WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the succentorship of the cathedral church of York, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an

Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said succentorship (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, and duly published in the London Gazette, on the ninth day of the same month of August, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof:

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said succentorship, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by

and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be

empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Hurst, otherwise Bishopshurst, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable:

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to make further provision, and to amend and render more effectual three Acts, passed in the fifty-eighth and fifty-ninth years of His late Majesty, and in the third year of His present Majesty, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of all other powers or authorities in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Monkton Combe, in the

county of Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, at Combe Down, in the said parish of Monkton Combe (which said church was built by subscription under the provisions of the Act secondly hereinafter mentioned), under and by virtue of the power and authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' in conjunction with the provisions contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to make further provision, and to amend and render more effectual three Acts passed in the fifty-eighth and fifty-ninth years of His late Majesty, and in the third year of His present Majesty, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and of all other powers or authorities in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Combe Down,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—commencing at the north-eastern corner of a close of land called Upper Lawn, No. 187 on the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Monkton Combe, adjoining the road dividing the said parish from the parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe, in the county of Somerset; then southward along the middle of the lane bounding the eastern side of the same close to the south-eastern corner thereof; then south-westerly along the north side of the close of land, No. 161 on the said map, to the western boundary of the said last-mentioned close; then south-easterly along the western boundary of such close and of a close of land, No. 160 on the same map; then south-westerly along the northern boundary of the close of land, No. 155 on the same map, and south-easterly along the western boundary of the said last-mentioned close to the point where it adjoins a close of land, No. 153 on the same map; then south-westerly along the northern boundary of the said last-mentioned close, into the lane or road leading to Brass Knocker Hill, No. 300 on the same map; then along the middle of the same lane or road to the south-eastern corner of the close of land, No. 120 (B) on the same map; then proceeding in a westerly direction along the southern boundary of the said last-mentioned close to the eastern boundary of the close of land, No. 121 (B) on the same map; then southerly along such eastern boundary to the foot-bridge over the pond, called Tucking Mill Pond, No. 117 on the same map, where the said parish of Monkton Combe joins the parish of South Stoke, in the said county of Somerset; then in a westerly direction by the said parish of South Stoke to the point where the same joins the parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe; and then north-westerly and easterly along the boundary line separating the said parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe from the said parish of Monkton Combe, to the point at the north-eastern corner of the said close, No. 187, where the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Combe Down commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave

further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church of the Holy Trinity, at Combe Down aforesaid; and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections herebefore mentioned; and also the consent of the Reverend Henry Calverley, Clerk, Master of Arts, vicar and incumbent of the vicarage and parish church of the said parish of South Stoke, and (as such vicar) patron of the parish church of the said parish of Monkton Combe, and also patron of the said church, called Trinity Church, at Combe Down aforesaid; and likewise the consent of the Reverend George William Newnham, Clerk, Master of Arts, incumbent of the said parish church of Monkton Combe; and also the consents of the Reverend William Batchellor, Bachelor of Arts, of Kingsdon, in the said county of Somerset, Clerk; The Reverend Francis Lockety, Bachelor of Laws, of Swainswick, in the said county of Somerset, Clerk; and Richard Heywood, of Bath Easton, in the same county, Esquire, as the majority of the subscribers entitled to elect the trustees of Trinity Church, at Combe Down aforesaid, have been respectively obtained thereto as required by the Act and section secondly herebefore mentioned; in testimony whereof the said Richard, Bishop of Bath and Wells, Henry Calverley, George William Newnham, William Batchellor, Francis Lockety, and Richard Heywood, have respectively signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church or chapel of the Holy Trinity at Combe Down, in the parish of Monkton Combe, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth

years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the Church Building Acts," and of the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that on or about the eighteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, your Majesty's said Commissioners (with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the diocese of Winchester, and also of the Right Honourable and Reverend Francis, Earl of Guildford, Sir Matthew Blakiston, of Sandy Brook, in the county of Derby, Baronet, the Reverend William Wilson, Vicar of the parish of Holy Rood, in the town of Southampton, and Alexander Gordon, of Old Broad-street, in the city of London, Esquire, severally signified under hand and seal) made a representation to your Majesty in Council, that it appeared to them to be expedient, and they therefore humbly prayed that a particular district should be assigned to Trinity Church, situate in the parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, in the said diocese of Winchester, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' in conjunction with the provisions contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to make further provision, and to amend and render more effectual three Acts passed in the fifty-eighth and fifty-ninth years of his late Majesty, and in the third year of His present Majesty for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and that the district so proposed to be assigned to the said church, called Trinity Church, should be named or called 'The Chapelry District of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, Southampton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those set forth in the said representation and next hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: on the north side, by a divisional line through the centre of the Northam-road, abutting upon lands in the said parish of Saint Mary; on the east side, by a divisional line through the centre of Saint Mary's-street, abutting upon other portions of the said parish; on the south side, by a divisional line through the centre of the newly widened road called South Front, King's-bridge-place, abutting on the lands called Hoglands, in the said parish; and on the west side of the boundary line that divides the said parish of Saint Mary from the parish of All Saints, and which said district was more particularly delineated on the map or plan annexed to the said representation, and coloured pink.

"That by an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, your Majesty was graciously pleased by and with the advice of your Privy Council to approve of the proposed assignment of the said district, and to order that the same should be accordingly made agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said parish of Saint Mary Southampton, and also of the said district chapelry so assigned to the said church, called Trinity Church as aforesaid, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that the boundaries of such district should be altered, under or by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixth section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to further amend the Church Building Acts,' as enlarged by the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' and that the boundaries next hereinafter mentioned should be substituted for those comprised in your Majesty's said Order in Council of the eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight; that is to say:

"Bounded on the east by an imaginary line along the middle of the London and South-Western Railway as far as Northam-road-bridge, on the north by the said imaginary line proceeding westerly from the Northam-road-bridge along the middle of the Northam-road to the intersection of that road with Love-lane, and thence north-westerly along the middle of Love-lane, as far as Compton-walk, and then westerly along the middle of Compton-walk to the boundary line of the parish of Saint Mary Southampton, then proceeding southerly along such boundary line as far as South Front-road, then proceeding easterly along the middle of the said road, called South Front-road, and also along the middle of Bevois-street, as far as the said London and South-Western Railway, where the boundary line of the said district chapelry commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan herunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"That the consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, and also as patron in right of his see of the parish church of the said parish of Saint Mary Southampton, and likewise the consent of the Reverend Joseph Cotton Wigram, Master of Arts, Rector and Incumbent of the same parish church, have been severally obtained to such proposed alteration of boundaries as aforesaid, as required by the two Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof, the said Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, and Joseph Cotton Wigram, have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order and it is hereby ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the boundaries of the said district chapelry of the Holy Trinity, in the parish of Saint Mary Southampton, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, August 7, 1854.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, copies of Despatches from Her Majesty's Consuls at the places noted in the margin, containing the information given below, relative to the Quarantine measures that have been adopted in the south of Europe in consequence of the outbreak of cholera :

MARSEILLES—

On vessels from this port, entering the ports of Nice and Genoa, a 5 days' quarantine is imposed ; at Leghorn and Civita Vecchia, 6 days ; at Naples, 10 days at the Lazaret of Nisida ; and in the ports of Spain, 10 days at the Lazaret of Mahon.

LEGHORN—

The quarantine already imposed by the Board of Health of this Port, on vessels arriving from France and Corsica, has been increased to a 9 days' observation ; as also a similar quarantine of observation on vessels arriving there from Genoa and Naples.

ROME—

The Board of Health at Civita Vecchia have subjected all arrivals from Malta to a quarantine of 6 days ; as also those from Marseilles, which is extended also to arrivals from the upper Italian ports, unless it can be proved that no communication whatever has been had with Marseilles.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, August 7, 1854.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Brussels, reporting that the temporary prohibition to the exportation of Corn from Belgium was to cease on the 31st ultimo ; but that the export of Potatoes was still prohibited.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of "postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or Inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates that might be payable were to be paid; and it is provided that the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order and direct, that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any of the Danish Colonies in the West Indies, and transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom, and any port or place in such colonies (the sea conveyance being by British packet boats) there shall be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage now payable by law on such letters, an uniform British rate of sixpence.

And we direct that on every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one ad-

ditional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

And we further direct, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, or by any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post Office, and that all such exemptions and privileges shall remain in full force.

And we further direct, that this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

Provided, lastly, and we hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter, to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
