The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the fourth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act concerning banns and marriages in "certain district churches or chapels," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfour, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that on the fourteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, your Majesty's said Commissioners (with the consent, signified under hand and seal, of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the diocese of Lichfield), made a re-

presentation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient, and they therefore humbly prayed, that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate in the parish of Saint Mary, Shrewsbury, in the said diocese of Lichfield, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more 'effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes, and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to 'make better provision for the assignment of 'ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels 'augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of 'Queen Anne and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Shrews-'bury;' and that the boundaries thereof should be such as were mentioned or described in the said representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners also represented that it appeared to them to be expedient that baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Michael Shrewsbury, and that the fees to arise therefrom, should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time

being.
"That by an Order of your Majesty in Council,
"May, of May, one thoubearing date the fifteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, your Majesty was graciously pleased by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the assignment of the said district, and to order that the same should be accordingly made, and that the recommenda-tions of your Majesty's said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms, churchings, and burials, and of the fees arising there-from, should be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said district chapelry of Saint Michael Shrewsbury, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that banns of marriage should hereafter be published, and that marriages should hereafter be solemnized in the said church of Saint Michael Shrewsbury, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the incumbent of such church for the time being, and that a Supplemental Order for such purpose should be made pursuant to the provisions of the fourth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act concerning banns and marriages ' in certain district churches or chapels.'

"That the consent of the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and

sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom, , shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is by this supplemental Order ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages in the church of Saint Michael Shrewsbury, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this supplemental Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Postmaster-General to remit any of the rates of British postage for the time being, payable by law on the transmission of post letters, newspapers, or other printed papers, to such extent as the Lords of the Treasury shall from time to time direct; and power is also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or Inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas it is expedient that regulations should be made for the transmission by the post

of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, and sent from or to any commissioned or non-commissioned officer, serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier employed in Her Majesty's regular forces, artillery, or royal marines, in Turkey or the Black Sea, or sent from or to any commissioned or warrant officer, midshipman, master's mate or seaman employed in Her Majesty's Navy, or any of Her Majesty's ships in Turkey or the Black Sea, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom, and any port or place in Turkey or the Black Sea (the conveyance between the United Kingdom and Turkey or the Black Sea being through France via Marseilles by the French Mediterranean Packet Boats), there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform British rate of one penny.

And we direct, that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken,

and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such letter, exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of three ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that in respect of letters sent by any non-commissioned officers, serjeants, corporals, drummers, fifers, private soldiers or seamen, under the regulations of this Warrant, the following conditions shall be observed (that is to say), upon each such letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the regiment, detachment, or vessel to which he shall belong; and upon every such letter there shall be written in the handwriting of, and signed by, the officer having at the time the command of the regiment, detachment, or vessel, to which the privileged person belongs, the name of such officer and the name of such regiment, detachment, or

And we further direct, that in respect to letters received by the post under this Warrant, by any commissioned or warrant officers, midshipmen, or master's mates, or any non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, or seamen, the following conditions shall be observed, that is to say: the postage of each such letter posted in the United Kingdom shall be prepaid, either in money or by the proper stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, at the time of the same being posted; and as to letters received by any non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, or seamen, each letter shall be directed to the privileged person, specifying on the superscription thereof, the regiment, detachment, or vessel to which he shall belong.

And we further direct, that if in any case the conditions hereinbefore prescribed be not complied with, the letter shall be charged with the same rates of postage as if this Warrant had not been signed.

.And we further direct, that all letters, which shall be sent by the post under the regulations of this Warrant, shall be subject, in addition to the British rates hereby fixed, to the payment of any foreign postage which may be chargeable thereon.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters passing by the post, between the United Kingdom and Turkey or the Black Sea, under the provisions of a certain Warrant, under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 3rd day of April, 1854, which are to be charged with the same rates of postage as if this Warrant had not been signed.

And we further direct, that the several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Act.

Provided lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter, to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
