REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-Room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented at the Levee on the 9th of June next, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before Wednesday, the 7th of June next, by twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levee but in conformity with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee on the 9th of June next, are to deliver a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come), to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, on Wednesday the 7th of June next, and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

May it please your Majesty,

DESPATCHES have been received at this Office from Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Napier, K.C.B., Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's ships and vessels in the Baltic, of which the following are copies:

No 96.

SIR, *Her Majesty's Ship Duke of Wellington, off Hango Head, May 20, 1854.*

I BEG to enclose a letter from Captain Yelverton, of the *Arrogant*, giving an account of a smart operation he performed at Ekness, 12 miles in the interior of the country. Great credit is due to him for his perseverance in threading up so narrow and intricate a navigation; and it will show the enemy they are not safe even in their country towns.

Captain Yelverton very properly abstained from damaging the town.

He speaks very highly of the gallantry of Captain Hall, of the *Hecla* (who I am sorry to say is slightly wounded), as also of Lieutenant Haggard, first of the *Arrogant*, and Lieutenant Crew Read, the senior lieutenant of the *Hecla*, which gallant officer has received a severe wound, which I fear has endangered the sight of his eye. All the officers and men behaved as British seamen and marines were wont to.

I enclose a list of killed and wounded on this service.

Her Majesty's Ship Arrogant, Skagaedslenden, May 20, 1854.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to inform you that I came into the inner passage yesterday, in company with the *Hecla*, for the purpose of examining the channel.

At three in the afternoon, just as I was about to anchor a little beyond Teverminne, a strong force of the enemy's troops opened their fire upon both ships from behind an extensive sand-bank; the effect, however, of a few broadsides from *Hecla* and this ship soon dispersed them.

No one, I am glad to be able to say, was hurt in either vessel.

I did nothing to provoke this attack on the part of the enemy.

I ascertained from a pilot who lives here that

three large Russian loaded merchant ships were at Ekness, eight miles to the northward. I lost no time in proceeding there early this morning; but did not expect to find the enemy so well prepared to receive me. Owing to the Hecla's light draught of water she led the way; a task not easy to perform in a narrow and intricate passage, exposed as she was to the first of the enemy's fire.

In addition to a field battery of five guns (two of which I dismounted) and one mortar, they had erected a strong battery which they supplied very efficiently; Captain Hall succeeded in dismounting and bringing off three of the guns. The engagement lasted longer than I expected, as they returned to their guns twice in the midst of our fire, and were only compelled to leave them when their guns were destroyed by our shot.

On reaching the anchorage of Ekness, I found that two of the merchantmen were aground, but Captain Hall brought out one under the fire of a battery, which my draught of water would not allow me to near sufficiently to completely destroy. I most carefully avoided firing one shot in or near the town of Ekness, directing the whole of the fire of the guns exclusively to the batteries and troops attacking us, which consisted, in addition to the brigade of Horse Artillery, of a considerable body of cavalry and infantry, moving abreast of the ship as she advanced.

I cannot give sufficient credit to Captain Hall for the assistance he rendered me on this, as on all occasions, since he has been under my orders; the admirable way in which he went in and brought out his prize, under a galling fire from the enemy, deserves the greatest praise.

I beg also to call to your favourable notice Lieut. H. V. Haggard, senior lieutenant of this ship, whose most zealous services at all times were particularly displayed on this occasion, and also that of the whole of the officers, seamen, and marines of Her Majesty's ship under my command.

I regret to say that I had one man killed, and five wounded. I must not omit to mention how very highly Captain Hall speaks of Lieutenant Crew Read, First Lieutenant of the Hecla, for the support he had from him, throughout the engagement) until he was unfortunately wounded and carried below), as also from the officers, seamen, and marines, of Her Majesty's ship under his command.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Nantucket New South Shoal Light Vessel.

A LIGHT VESSEL will be placed during the ensuing month (May, 1854) to mark the New South Shoal, off Nantucket, and to guide vessels clear of dangers in that vicinity.

This vessel will be fitted with two masts painted yellow, white mast heads, with an open work, oval, black day mark, 5 feet in diameter, at an elevation of 63 feet from the water line.

The hull of the vessel will be red with "Nantucket South Shoal" painted in large white letters on both sides.

The length of the vessel is about 100 feet; breadth of beam about 24 feet; height of gunwale above water, 11 feet; burden, 250 tons.

Two lights (one on each mast) will be exhibited at an elevation of 44 feet above the level of the sea, each produced by 8 Argand fountain lamps and parabolic reflectors, and should be seen in good weather, from an elevation of 15 feet above the water, at a distance of from 12 to 13 nautical miles.

During thick or foggy weather, a heavy bell will be kept constantly ringing.

The vessel will be placed in from 13 to 15 fathoms water, about one, or one and-a-half mile to the southward of the southern extremity of the New South Shoal.

The position will be in about

Lat. 40° 56' 30" North; Long. 69° 51' 30" West from Greenwich.

In passing this Light Vessel, the following bearings and distances will be found to be sufficiently accurate to guide navigators in shaping their courses from positions near it:

To centre of "Old South Shoal," (Mag.) N. by E., distant 8 miles.

To "Tom Never's Head," (Mag.) N. 26° W., distant 21 miles.

To "Block Island Lights," (Mag.) W.N.W., distant 78 miles.

To "Lt. Vessel off Sandy Hook," (Mag.) West, distant 180 miles.

Variation of the Compass, 8° 18' West.

Vessels bound to Boston Bay or to that vicinity, when the *weather is moderate*, may, after passing the Light Vessel, steer an E.N.E. course for 18 miles, leaving Fishing Rip on the starboard hand; from thence a N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. course for about 38 miles, will bring up with the Chatham Lights.

The attention of Mariners is particularly invited to the setting of the currents in the vicinity of these shoals, as shown by the Coast Survey Chart, and it must not be forgotten that compass courses cannot be depended upon without having regard to the time of tide and its set.

Notice will be given of the precise time when this vessel will be placed at her station, and the lights exhibited, with any changes that it may be found necessary to make specified.

Devaar Lighthouse.

THE Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice that a Lighthouse has been built upon the Island of Devaar, at the entrance to the Bay of Campbeltown, in the county of Argyll, the light of which will be exhibited on the night of Monday, 10th July, 1854, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening till the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a Specification of the Lighthouse, and the Appearance of the Light, by MR. DAVID STEVENSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 55° 25' 45", and W. Long. 5° 32' 16".

The Devaar Light will be known to mariners

as a Revolving Light, which shews a bright white light once every half-minute.

The Light is elevated about 120 feet above the level of high water of ordinary spring tides, and may be seen at the distance of about 15 nautic miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere: to a nearer observer, in favourable circumstances, the light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness. The arc illuminated by this light extends from about S. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. by compass, to about W. b N., and faces northwards.

And Her Majesty was further pleased to order and direct, by the said Order in Council, that in respect of the said light on Devaar, and in respect of another light in Loch Ryan, on the south side of the basin of the Clyde, erected by the said Commissioners, there shall be paid by every vessel before described, and under the exemptions aforesaid, which shall navigate on a distinct voyage within the great basin of the Clyde, bounded by a line drawn from the Point of Corsewall to Glenarm, in Ireland, on the south-east, and from another line drawn from the Mull of Kintyre to Fairhead, in Ireland, on the north-west, and on all other sides by the coasts of Ireland and Scotland surrounding the said basin, a similar rate of toll to that above set forth, being at the rate of threepence for each of the said lights.
