IT is hereby notified, that a communication has been received by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, from Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Napier, commanding Her Majesty's Naval Forces in the Baltic, dated Hangö Bay, 28th May, 1854, informing their Lordships that the ports of Libau and Windau, on the coast of Courland, and other ports, roads, havens, or creeks, from lat. 55° 53' north, to as far north as Cape Dager Ort, including the ports of Riga, Pernau, and all other ports, roads, havens, or creeks in the Gulf of Riga were then in a state of Blockade by a competent force :

That all ports, roads, havens, or creeks, eastward from Cape Dager Ort, including Hapsal, Wormsö Island, Port Baltic, Revel, and other intermediate ports on the coast of Esthonia, as far as Ekholm Light [situated in lat. 59° 43' north, longitude 25° 48' east]; and from thence in a north-west direction as far as Helsingfors and Sveaborg, on the coast of Finland; continuing westward, Barö Sound, Hangö Head, Orö, and Abo, including the Åland Archipelago and intermediate ports; from thence north, including Nystad, Biorneborg, Christinestadt, Vasa, Walgrund Islands, Little Carleby, Jacobstad, Great Carleby, Lahts, Kalawki, Brahestad, Uleaborg, Karle Island, Tio, Gestila, Tornea, Ned. Tornea, [situated in lat. (about) 65° 50' north, longitude 24° 15' east,] and all intermediate Russian ports, roads, havens, and creeks in the Gulf of Bothnia, and all the before-mentioned ports and places, are and were then in a state of strict Blockade by a competent force.

And it is hereby further notified that all the measures authorized by the laws of nations and the respective Treaties between Her Majesty and the different Neutral Powers, will be adopted and executed with respect to all vessels which may attempt to violate the said Blockade.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the provisions of "The Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850," duly prepared and laid

before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that the parish of Manchester, in the county palatine of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester is of great extent, and contains a very large population.

"That in addition to the cathedral church of the said diocese of Manchester, many new churches or chapels have at various times been erected and consecrated within the said parish of Manchester.

"That under the provisions of the Church Building Acts, or some or one of them, and on the representation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, and by virtue of and in conformity to an Order of His late Majesty in Council, dated the twenty-third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, a district chapelry (taken out of the said parish of Manchester) was assigned to the church of Saint George at Hulme, in the said parish.

"That under the provisions of the Church Building Acts, or some or one of them, and on the representation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, and by virtue of and in conformity to an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, a district chapelry taken out of the said parish of Manchester, was assigned to each of the nine several churches or chapels next herein-after mentioned, (that is to say),

"The church of Saint Peter Blackley;

"The church of All Saints Newton;

"The church of Saint James Gorton;

"The church of Saint Lawrence Denton;

"The church of Saint James Didsbury;

"The church of Saint Clement Chorlton-cum-Hardy;

"The church of Saint Matthew Stretford;

"The church of Saint James Birch; and

"The church of Saint Thomas Heaton Norris; all of which several churches are situate in the said parish of Manchester.

"That by the last-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, it was ordered that the Blackley Chapel District should consist of and comprise the township of Blackley; that the All Saints district in Newton, should consist of and comprise the townships of Newton, Failsworth, and Droylesden; that the Saint James's District Gorton,

should consist of and comprise the township of Gorton; that the Denton Chapel District should consist of and comprise the townships of Denton and Houghton; that the district of Saint James in Didsbury, should consist of and comprise the townships of Didsbury, Withington, and Burnage; that the district of Saint Clement in Chorlton-cum-Hardy, should consist of and comprise the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy; that the district of Saint Matthew in Stretford, should consist of and comprise the township of Stretford, and that part of the township of Moss Side which is contiguous to the township of Stretford; that the Birch Chapel District, in Rusholme, should consist of and comprise the township of Rusholme, and such part of the township of Moss Side, as is contiguous to the township of Rusholme, on the north side of such township; and that the district of Saint Thomas, in Heaton Norris, should consist of and comprise the townships of Heaton Norris, Levenshulme, and Reddish.

"That by five several instruments, under the hand and seal of the bishop of the diocese, dated respectively the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, the eighteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty, the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, a particular district taken out of the said parish of Manchester was (under the provisions of the Church Building Acts or some or one of them) assigned to every of the five several churches next herein-after mentioned, (that is to say,) the church of Christ at Heaton Norris; the church of Christ at Harpurhey-cum-Moston, the church of Saint John at Broughton, the church of Saint Margaret at Whalley Range, and the church of Saint John at Longsight, all in the said parish of Manchester.

"That in the fourteenth year of your Majesty's reign, an Act of Parliament was passed, intituled 'An Act to authorize the division of the parish of Manchester into several parishes and for the application of the revenues of the collegiate and parish church, and for other purposes.'

"That a new church within the said parish of Manchester has been consecrated, since the passing of the said last-mentioned Act, by the name of 'the church of Saint John the Baptist Heaton Mersey,' and such new church has been built and is situate within the said district chapelry so assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas Heaton Norris as aforesaid, but the same was not built in pursuance of the provisions of an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign for making better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes.

"That under the provisions of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of your Majesty's reign, and on the representation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, and by virtue of and in conformity to an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, a district parish named 'the district parish of Saint John Heaton Mersey,' taken wholly out of the said district chapelry which was so assigned to the church of Saint Thomas Heaton Norris as aforesaid, was set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint John Heaton Mersey, and was severed and disannexed from the said parish of Manchester, and from the said district chapelry so assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas Heaton Norris.

"That in addition to the several churches herein-before mentioned, there are four other consecrated churches in the said parish of Manchester, to which districts have not yet been assigned, namely, the church of Saint Paul at Withington; the church of the Holy Trinity at Hulme; the church of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme; and the church of Saint Paul at Kersall Moor; but none of such four several last-mentioned churches were built in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, passed in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances affecting the said parish of Manchester, and the said several ten chapelry districts, and five particular districts herein-before mentioned, so respectively taken out of the said parish, and assigned or annexed to the said several churches respectively, as aforesaid; it appears to them to be expedient that the said several ten chapelry districts, and five particular districts so respectively assigned to the said several churches respectively as aforesaid, should be superseded by the substitution in lieu thereof of districts for such churches, respectively set out, declared and constituted under the provisions of the first section of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of your Majesty's reign, chapter forty-one, intituled "the Parish of Manchester Division Act, one thousand eight hundred and fifty," with such variation of boundaries as to some of such districts as are herein-after mentioned, and that districts should also be set out, declared, and constituted under the provisions of such last-mentioned Section and Act, for the three other consecrated churches before-mentioned, viz.:—the church of Saint Paul at Withington; the church of the Holy Trinity at Hulme; and the church of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme; to which no districts have yet been assigned, with such boundaries as are herein-after mentioned, and that a district, under the provisions of the first and third sections of such last-mentioned Act, should be set out, declared, and constituted for the before-mentioned church of Saint Paul, Kersall Moor, to which no district has yet been assigned, and should comprise such part of the adjoining parish of Prestwich, in the county and diocese aforesaid, as is comprised within the boundaries of such district herein-after mentioned, and that such part of the said parish of Prestwich as is included within such boundaries, should be annexed to the district so to be set out and constituted for the said church of Saint Paul at Kersall Moor aforesaid.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Peter, Blackley, aforesaid, should be named 'The District of Saint Peter, Blackley,' with the boundaries as follows; that is to say: on the south-east by the township of Moston, on the north-east by the township of Alkrington, on the north and north-west by the township of Heaton, on the west and south-west by the township of Crumpsall, and on the south by the township of Harpurhey, as such district of Blackley is more particularly delineated on the map and plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured red and numbered 1.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of All Saints, Newton aforesaid, should be named 'The District of All Saints, Newton,' with boundaries as follows; that is to say: by a line commencing at the point where the boundary of the township of Newton crosses the Rochdale Canal near Butler's

Bridge, and proceeding north-easterly along the south-eastern side of that canal, as far as Hulme Hall-lane Bridge, or Farmhouse Bridge, then proceeding from that bridge south-easterly along the middle of Hulme Hall-lane, as far as the boundary line of the township of Newton, then proceeding easterly along the boundary line separating the township of Newton from the township of Droylesden, until they meet the township of Failsworth, then proceeding northerly and north-westerly, along the boundary line separating the said township of Newton from the township of Failsworth and Moston, as far as the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, then proceeding westerly across that railway, and along the boundary line separating the township of Newton from the township of Moston, until it meets the township of Harpurhey, then southerly along the boundary line separating the said township of Newton from the said township of Harpurhey, and the township of Colleyhurst, until it reaches the Rochdale Canal at the point where the boundary commenced, as such district of All Saints, Newton, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, and numbered 2.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint James, Gorton, should be named 'The District of Saint James, Gorton,' with boundaries as follows; that is to say: to be bounded on the north by Gorton or Corn Brook, which separates the township of Gorton from the townships of Ardwick and Openshaw, on the east by the boundary line separating the township of Gorton from the township of Audenshaw, on the south by Nico Ditch, which separates the said township of Gorton from the townships of Denton, Reddish, and Levenshulme, and on the south-west and west by an imaginary line commencing from the Nico Ditch at the south-eastern corner of a portion of the township of Rusholme, and proceeding northerly and westerly along the boundary of such portion of Rusholme until it meets the London and North-western Railway, thence proceeding northerly up the middle of that railway as far as Gore Brook, thence proceeding north-easterly along the middle of that brook to the boundary which separates the detached portion of Newton Township from Gorton Township, and proceeding north-westerly and then south-westerly along such boundary, as far as the footpath on the eastern side of the carriage and engine depôt of the said railway, thence proceeding along the middle of such footpath north-westerly and southerly as far as the said railway, thence proceeding northerly up the middle of the railway as far as Gorton Brook, as such district of Gorton is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, and numbered 3.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Lawrence at Denton, should be named 'The District of Saint Lawrence, Denton,' with boundaries as follows; that is to say: on the east by the boundary line separating the township of Houghton from the parish of Stockport; on the south by the boundary line separating the said township of Houghton and also part of the township of Denton from the parish of Stockport aforesaid; on the west and north-west by the boundary line separating part of the said township of Denton from the township of Reddish, and by proceeding north-easterly along the middle of Denton Brook as far as Windmill-lane, and then along the middle of that lane as far as Windmill House;

and on the north is bounded by proceeding easterly from Windmill House, and thence eastward in a straight direction to the centre of the bridge called 'Bromstair Bridge,' over the River Tame, as such district of Saint Lawrence, Denton, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue and numbered 4.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint James, Didsbury, should be named 'The District of Saint James, Didsbury,' with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing at the eastern end of Fog-lane, and proceeding westerly along the middle of that lane as far as the road leading to Manchester from Didsbury, crossing over that road into Lapwing Hall-lane, and proceeding up the middle of Lapwing Hall-lane as far as Burton Farm-lane, thence southerly along the middle of that lane to the boundary of the township of Didsbury, thence following westerly the boundary line separating the township of Didsbury from the township of Withington, until they reach the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy, thence proceeding in a southerly, westerly, again southerly and easterly direction, along the boundary line separating the township of Didsbury from the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy to the point where they meet the boundary line of the parish of Northenden, Cheshire, thence continued along the boundary of the township of Didsbury, and the said parish of Northenden until it meets the township of Heaton Norris, then northerly as far as the township of Burnage at Fog-lane, where the said line commenced, including the two detached portions of Burnage which lie, one to the east and one to the west of Burnage-lane and south of Fog-lane, as such district of Saint James Didsbury is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured brown and numbered 5.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Clement, in Chorlton-cum-Hardy, should be named 'The District of Saint Clement Chorlton-cum-Hardy,' with boundaries as follow; that is to say: to be bounded on the east by the boundary line separating the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy from the townships of Moss Side, Withington, and Didsbury, on the north and north-west by the boundary line separating the township of Stretford from the said township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy, and on the south-west and south by the boundary line separating the said township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy from the township of Sale, in the parish of Ashton-upon-Mersey, and the said parish of Northenden, both in the county of Chester, as such district of Saint Clement Chorlton-cum-Hardy is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue and numbered 6.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Matthew Stretford should be named 'The District of Saint Matthew Stretford,' and should comprise all that part of the township of Stretford lying and being within a line commencing at the point where the Trafford-lane and Chorlton-road meet, thence proceeding northerly up the middle of the said Trafford-lane to a footpath leading through Hullard Hall Gardens, thence easterly along the middle of the said footpath into Hullard Hall-lane, thence north-easterly along the middle of the said Hullard Hall-lane to its junction with the Stretford New-road, then easterly along the middle of the Stretford New-road to its junction

with the boundary line of the townships of Hulme and Stretford, then along that boundary line in a north-westerly direction, following the brook called Corn Brook as far as the River Irwell, then proceeding westerly along the middle of that river and the boundary line of the township of Stretford until it meets the township of Barton-upon-Irwell, then southerly along the boundary line separating the said township of Stretford from the township of Flixton and Urmston as far as the River Mersey, then proceeding easterly and north-easterly along the boundary line separating the said township of Stretford from the parish of Ashton-on-Mersey, Cheshire, and also from the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy as far as Trafford-lane and Chorlton-road, at the point where the boundary commenced, as such district of Saint Matthew Stretford is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured green and numbered 7.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church or chapel of Saint James, at Birch-in-Rusholme aforesaid, should be named 'The District of Saint James Birch-in-Rusholm,' with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing in the Wilmslow-road, at the point where the parliamentary and municipal boundary of Manchester leaves that road northward of Oxford-place, proceeding easterly along such boundary line as far as Anson-road, then proceeding south-easterly along the middle of Anson-road into Dickinson-road, then north-easterly along the middle of that road into Birch Hall-lane, then south-westerly along the middle of that lane as far as the Brook called Birch Brook, then north-easterly along that brook as far as the boundary of the township of Rusholme, then following the boundary line separating the said township of Rusholme from the township of Levenshulme southerly, easterly, and again southerly and westerly until it reaches Slade-lane, then proceeding southerly along the middle of that lane as far as Black or Cringle Brook, and then proceeding westerly along that brook as far as Lady Barn, when it turns northerly, proceeding along the boundary line of the said township of Rusholme until it reaches the middle of the high road from Wilmslow to Manchester, at the point where the said boundary line leaves the said road opposite Birch Fold-lane, and from thence north-westerly along the middle of the said high road to the point where the boundary commenced, as such district of Saint James Birch is more particularly shown by the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow and numbered 8.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Thomas, at Heaton Norris aforesaid, should be named 'The District of Heaton Norris,' with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing at a point where the boundary line of the townships of Levenshulme, Heaton Norris, and Burnage meet at Blackbrook, near the London and North Western Railway, and from such point proceeding southerly along the boundary line separating the said townships of Heaton Norris and Burnage until they meet at Shaw Brook, thence proceeding southerly along the middle of that brook as far as Teddy High-lane, thence along the middle of that lane and also of the lane on the west side of Broomfield until it reaches another lane leading to Pin Fold and to Green-lane, thence turning easterly and proceeding along the middle of the said lane, and easterly along the middle of Green-lane, as far as Moor-lane, thence proceeding north-easterly up the

middle of Moor-lane into Park-lane and continuing north-easterly up the middle of Park-lane, into the Manchester and Stockport-road, thence north-westerly up the middle of that road as far as Denby-lane, thence easterly up the middle of that lane until it meets the boundary line of the said townships of Heaton Norris and Reddish, and proceeding southerly along such boundary until it meets an old footpath leading to the said Manchester and Stockport-road, and proceeding south-easterly along the middle of such footpath to the north-eastern end of Lloyd-street, then south-easterly along the middle of Booth-street to Hamilton-street, then northerly along the middle of Hamilton-street as far as Short-street, and easterly along the middle of Short-street into the Manchester Old-road, thence south-easterly along the middle of the Manchester Old-road as far as the River Mersey, thence proceeding north-easterly along the boundary line of the said parish of Stockport until it reaches the point where the townships of Denton and Reddish meet, thence proceeding along the boundary line separating the said townships northerly and north-westerly until it reaches Nico Ditch, then westerly along the middle of such ditch until it reaches Slade-lane, where the boundary line separates the said township of Levenshulme from the said township of Rusholme, thence southerly along the boundary line separating the townships of Levenshulme and Rusholme, as far as Cringle Brook and the township of Burnage, then easterly along the said brook and Black Brook to the point where the townships of Levenshulme, Heaton Norris, and Burnage meet, and where the boundary line of the district of Heaton Norris commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink and numbered 9.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint George, at Hulme aforesaid, should be named 'The District of Saint George at Hulme,' and should comprise all the township of Hulme (save and except such part as has been assigned to the new parish of Saint Mark Hulme, and such other part as is intended to be assigned to and to constitute the proposed new parish of the Holy Trinity Hulme), and is to be bounded as follows; that is to say: by a line commencing at the bridge over the River Medlock at Knott Mill, at the point where the said bridge is crossed by the township boundary of Hulme, thence proceeding in a westerly direction along the middle of Chester-road, to opposite the middle of Great Jackson-street, thence in a southerly direction along the middle of Great Jackson-street and Upper Jackson-street, to Preston-street, thence in a south-westerly direction along the middle of Preston-street to opposite the middle of Chapman-street, thence in a southerly direction along the middle of Chapman-street, to where it meets the township boundary of Hulme, thence following the said boundary commencing in a southerly direction, and then proceeding westerly and north-westerly as far as the River Irwell, then north-easterly and south-easterly as far as the bridge over the River Medlock at Knott Mill aforesaid, whence the said boundary of the said district of Saint George Hulme, commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow, and numbered 10.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint John, at Longsight aforesaid, should be named 'The District of Saint John Longsight,' with

boundaries as follow ; that is to say : commencing in the Manchester-road at its junction with Grindlow-street, and proceeding south-westerly along the middle of that street to a footpath leading to High-street, continuing along such footpath and the middle of High-street into Anson-road, thence south-easterly along the middle of Anson-road, into Dickenson-road, thence north-easterly along the middle of Dickenson-road as far as Birch Hall-lane, thence south-westerly along the middle of Birch Hall-lane, as far as Birch or Gore Brook, thence north-easterly up the middle of that brook as far as the boundary line of a detached portion of the township of Newton, and proceeding southerly along such boundary until it reaches the London and North Western Railway, thence northerly up the middle of that railway as far as Gore Brook and along the middle of Gore Brook north-easterly until it again meets the boundary which separates the detached portion of Newton Township from Gorton Township, and proceeding north-westerly and then south-westerly along such boundary as far as the footpath on the north-eastern side of the carriage and engine depôt of the said railway, thence proceeding along the middle of such footpath to the wooden bridge over the said railway, crossing over the same and entering into an intended new street, and proceeding along the middle thereof as far as the Manchester-road, then proceeding north-westerly along the middle of the said road to the point where the boundary-line commenced, as such district of Saint John Longsight, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, and numbered 11.

" That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Margaret at Whalley Range aforesaid, should be named ' The District of Saint Margaret Whalley Range,' with boundaries as follow ; that is to say : by a line commencing at the point where Hullard Hall-lane joins the Stretford New-road, and proceeding north-easterly along the middle of that road until it reaches the boundary-line separating the townships of Hulme and Stretford, then proceeding south-easterly along the boundary of the said townships of Hulme and Stretford until they meet the boundary-line of the township of Moss Side, then easterly and northerly along the boundary-line separating the said townships of Hulme and Moss Side until it reaches the township of Chorlton-upon-Medlock, thence proceeding south-easterly along the boundary of the said townships of Moss Side and Chorlton-upon-Medlock, until it reaches Munton-street, thence proceeding southerly along the middle of Munton-street, into Moss Grove, thence easterly along the middle of Moss Grove until it reaches the township of Withington, thence following the course of the boundary-line separating the townships of Moss Side and Withington until it reaches a brook, thence following the course of that brook south-westerly into another brook called Longford Brook, thence following the course of the last-named brook, westerly, until it reaches the boundary-line separating the townships of Withington and Chorlton-cum-Hardy, thence proceeding northerly along such boundary until it reaches the boundary-line separating the township of Stretford from the said townships of Withington and Chorlton-cum-Hardy ; thence south-westerly along the boundary of the said townships of Stretford and Chorlton-cum-Hardy as far as Trafford-lane, thence proceeding northerly up the middle of that lane as far as a footpath passing through Hullard Hall Gardens into Hullard Hall-

lane, thence north-easterly and northerly along the middle of such footpath and lane as far as the Stretford New-road at the point where the boundary-line commenced, as such district of Saint Margaret, Whalley Range, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink and numbered 12.

" That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of Christ at Harpurhey-cum-Moston, should be named ' The District of Christ Church, Harpurhey-cum-Moston,' with boundaries as follow ; that is to say : to commence at a wooden bridge over the River Irk, at the north-western end of Crompton-lane, and proceeding southerly along the middle of that lane to the Rochdale and Manchester-road, crossing such road easterly to the western end of Lamb-lane, then proceeding south-easterly along the middle of Lamb-lane, as far as the municipal boundary of the borough of Manchester, and proceeding along that boundary to the point where the boundary-line of the townships of Harpurhey and Newton meet, then proceeding along such boundary north-easterly, until they meet the township of Moston, then proceeding easterly and north-easterly along the boundary separating the said townships of Moston and Newton, until they meet the boundary separating the township of Moston from the township of Failsworth, and continuing along the boundary of the townships of Moston and Failsworth, until they meet the boundary separating the township of Moston from the township of Chadderton, then continuing along the boundary of Moston and Chadderton north-westerly across White Moss, to the boundary of Moston, Alkrington, and Blackley Townships, then proceeding southerly and south-westerly along the boundary of the townships of Moston and Blackley, until they meet the township of Harpurhey, thence westerly and southerly along the boundary of the township of Harpurhey to the River Irk, then along that river southerly, as far as the wooden bridge where the boundary commenced, as such district of Harpurhey-cum-Moston is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, and numbered 13.

" That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of Christ, Heaton Norris, should be named ' The District of Christ Church Heaton Norris,' with boundaries as follow ; that is to say : by a line commencing in the River Mersey, at a point where the parliamentary and municipal boundary of Stockport meets the said river, and proceeding north-easterly along the middle of the river as far as Lancaster Bridge, thence proceeding north-westerly from such bridge along the middle of the old Manchester road as far as Short-street, thence westerly along the middle of Short-street to Hamilton-street, thence southerly along the middle of Hamilton-street to Booth-street, then north-westerly along the middle of Booth-street to the north-eastern end of Lloyd-street, whence it meets an old footpath, thence proceeding north-easterly along the middle of such footpath until it meets the boundary line separating the townships of Heaton Norris and Reddish, thence north-westerly along the boundary line of the said townships as far as Denby-lane, thence westerly along the middle of that lane into the Manchester and Stockport road, thence south-easterly along the middle of that road as far as Park lane, thence south-westerly along the middle of Park-lane into Moor-lane, and along the middle of Moor-lane into Green-lane, thence southerly along the middle of Green-lane as far as the point where the parliamentary and municipal boundary

of Stockport first meets such lane, then proceeding south-westerly along such boundary as far as the river Mersey, to the point where the boundary of the said district of Christ Church Heaton Norris commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow, and numbered 14.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint John at Broughton, should be named the District of Saint John Broughton, with boundaries as follow; that is to say: to commence in the middle of the Bury New-road, opposite the western end of Broom-lane, and proceeding easterly along the middle of that lane as far as Tetlow-lane, and along the middle of that lane to the boundary line separating the township of Broughton from the township of Cheetham, then proceeding in a southerly direction along such boundary until it reaches the river Irwell, then proceeding along the middle of that river, south-westerly, as far as the point where the township and municipal boundary of Salford crosses the river easterly of Broughton Bridge, then following the said township boundary in a southerly and northerly direction as far as the point where the grounds of Kersall House meet the said river and boundary, and then proceeding north-easterly on the southern side of Kersall House or grounds, and along the fence between the grounds of Richmond House and Cliff-place, as far as the Bury New-road, then proceeding southerly along the middle of that road to that point where the boundary line of the said district of Saint John Broughton commenced opposite to Broom-lane, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured light green, and numbered 15.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of Saint Paul at Withington, should be named the District of Saint Paul Withington, with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing at the point where Fog-lane and the road to Manchester meet at Lane End, and proceeding easterly and north-easterly along the boundary line separating the township of Burnage from the township of Heaton, until they meet the township of Levenshulme, then proceeding westerly along the boundary line separating the said township of Burnage from the township of Levenshulme, until it meets the township of Rusholme, then south-westerly, northerly, and north-westerly along the boundary line separating the said township of Rusholme from the townships of Burnage and Withington, until they meet a detached portion of the township of Hulme, continuing along the boundary line of the said township of Withington until it meets the township of Moss Side, thence westerly along the boundary line separating the said townships of Withington and Moss Side, as far as the brook called Longford Brook, then proceeding south-westerly along the course of that brook until it reaches the boundary line separating the said township of Withington from the township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy, then in a southerly direction proceeding along the boundary line separating the said township of Withington from the said township of Chorlton-cum-Hardy, until they meet the township of Didsbury, then in a north-easterly and south-easterly, and again in a north-easterly direction along the boundary line separating the said township of Withington from the said township of Didsbury, until they meet in Lapwing Hall-lane, then proceeding south-easterly along the middle of Lapwing Hall-lane, and crossing the road to Manchester, enters Fog-lane, and proceed-

ing along the middle of Fog-lane to the point at Lane End where the boundary commenced, as such district of Withington is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured green, and numbered 16.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Holy Trinity at Hulme should be named the District of the Holy Trinity Hulme, with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing in the centre of Chapman-street, at the point where the said street is crossed by the boundary of the township of Hulme, thence proceeding in an easterly and northerly direction along the said boundary to the middle of George-street, thence in a westerly direction along the middle of such last-mentioned street to the middle of Great Jackson-street, and thence in a southerly direction along the middle of such street and Upper Jackson-street into Preston-street, and along the middle of Preston-street to Chapman-street, then southerly along the middle of Chapman-street to the point where the said district of the Holy Trinity Hulme commenced, and which district is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, and numbered 17.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme, should be named the District of the Holy Trinity at Rusholme, with boundaries as follow; that is to say: by a line commencing in the middle of the turnpike-road from Manchester to Wilmslow, at the point where the boundary line separating the townships of Chorlton-upon-Medlock and Rusholme meet, and from thence proceeding southerly along the middle of that road until it reaches the boundary line separating the townships of Rusholme and Withington, south-eastward of Platt Chapel, thence proceeding westerly and northerly along such boundary line until they meet the boundary of a detached portion of the township of Moss Side, thence proceeding northerly along the western boundary of the said detached piece of the township of Moss Side, then westerly along the boundary separating Withington and Rusholme, to the boundary separating Moss Side and Rusholme, then northerly along the last-named boundary until it meets the township of Chorlton-upon-Medlock, thence proceeding south-easterly along the boundary line of the townships of Chorlton-upon-Medlock and Rusholme to the point where the boundary of the district of the Holy Trinity Rusholme commenced, and as the same district is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured red and numbered 18.

"That the district so to be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Paul at Kersall Moor, should be named 'the District of Saint Paul Kersall Moor,' and should comprise all that part of the township of Broughton-with-Kersall (and ecclesiastical district of Saint John, Broughton), in the parish of Manchester, lying and being within a line commencing from the township boundary in the middle of the River Irwell, below Kersall House, proceeding thence in a north-easterly direction from the said river along the south-eastern side of the grounds of Kersall House, and continuing between the grounds of Richmond House and Cliff-place (the same being up to this point marked by mere stones) to the middle of Bury New-road, thence southwardly along the middle of Bury New-road to the middle of Broom-lane, thence eastwardly along the middle of Broom-lane as far as the south-eastern corner of Broughton Park, thence

following the boundary fence of the said park (to be marked by three mere stones at the least) to its north-eastern corner, where it joins the boundary of the said township of Broughton with Kersall, then following the boundary of the said township of Broughton-with-Kersall in a westerly direction as far as the road leading from Kersall Moor to Hilton-lane, where the boundary line of the said township of Broughton-with-Kersall crosses the said road, and proceeding in a north-westerly direction along the middle of the said road to where the same intersects the middle of Hilton-lane, thence proceeding in a south-westerly direction along the middle of Hilton-lane or Rainsough to a point in the middle of the said lane opposite the north-east wall of the house belonging to the Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Prestwich, and now used as a Workhouse, then along the said wall and continuing round the same, and excluding the said Workhouse, again enters the said lane opposite the north-western wall of the said Workhouse, then continuing down the middle of the said lane to the middle of the River Irwell, on Agecroft Bridge, thence continuing in a southern direction along the middle of the said river, where the same meets the boundary line of the said township of Broughton-with-Kersall aforesaid, thence proceeding along the said boundary line in a south-easterly and north-easterly direction to the point where the boundary commenced, as such district of Saint Paul Kersall Moor is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured red and numbered 19.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, has been obtained to the aforesaid scheme, as required by the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of your Majesty's reign, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this present scheme or representation.

"And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the several incumbents, and to the several patrons to whom the same by law was directed to be sent, and pursuant to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act.

"And whereas one calendar month has elapsed since the said draft of the said scheme was transmitted to the said incumbents and patrons as aforesaid.

"And whereas no objections have been made thereto.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the foregoing scheme into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

And whereas the said scheme has been, together with the maps or plans thereto annexed, approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is hereby pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Manchester.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Ruislip, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and also of the parishes of Rickmansworth and Watford, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes of Ruislip, Rickmansworth, and Watford, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Northwood, in the said parish of Ruislip, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged and extended by the nineteenth and twentieth sections of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend the Church Building Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Northwood,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

on the said last-mentioned Tithe Commutation Map, and then northerly along the western side of the last-mentioned piece of land, and of No. 1789 to the southern side of No. 1765, then westerly along No. 1765 to the western side thereof, and then northerly along the western side of Nos. 1765 and 1763 until they reach the road leading from Rickmansworth at a place called Frogmore, and from thence along the middle of the said road in a south-easterly direction to the south-western corner of enclosure No. 1808 on the said last-mentioned map, then in a northerly direction along the western side of the said enclosure, and thence proceeding towards the east and south-east along the northern boundaries of enclosures numbered respectively 1808, 1809, 1810, 1811, and 1829, to the south-western corner of enclosure No. 1908, and then in a northerly direction along the western sides of enclosures Nos. respectively 1908, 1907, and 1899, then in an easterly direction along the northern sides of enclosures numbered respectively 1899 and 1898, and then in a southerly direction along the eastern side of the said last-mentioned enclosure to where it joins enclosure No. 1906, then in an easterly direction along the northern sides of enclosures, numbered respectively 1906 and 1905 to the north-eastern extremity of the last-mentioned enclosure, and then in a southerly direction along the eastern side of the said enclosure 1905, to the north-western corner of enclosure No. 1913, and then easterly along the northern boundaries of enclosures Nos. respectively 1913 and 1915, then in a southerly direction along the eastern sides of enclosures Nos. 1915 and 1917, to where the last-mentioned enclosure joins a road leading to Watford, and thence proceeds in a north-easterly direction along the middle of the said road to an angle where two roads meet opposite the north-eastern corner of enclosure No. 1916 on the tithe-commutation map of the parish of Watford, and then proceeds in a southerly direction along the middle of the said road into another road, near to where the boundary line of the parishes of Watford and Ruislip meet, and at the south-eastern end of enclosure No. 1930 on the said tithe-commutation map of Watford, and from thence proceeds southerly along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as the south-eastern corner of enclosure, marked No. 1 on the said enclosure map of the parish of Ruislip, and then along the middle of the said road in a south-westerly direction to a lane there leading to Pinner, and branching off from the north-eastern corner of enclosure No. 108 on the said last-mentioned map, and then along the middle of the said lane, towards Pinner to the south-eastern corner of the last-mentioned enclosure where it meets another road leading from Pinner to Rickmansworth, and then proceeds in a north-westerly direction along the middle of the said last-mentioned road to another road at the eastern corner of enclosure No. 71 on the said last-mentioned map, and then proceeds along the middle of the said road, on the south-eastern side of enclosures Nos. 71 and 72 respectively, to the southern corner of No. 72, and thence in a north-westerly direction along the southern side of enclosure No. 72 to where the same adjoins enclosure No. 69, and then in a south-westerly and north-westerly direction along the southern side of such enclosure, and also of enclosure No. 38, to where the same adjoins enclosure No. 39, and then along the southern boundary of No. 39, as far as the reservoir, then in a straight line from enclosure No. 39, across the reservoir there marked No. 40, and also of enclosure No. 41 to the southernmost point of Ruislip Coppice, along the southern side

of such coppice, to the place where the same meets the road, leading from Ruislip towards Rickmansworth, at the point where the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry of Northwood commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink, blue, and yellow.

"That the consents of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, of the Right Reverend George Bishop, of the said diocese of Rochester, and also Patron (in right of his see) of the parish church of the said parish of Rickmansworth, of the Right Honourable Arthur Algernon, Earl of Essex, Patron of the parish church of the said parish of Watford, and of the Dean and Canons of your Majesty's Free Chapel of Saint George, within your Majesty's Castle of Windsor, patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Ruislip, have been severally obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Northwood, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Charles James, Bishop of London, George Bishop, of Rochester, and Arthur Algernon, Earl of Essex, have signed and sealed this representation, and the said Dean and Canons have affixed their common or capitular seal hereto.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said Dean and Canons, the said George, Bishop of Rochester, and Arthur Algernon, Earl of Essex (as such respective patrons as aforesaid), testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said Charles James, Bishop of London, and George Bishop of Rochester, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Northwood aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Right Honourable Robert Grosvenor, commonly called Lord Robert Grosvenor, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Northwood, in the parish of Ruislip, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an Incumbent or perpetual Curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Right Honourable Robert Grosvenor, commonly called Lord Robert Grosvenor, his heirs and assigns for ever, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the dioceses of London and Rochester respectively.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said James Henry, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, and Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, as such respective patrons as aforesaid (testified as aforesaid), with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned) and also of the said James Henry, Bishop of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (testified as aforesaid) that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint James, at Bream aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of Saint James, situate at Breem otherwise Bream, in the parish of Newland, and in the county of Gloucester, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be vested in, and belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Bishop of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol for the time being, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

1. I TRANSMIT herewith, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the accompanying communications as per schedule from Captain O'Callaghan, of Her Majesty's ship Encounter.

These communications contain the particulars of a very serious conflict between considerable numbers of the Chinese Imperialist soldiers, employed in the siege of Shanghai, and the naval force, commanded by Captain O'Callaghan, in conjunction with the commander of the United States sloop of war, Plymouth, and assisted by a body of volunteers from the factories in that vicinity.

2. The operations reported by Captain O'Callaghan appear to have originated in the necessity for taking vigorous measures for the defence of the British and other factories, and to have led eventually to the seizure of the Chinese war-junks, and to the expulsion of the Chinese soldiers from the camps they occupied contiguous to the borders of the settlement.

3. I regret that it is not in my power to afford their Lordships any further official information on this subject, beyond that which is contained in Captain O'Callaghan's reports herewith transmitted.

4. In bringing this subject to their Lordships' notice, I beg to point attention to the very gallant conduct evinced by Captain O'Callaghan and by all the officers, seamen, and marines engaged. The conduct of Commander the Honourable G. D. Keane, and of Lieutenants Dew and Majendie, and of a party of 10 marines, who resolutely withstood the attack of an enormously superior force, is particularly commended by Captain O'Callaghan, and I trust it may be considered such as to merit some mark of their Lordships' favour and approval.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that a collision has taken place between the Imperialist Forces before the city of Shanghai and ourselves, under the following circumstances.

2. At about 4 P.M. on the 3rd instant I observed the signal (previously arranged) for the small arm men of Her Majesty's ships to land, which was promptly obeyed.

3. I shortly received a message from Commander the Honourable G. D. Keane (who happened to be on the spot at the time) that the Imperial troops were firing on our people, and the ground was being held by the marines of the main guard.

4. I advanced with the Encounter's men to the spot indicated (the race course), which is within the limits of our boundary, where a sharp firing was being maintained on either side.

5. Her Majesty's Consul and Vice-Consul were there; and at the former's requisition, and quite in accordance with my own views, I determined on

at once acting on the offensive, and having clearly ascertained the camp from which the aggression had been made, took it and burnt it, which I am happy to say was effected without loss, as the troops retired the moment we opened fire upon them.

6. Commander Kelly, of the United States ship Plymouth, also landed his crew, and having arranged with him for the protection of the settlement during the night by means of strong patrols, the rest of the crews were re-embarked.

7. Her Majesty's Consul deeming it advisable to take further steps for the security of the settlement, I suggested the taking possession of the Chinese Fleet, and holding it until a camp (which most unnecessarily has been pitched close to the boundary, and from which most wanton attacks have frequently been made) was removed, and in this he concurred.

8. In accordance with the above, I sent the boats of the Grecian, with the pinnacle of the Encounter (commanded by Lieutenant Dew) under the command of Commander the Honourable G. D. Keane, to take possession of the junks, and bring them down under the Encounter's guns, which he effected most judiciously; and I take this opportunity of stating that from him I received every assistance that adroitness and promptitude could afford.

9. I think it my duty to call your attention to the conduct of Lieutenant Majendie, of Her Majesty's sloop Grecian; he was officer of the guard at the time the aggression took place, and on being sent for repaired to the spot with 10 marines, and there kept a considerable body of men at bay until reinforced; and I feel it due to Lieutenant R. Dew, 1st Lieutenant of this ship, to mention the promptitude and smartness with which the crew of the Encounter were landed.

*Advanced Post, Shanghai,
April 5, 1854.*

10. Since the above was written I have the honour further briefly to inform you, that at the request of Her Majesty's Consul, in accordance with the other Consuls, we have found it requisite to attack the Imperial camps near our boundary, which have been most gallantly taken. I have not time to enter into details, as I am writing this on the field.

11. The Imperialists have retired in considerable force (4 to 5,000 men) to the main camp. My object will be now to defend the settlement, but the force at my disposal is small, and I urgently request a reinforcement, if possible some troops; indeed so critical do I deem our position that I have resolved on ordering the Styx up, if the senior officer at Amoy can spare her.

12. I cannot too strongly praise the conduct of Commander Keane, and Lieutenant Dew, who most gallantly stormed the very strong works thrown up.

13. I am anxious this should reach as soon as possible, and for this purpose the Nymph clipper will sail to night or to morrow morning.

14. Our available force is about 300 men with the Americans. Captain Kelly with his gallant crew has operated with me in a most effective and cordial manner. I am much indebted to the gallant and steady conduct of himself, officers, and men, and to all under my command. (Enclosed is a list of the killed and wounded). Her Majesty's Consul and Vice-Consul,—the latter with 40 gentlemen of the settlement,—have been with me in the field, and afforded me much assistance.

15. I will take the earliest opportunity of affording you a more detailed account; but of this

you may rest assured, that the extreme measures taken were positively requisite for the safety of the community.

SIR,

I RECEIVED on the 22nd your reports, dated on the 4th and 5th instant, written from the scene of action, describing the operations and arrangements in which you had been engaged up to the latest of those dates, and containing explanations of some of the circumstances which had

led to the very serious collisions you describe, with the forces of an Empire at peace with Her Majesty.

On a full review of those communications, it is my duty to point out, that it belongs to the Crown alone to declare war; and that the orders and instructions of the Admiralty prohibit the commission of acts of hostility towards the subjects of foreign countries, and that Naval Officers will be held most strictly responsible for any departure from the line of duty thus marked out.

In the particular case comprised in your reports, it is clear that the seizure of the Chinese camps and junks were acts of hostility against the public forces of a State, not only at peace with the Crown, but towards whom we are enjoined to shew the utmost consideration. No such acts can be justified on the ground that they were recommended or called for by any Consular Officer. They can only be justified by the immediate and unavoidable necessities of your position at the time, and it is by the proof you adduce of the existence of such necessities, that the Admiralty will judge of the propriety of such a departure from its positive injunctions.

I have considered, as it is my duty to do, the circumstances you relate, and I am bound to acknowledge that they appear to have been such as to have left you no alternative, consistent with the safety of the interests you had been ordered to protect, but to pursue the course you took upon the 3rd and 4th instant; but I must apprise you, that in cases of this nature, it is not for me to pronounce a conclusive judgment.

With respect to the measures you took for effecting the objects you had in view, supposing these to have been justifiable, I am at liberty to form a more decided opinion; and I have, therefore, to inform you that your personal conduct, and that of the gallant captain, officers, and men who co-operated with you from the United States' ship Plymouth, and the conduct of Commander Keane, and of Lieutenants Dew, Hemsted, Majendie, and Montgomery, and of the seamen and marines, and gentlemen-volunteers engaged on the occasions referred to, has elicited my warmest admiration; and I shall take an opportunity to bring to the notice of the Admiralty the names of the officers you particularly mention, and of the 10 marines who so resolutely withstood the attacks of a very superior force upon the 3rd of the month.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to inform you that I arrived off the port of Libau on the evening of May 10th, in company with Her Majesty's Ship Conflict, and having received information from various sources that the town was defended by only 500 or 600 soldiers, and two or three guns, and that several Russian merchant vessels lay dismantled in the port, I determined to bring them out.

On the morning of the 17th we stood in towards the entrance of the river, and by careful sounding with boats ahead succeeded in anchoring both ships within gun shot of part of the town. I then directed Captain Cumming to take a summons to the Governor, under a flag of truce, calling on him to surrender the merchant vessels within three hours. The Governor refused, but said that a final answer would be sent before the time specified in my letter. At 3.30 p.m., Captain Cumming, who had informed me that there was a considerable body of troops in the town, again landed to receive the answer—a letter, which I enclose. On ascertaining its contents I took the armed boats of both ships, with Captain Cumming in command of those of Conflict, into the river. With the exception of one or two, the soldiers kept out of sight, and not a shot was fired. It was well for us that they did so, as we pulled up the creek, which was fifty yards broad, for one and a half miles before arriving at the shipping. I desired the authorities to point out the Russian vessels, of which I then directed Captain Cumming and Lieutenants Wodehouse and Hore to take possession. I detained a small steamer (originally Russian, now owned by a Dane), got her steam up, and kept her as a refuge for the boats in case of an attack.

The magistrate stated that they were induced to yield thus submissively, from their being convinced that if they were to overpower us, a large force would be sent, and the town perhaps destroyed.

The boats captured eight merchant vessels all new and well found, but dismantled, sails unbent, some scuttled and aground, nevertheless they were all brought out and taken in tow by Amphion and Conflict, before 9 p.m.

The private property found on board was restored to the owners on application for it.

Although I had the opportunity of destroying a large amount of the enemy's property, such as their houses, vessels on the stocks, and vessels repairing, I did not consider it right to do so, as the troops had left the town so pitifully to its fate, and the people had assisted in getting the vessels out, by opening the bridge, &c., which would have detained us some considerable time, had we been obliged to blow it up, though I was prepared to do so.

The fact of the town of Libau containing 12,000

inhabitants and formed by nature with unusual facilities for defence, being temporarily taken possession of by 130 men without a shot being fired, I attribute almost entirely to the judicious conduct of Captain Cumming during his conference with the magistrates when he landed with a flag of truce.

I have great pleasure in testifying to the exemplary behaviour of all the officers, seamen, and marines, employed on this service.

SIR,

THE duty of summoning you to surrender the merchant vessels in the port of Libau, has fallen upon me.

I would willingly spare the town and the lives of the inhabitants; if, therefore, the steam vessel, and all the Russian merchant vessels in the port (above and below the bridge), are sent out in their present condition, within three hours after the receipt of this letter, not a shot shall be fired. The men bringing them out shall be landed under a flag of truce.

If at the expiration of that time this demand is not complied with, the consequences rest with you. In which case I trust that you will cause the women and children to leave the town, and the invalids to be removed to some conspicuous building, which, if indicated by a flag, will be respected.

SIR, *Town Hall, Libau, May 17, 1854.*

THE notification addressed by Her Britannic Majesty's Commander of the Amphion, to deliver up the Russian merchant vessels in the port of Libau, has been received by the magistrates of this town, there being no Military or Civil Governor.

The town of Libau being in a defenceless state has no power to resist the demand.

The peaceable inhabitants are compelled to submit themselves to any demands put to them; they expect, however, that Her Britannic Majesty's power will only undertake that which is consistent with humanity and honour.

The ships demanded cannot, and will not, be refused; but it is entirely impossible to deliver them in the time prescribed, as the most of them are unrigged and lying on a swampy ground.

Under these circumstances the magistrates can only reply that Her Majesty's Commander should convince himself of the impossibility, and resolve in which way the said merchant vessels are to be brought out of harbour.

Trusting that meantime no hostilities will be undertaken against the town and its inhabitants.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(Translation.)

PLANA (OR TABARCA) ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE, OFF
THE BAY OF ALICANTE.

FROM the 1st day of June, 1854, will be exhibited every night from sunset to sunrise, a new Light established on Plana or Tabarca Island, at the distance of 2010 feet of Burgos (1836 feet English) from the eastern point of the said island, and at 560 feet (511 feet English) from the seashore in a northern direction.

This lighthouse is in latitude $38^{\circ} 10' 13''$ N., and in longitude $5^{\circ} 45' 38''$ E. of the Naval Observatory at San Fernando (equal to long. $0^{\circ} 32' 22''$ W. of Greenwich). The lantern is a catadioptric apparatus of the third order; and the light is a *fixed light of the natural appearance, with flashes at intervals of two minutes*. It is elevated 98.9 feet ($90\frac{3}{10}$ feet English) above the level of the sea, and produces a tangent of $10\frac{2}{10}$ miles, but it may be seen at greater or lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere and the height on which the observer is placed; all which is published for the information of Mariners.
