at Cronstadt and the latter at Revel, will be detained for a certain period ; these vessels will not, under any circumstances, be liable to confiscation, and will eventually be released, as soon as circumstances render it practicable.

English and French merchant vessels which may, after leaving our ports, be met at sea by our cruisers after the expiration of the term appointed, will be free to continue their voyage, if, on examination of their ship's papers, it should appear that the cargo on board of these vessels had been taken in before the expiration of the six weeks.

The property of British and French subjects on board neutral vessels will be regarded as inviolable by our cruisers. English and French goods, even should they belong to subjects of Great Britain or France, will be allowed to be imported under neutral flags into our ports, in accordance with the usual Custom-house tariff regulations, without any hindrance on our part.

Moreover the property of neutrals, found on board of the enemy's vessels, will not be subject to confiscation. But it is self-evident that a neutral flag will not cover such cargoes or articles as by international law are considered articles of contraband ; in consequence of which, the vessels, on which such contraband may be found, will be stopped by our cruisers, and declared lawful prizes of war, in conformity with the Declaration, issued from the Ministry of Finance the 27th November of the foregoing year.

The Government of His Imperial Majesty, whilst leaving all its mercantile harbours open to the merchant vessels of neutral countries, can, nevertheless, not take upon itself any responsibility for injuries and losses which these vessels may sustain from the operations of war.

The Minister of Finance, as far back as the month of October last year, when rumours of war became prevalent, declared in the name of His Majesty the Emperor, to the English Merchants trading in St. Petersburg, that, even in case of war, they need have no apprehension either

for themselves or their property, and they might depend upon the same protection which they had hitherto enjoyed, such protection and freedom from danger, as far as their persons and property are concerned, will continue to be extended to all British and French subjects, without exception (to whatever trade or profession they may belong), who, quietly attending to their own business, observe the established laws of the country, and refrain from all acts forbidden by them.
