This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to remove doubts concerning the due acknowledgment of deeds by married women in certain cases.

An Act for the formation, regulation, and government of convict prisons in Ireland.

An Act to provide for the mode of passing letters patent and other acts of the Crown relating to India, and for vesting certain powers in the Governor-General of India in Council.

An Act to appoint persons to administer oaths, and to substitute stamps in lieu of fees, and for other purposes, in the High Court of Admiralty of England.

An Act to provide for the better registration of births, deaths, and marriages in Scotland.

An Act for further regulating the sale of beer and other liquors on the Lord's Day.

An Act to render reformatory and industrial schools in Scotland more available for the benefit of vagrant children.

An Act further to improve the administration of justice in the Court of Chancery of the county palatine of Lancaster.

An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Oxford, of the colleges therein, and of the college of Saint Mary, Winchester.

An Act for making a railway from the South Wales Railway, at or near the borough of Carmarthen, to the town of Newcastle Emlyn, with a view of being hereafter extended to the town and harbour of Cardigan, and for other purposes.

An Act for authorizing and confirming arrangements and agreements between the Eastern Counties Railway Company, and all or any of the Norfolk, the Eastern Union, the East Anglian, and the Newmarket Railway Companies, and for

other purposes; and of which the short title is "The Eastern Counties and the Norfolk, the Eastern Union, the East Anglian, and the Newmarket Railway Act, 1854."

An Act to alter and extend the North Metropolitan Railway, and to consolidate and amend the provisions relating thereto.

An Act to repeal an "Act for better regulating the poor within the city of Oxford," and to grant further and more effectual powers in lieu thereof, and also to provide for rating to the relief of the poor certain hereditaments within the University of Oxford.

An Act for making a railway from the London and South Western Railway, at Salisbury to Yeovil, and to form a junction with the railways at Yeovil, of the Great Western and Bristol and Exeter Railway Companies respectively, and for other purposes.

An Act to repeal and amend the Act for incorporating the British Guarantee Association, and to make further provisions as to the management and regulation thereof.

An Act to transfer the Paisley Waterworks to the Magistrates and Council of Paisley, and to enable them to construct additional works for supplying Paisley, Johnstone, and places adjacent, with water.

An Act to authorize the consolidation into one undertaking of the Great Western, the Shrewsbury and Birmingham, and the Shrewsbury and Chester Railways, and the Union into one Company of the three several Companies to whom the said railways respectively belong.

*Alcatraz Island Light,
San Francisco, California.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that the light on Alcatraz Island, San Francisco Bay, will be exhibited at sunset on the night of June 1st, 1854, and continued every night thereafter, from sunset to sunrise.

The light is produced by a fixed Third Order Fresnel Illuminating Apparatus; is 160 feet above the level of the sea; illuminates the entire horizon, and should be seen from sea under ordinary states of the atmosphere, at a distance of 12 miles off the heads.

Commerce, respecting alterations in the position of Buoys at the mouth of the River Weser.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

PUBLICATION respecting the alterations that have been made in the relative positions of the buoys and tuns in the channel or fairway at the mouth of the River Weser.

On the 1st October, 1853, a public notification was issued to the effect, that in the course of the present year an alteration would take place in the relative position of the buoys and tuns in the fairway or channel of the Weser; and such said alteration having been effected and arranged, the following particulars bearing reference thereto are herewith brought to public notice:—

I. Instead of the previous four red and two white buoy tuns, six red and five white tuns are now laid down in the new channel or fairway. The red tuns on coming in lie on the starboard side, are buoy tuns in the usual form. The white tuns, on the contrary, have the form of the usual Weser tuns.

a. The first Red Tun at the new mouth of the Weser, which is distinguishable by a gilt key on a pole and two white-painted keys on its sides, lies in 9 fathoms water at low water, and the bearings from it by compass are—

The two beacons on Wangeroog, in a line, and . . . S.W.

The Church Steeple on Wangeroog . . . S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.

The Church at Minsen . . . S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

The second A Pear Tun . . . S.E. by E.

The first White Outer Tun, No. 1 . . . E. $\frac{5}{8}$ S.

b. The second Red Tun A, distinguishable by a gilt pear on a pole, and two white-painted A's on its sides, lies in $8\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms water at low water, and the bearings are—

IV. On the other hand, the following five tuns, hitherto lying at the mouth of the old fairway or channel, have been taken up; viz.:—the Black Tuns, Key A and B, and the White Tuns, No. 1 and No. 2.

The White Tuns, situated on Tegeler's Plate, hitherto marked No. 3 and 3 a, are at present marked No. 2 and 3.

The position of the remaining black and white tuns below the Floating Light (light vessel) and up to the Black C Tun, but which, instead of the cross, is at present distinguishable by carrying a black vane-stock (Flügel Stange), remains, till further notice, unaltered.

All vessels coming in and making the new mouth of the Weser, on an E.S.E. tack, will, after having found the first Red Buoy Key Tun in the above specified bearings, retain their course for a short distance till within the vicinity of the first White Outer Tun, and having reached this, they will have to direct their course S.E., and then get the Floating Light (light vessel), No. 1, straight before them. Steering in a direct line up to the Floating Light (light vessel), they pass over the sandridge of the former Mellum direct into the old channel.

The depth of water in the new mouth is 9, 10, 11, and 8 fathoms; and on the sandridge of the Mellum, which is moreover but very narrow, 27 Bremen feet at low water, or fully 4 fathoms English.

The specified depths of water are taken in English measure.

In conclusion it is further notified, that in the spring of next year, the first Weser Key Tun will be painted black, instead of red as at present, but that with respect to the remaining tuns no alteration will take place.

Exhibition of a New Revolving Light at North Ronaldshay, and Alteration of the Start-Point Light from a Revolving Light to a Fixed Light.

I. NORTH RONALDSHAY LIGHTHOUSE.

THE Commissioners of the Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that the Lighthouse formerly advertised as being built upon the Island of North Ronaldshay in Orkney, has been completed, and the light will be exhibited on the night of Friday the 1st September, 1854, and every night thereafter, from the going away of day-light in the evening, to the return of day-light in the morning.

The following is a Description of the Lighthouse, and the Appearance of the Light, by Mr. DAVID STEVENSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 59° 23' 15", and W. Long. 2° 23' 38"; it stands on the northern point of the Island of North Ronaldshay, and by compass Moul-head of Papa-Westra bears

W.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., distance, 15 nautic miles; and Start-Point of Sanday Lighthouse bears S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., distance, 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The North Ronaldshay Light will be known to Mariners as a Revolving Light, producing a bright flash of the natural colour once in every 10 seconds. It will be visible all round the compass. The Lantern is elevated 140 feet above the level of the sea; and the light will be seen at the distance of about 18 nautic miles, and at lesser distances, according to the state of the atmosphere.

And the Commissioners hereby further give notice, that by an Order in Council, dated 7th March, 1851, as subsequently modified by another Order in Council, dated 29th December, 1853, they are authorised to levy the following tolls in respect of the above lighthouse, viz.:

For every vessel belonging to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland (the same not belonging to Her Majesty, Her heirs, and successors, nor being navigated wholly in ballast), and for every foreign vessel which, by any Act of Parliament, Order in Council, Convention, or Treaty, shall be privileged to enter the ports of the said United Kingdom upon paying the same duties of tonnage as are paid by vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (the same not being navigated wholly in ballast) which shall pass or derive benefit from the said light at North Ronaldshay, one-sixteenth of a penny per ton of the burthen of such vessel each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said light, if on a coasting voyage, and one halfpenny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said light on an over-sea voyage.

And for every foreign vessel navigated as aforesaid, not privileged as before mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls above specified.

Which tolls are further declared to be subject to the following abatements on payment being made:—Over-sea vessels, twenty-five per cent.; coasting vessels, ten per cent.

II. START-POINT LIGHTHOUSE.

The Start-Point Light, which is 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from North Ronaldshay Light, being at present a Revolving Light, producing a bright flash once in every minute, the Commissioners further give notice, that on and after the night of Friday the 1st September, 1854, when the new Revolving Light at North Ronaldshay is to be exhibited, the present Revolving Light at Start-Point will be changed to a Fixed Light of the natural colour.

Regulations for the admission of Candidates for the appointment of Assistant-Surgeons in the Service of the East India Company.

ALL natural born subjects of Her Majesty may be candidates for admission into the service of the

East India Company as Assistant-Surgeons; they must, however, be between 22 and 28 years of age, and of sound bodily health.

They must subscribe and send in to Dr. Scott, the Physician to the Honourable East India Company, before the 10th day of December, 1854, a declaration to the following effect:

"I (christian and surname at full length), a candidate for employment as an Assistant-Surgeon, in the service of the East India Company, do hereby declare, that I was years of age on the day of last, and that I labour under no constitutional disease or physical disability that can interfere with the due discharge of the duties of a medical officer; and I also attest my readiness to proceed on duty to India within three months of receiving my appointment."

This declaration must be accompanied by the following documents:—

1. Proof of age, either by extract from the register of the parish in which the candidate was born, or by his own declaration, pursuant to the Act 5 and 6 William 4th, cap. 62.

2. A diploma in surgery or a degree in medicine, provided an examination in surgery be required for such degree, from somebody competent by law to grant or confer such diploma or degree.

3.
