DESPATCHES have been received at this Office from Vice-Admiral Dundas, Commanderin-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean and Black Sea, of which the following are copies:

No. 172. Britannia, off Odessa, April 22, 1854.

I BEG you will lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the accompanying Correspondence, relative to the fire of the batteries at Odessa on the Furious and her boat, when flying each a flag of truce, which will, I trust, fully explain to their Lordships the exact nature of this uncivilized act of aggression, and the false statements by which General d'Osten Sacken has been led to attempt to justify it. And as, in addition to the fortress of Odessa, the Russians were labouring day and night in strengthening the Moles and erecting formidable sea defences, and had also

collected between 20 and 30,000 men for the protection of this military depôt, as well as for the security of vessels seeking shelter under the guns of the place, Admiral Hamelin and I decided on sending the joint demand to the Governor, of which the Enclosure No. 5 is a copy.

As no answer had been received up to 7 A.M. this morning, the combined steam division noted in the margin,* with 6 rocket-boats, under the immediate orders of Captain Jones, opened fire on the Imperial Fort and Mole, and Russian vessels lying there. By 3 P.M. the magazine was blown up, the forts were destroyed, and the ships sunk or burnt.

The city of Odessa, and the Mole containing the merchant-vessels of all nations were not molested, agreeably to the commands of Her Majesty to respect private property as much as possible.

Our loss has happily been small—one killed and ten wounded; and the damage to the ships by the

enemy's fire can be repaired at sea.

It is my pleasing duty to state, that between the two Squadrons the greatest cordiality exists, and that the conduct of the French steam-frigates calls for my warmest praise. The Vauban was set on fire by red-hot shot, but by the cool courage and activity of her Captain and crew, the fire was extinguished.

I recommend all the Officers, Seamen, and Royal Marines, employed on the service, to their Lordship's notice, particularly Captain Jones, the Senior Officer of the Steam Division, and Commander Dickson, of the Britannia, who, in charge

of the rocket-boats, did good service.

I enclose a copy of a letter I have received from Captain Jones, and a list of the killed and wounded.

Odessa, April 14, 1854.

THE Aide-de-Camp, General Baron d'Osten Sacken believes it his duty to express to Admiral Dundas his surprise to hear it asserted that from the port of Odessa they have fired on the Fury †

Frigate when covered by a flag of truce.

On the arrival of the Fury, two blank guns were fired, in consequence of which the vessel hoisted the national flag, and stopped out of gun shot; immediately there left her a boat under a white flag, proceeding in the direction of the Mole, where it was received by the officer on duty, who, on the question of the English officer, replied that the English Consul had already left Odessa. Without further conversation, the boat retook the direction of the vessel, but as it went to rejoin her, the frigate, in place of awaiting her, advanced in the direction of the Mole, leaving the boat to the left, and approached the batteries within

It was then that the Commandant of the Battery of the Mole, faithful to his orders to prevent

all enemies' vessels of war to come within shot, felt it his duty to fire, no longer on a flag of truce, which had been respected until the end of its mission, but on an enemy's vessel which advanced too near the land after having received, by the two first blank guns, intimation to stop.

This simple exposition of facts, such as they

have been reported to His Majesty the Emperor, ought to destroy of itself the supposition, otherwise inadmissible, that in the ports of Russia they do not respect a flag of truce, of which the inviolability is guaranteed by laws common to all

civilized nations.

Her Majesty's Ship Furious, off Odessa, April 21, 1854.

I HAVE carefully read the letter of the Governor of Odessa, on the subject of the batteries. having fired at the flag of truce, on Saturday, April 8.

His statement is entirely untrue. On that occasion Her Majesty's Ship under my command made Odessa at daylight, and at 5 50 A.M., when at about 4 miles' distance, the English colours and a flag of truce were hoisted.

It was not until at least 20 minutes afterwards (about $\frac{1}{4}$ past 6 a.m.) that two blank guns were

fired from the battery.

As I considered these guns as an intimation that I was not to proceed any further, the engines were immediately stopped, and the helm put hard a port, and from that time until the return of the boat the wheels were not again moved, and the ship gradually drifted off shore, in consequence of the moderate N.W. wind which was blowing off the shore and on her port beam.

Her stern was towards the Lazaretto, and I carefully abstained from opening the main-deck ports, or clearing away the upper-deck bulwarks, so that there should not be the slightest indication

of hostility on my part.

Seven shotted guns were fired; the first one was evidently intended for the boat (then about a mile off shore), as it fell about 60 or 70 yards short of her, and she was then somewhat to the southward of the line between the battery and The remainder, which all fell short, the ship. may have been intended for either boat or ship, as she pulled more into the straight line.

Lieutenant Alexander when at the Mole asked to see the English Consul; he was told that he was not down there, and that it was too early, and that the Captain of the Port would be sent off, and he was desired to return to his ship. He asked if the English Consul was still at Odessa; he was again told by the officer of the guard to return to the ship, and by a person who acted as interpreter in English, "that he was not permitted to say anything more."

Throughout the whole proceeding the English colours and the flag of truce were conspicuously

displayed on both ship and boat.

These statements can be verified by the evidence of the Officer of the Watch, the Chief Engineer, and the Engineer of the Watch, and indeed by every person on board of the ship.

Evidence taken with regard to the Russian Forts at Odessa firing on the boat of Her Majesty's steam-frigate Furious with a flag of truce.

ON the morning of Saturday, the 8th April, I saw an English man of war come into the Roads of Odessa, with a flag of truce flying at the fore. I then observed a boat, with a flag of truce in the bows, leave the ship, and pull towards the shore.

bows, leave the ship, and pull towards the shore.

I was present when the boat arrived at the back part of the Mole. There were two Government officers there, when, through an interpreter, the officer of the boat was asked his business. He replied that he had come to take the English Consul away. He was informed he had left several days; and, to the best of my belief, the following was the conversation that passed between them. Afterwards the interpreter said the authorities were not down from the town, and that he had better return to his ship, and come back again in an hour, or an hour and a half. The boat then left the shore, and set sail towards I walked a little distance from the the ship. spot where the above conversation took place, in a few minutes I observed some excitement and bustle on a six-gun battery at the back of the Mole, I then turned and looked towards the battery, and from thence to the boat, she was about threefourths of the distance between the shore and the man of war steamer; at that moment a shot was fired from the battery before mentioned, and I observed it nearly struck the boat; a soldier then ran down from the six-gun battery towards the battery on the Mole head, and immediately shotted guns were fired from both batteries to the steamer, as nearly as I can recollect seven shots were fired at the man of war and the boat; it was reported on shore that one shot struck the steamer's paddle box; when the boat reached the ship the steamer left the roads without firing a shot.

Her Britannic Majesty's Ship Britannia, off Odessa, April 21, 1854.

VICE-ADMIRAL DUNDAS has had the honour to receive from General Baron D'Osten Sacken, a note purporting to be an explanation of a fire from the batteries at Odessa having been opened upon Her Britannic Majesty's steam-vessel Furious and her boat on the 8th instant, both having a flag of truce flying at the time.

Vice-Admiral Dundas regrets that the statements made to General Baron Osten Sacken are not in accordance with the facts substantiated by evidence before the Vice-Admiral, and he has still more to regret that so wanton and uncivilized an act of aggression should have been perpetrated by the forces under the orders of General Baron D'Osten Sacken.

SIR, Off Odessa, April 21, 1854. CONSIDERING that the letter of your Excellency, dated the 14th April, and which has only

been received by us this morning, contains only erroneous statements in justification of the unqualifiable aggression of which the authorities of Odessa have been guilty, with respect to one of our frigates and her boat, both of them bearing a flag of truce.

Considering that notwithstanding this flag, the batteries of that city have fired several shot, as well at the frigate as at the boat, at the time that the latter had quitted the Mole where it had arrived with perfect confidence.

The two Vice-Admirals, Commanding in Chief the combined squadrons of England and France, believe themselves entitled to exact reparation from your Excellency.

In consequence, all the English, French, and Russian vessels, now anchored near the fortress or the batteries of Odessa, must be delivered immediately to the two combined squadrons.

If at sunset the two Vice-Admirals should not receive any answer, or should have received a negative, they will be obliged to have recourse to force to revenge the insult that has been committed against the flag of one of the combined squadrons, although the interests of humanity lead them to adopt, with great regret, this last resolution, of which they throw the responsibility upon him who has the right to bear it.

Her Majesty's Ship Sampson, off Odessa, Sir, April 22, 1854.

HEREWITH I have the honour to forward a list of casualities sustained on board Her Majesty's ship under my command, in the attack and destruction of the Fort and Shipping in Port Imperial this day, and I avail myself of the opportunity to express my entire satisfaction at the conduct of the Steam Division which you did me the honour of placing under my command.

The management of the several ships, in close proximity to each other, and in very shallow water, manœuvring for several hours, required the most vigilant attention, and were executed without an accident; but as these proceedings were under your own immediate eye, it is not requisite for me to say more on such and similar particulars.

The French Steamer Vauban, was oblige to retire at an early period of the attack in consequence of some red hot shot from the batteries, having made a lodgement in the lining of the ship, but as soon as the fire could be extinguished, she returned to her post in the attack.

The conduct of this ship's company was such as might be expected of a British Crew devoted to their Queen and Country, and the arrangements in detail by Lieutenant Shute B. Piers, first of this ship, had provided for every exigency.

The precision with which the captains of the guns took aim elicited my warmest commendation during the attack, and did full justice to the care and correctness with which Lieutenant E. Mc-Arthur, R.M.A., prepared the fuzes for the required range; as Marksmen, William Barker, Gunner's Mate, and John Edwards, Sailmaker, were especially noticeable.

The engine was worked with that steady

obedience to order which has at all times distinguished the conduct of Mr. Jago, whether under fire or otherwise.

The division of rocket-boats under Commander Dickson were admirably managed, and contributed most essentially to the success of the day.

The ships and vessels in Port Imperial amounted to about 24, most of which being sunk or on fire at the time of your making the recall, and the explosion of the battery on the pier head, rendered further operations in that quarter unnecessary.
