The humble and dutiful Address of the Court, Clergy, and Douzainiers of your Majesty's Island of Alderney.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the undersigned, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, desire most humbly and respectfully to approach your Majesty with their and the inhabitants' heartfelt satisfaction at your Majesty's visit to this Island.

Separated, as we are, from the rest of our countrymen, the only remains, with the neighbouring islands, of your Majesty's royal predecessors' Norman subjects, who, from generation to generation, have kept inviolate their devoted loyalty to your Majesty's Crown and Government,

Your Majesty's gracious visit to these shores enables the inhabitants to renew in person their ardent loyalty, homage, and devotion to your

Majesty's sacred Person.

Most sincerely do we implore the Almighty
Disposer of events to bless your Majesty with a
continued long and prosperous life to reign over

a happy and devoted people.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An "Act for carrying into effect the reports of the "Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the established church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and reverences of an as they relate to episcopal dioceses, "revenues, and patronage," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with certain

"modifications, the fourth report of the Commis"sioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,"
and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her
Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and
"amend two several Acts relating to the Eccle"siastical Commissioners for England," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a
scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of
July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and
fifty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect 'the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the established church in ' England and Wales, with reference to ecclesias-'tical duties and revenues so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into 'effect, with certain modifications, the fourth re-'port of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical ' Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An 'Act to explain and amend two several Acts re-'lating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for 'England,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Bishop of Chichester for certain estates belonging to his see:

"Whereas it was by the secondly and thirdly recited Acts enacted that, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, or of the said first recited Act, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any bishop, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to the see of such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Ashhurst

Turner, Bishop of Chichester, is seised in right of his see of the messuages, hereditaments, and premises, particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, subject nevertheless to the sub-

sisting leases thereof.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls; and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund, that the said messuages, hereditaments, and premises, should be transferred from the said see of Chester to us, and that an annual money paymant to the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, and to his successors, should forthwith be substituted for the same.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his corporate seal, that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and after the day of such gazetting, the messuages, hereditaments, and premises so described and referred to in the said schedule hercunto annexed, and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein of the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, and of his successors, Bishops of Chichester, shall be and become transferred and conveyed from the said bishop and his successors, Bishops of Chichester, to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be, for the purposes of the said Acts, absolutely vested in us, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, as from the twenty-fifth day of December last past:

"And we further recommend and propose, that in consideration of and for such conveyance and transfer, and in substitution for the said messuages, hereditaments, and premises, there shall be paid by us to the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of Chichester, and to his successors, Bishops of Chichester, the annual sum of eight hundred and twenty seven pounds, by equal half-yearly payments; and that the first of such payments shall be considered to have accrued due on the twenty-fifth day of June now last past, and that the next of such payments shall be made on the twenty-fifth day of December now next ensuing.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act

of Parliament."

SCHEDULE.

All those messuages or tenements and buildings with the ground and soil thereof or belonging thereto, situate and being in Chancery-lane, Symond's-inn, Bream's-buildings, White's-alley (otherwise Church-passage), Chichester-rents, and in some other adjacent places in the city of London, and in the county of Middlesex, and in the liberty of the Rolls, or in some or one of them, which several messuages, tenements, buildings, and hereditaments, form part of the estates belonging to the Bishop of Chichester, in right of his see, and are particularly mentioned and referred to in an Act of the tenth year of his late Majesty King George the Fourth, "for enabling "the Lord Bishop of Chichester to grant building "leases of certain estates belonging to the said "see."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An "Act to amend and render more effectual an Act " passed in the last session of Parliament for build-"ing and promoting the building of addi-"tional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, in-tituled "An Act to make better provision "for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts "to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and " for other purposes," and of all other powers in that behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the second day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Lee, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, called Christ Church, situate in Lee Park, in the said parish of Lee, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and 'render more effectual an Act, passed in the last 'session of Parliament, for building and pro-'moting the building of additional churches in -'populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for 'the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to 'churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other 'purposes,' and of all other powers in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Lee Park,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say

"Commencing from a point opposite the Tiger's Head, near the county bridge; and proceeding northerly along the boundary line which separates the parish of Lee from the parish of Eltham, the liberty of Kidbrook and parish of Charlton, until it reaches the parish of Lewisham; thence westerly along the boundary line of the said parishes of Lee

and Lewisham, to the end of the Collin's Estate, where it meets the glebe; thence southerly along the division between the glebe and the said Collin's Estate to Lee-lane; thence westerly along the middle of Lee-lane, as far as the wall which divides Mr. Lawrence's house and grounds from the nursery ground occupied by - Marsh; thence southerly along Mr. Lawrence's boundary wall to a point where it is intersected by the enclosure fence, at the rear of the houses in Albert-place; thence westerly to the rear of the houses in Dacreplace; thence southerly in a right line with the end of the house at the eastern extremity of Royal Oak-place to a point in the centre of the road, opposite to the end of Church-street; thence westerly along the middle of Dacre-street to a point in that street, about one hundred and thirty-one feet from the middle of Church-street; and thence by a line to be drawn straight southerly to the centre of the turnpike road leading from London to Maidstone; thence south-easterly along the middle of that road to a point on the south side of the county bridge, at the bottom of Lee Park; and from such point southerly by an imaginary line on the western side, and at the distance of three hundred and ninetysix feet throughout, from the centre of Burnt Ashlane to the extreme southern boundary of the said parish of Lee; then proceeding easterly and northerly along the boundary line separating that parish from the parish of Bromley on the south, and the hamlet of Mottingham, and parish of Eltham, on the east, as far as the point opposite to the Tiger's Head, where the boundary line of the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Lee Park, commenced, as the same is more particulary delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed in the said church, called Christ Church, Lee Park aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church or chapel, called Christ Church, situate in Lee Park, in the parish of Lee, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms and churchings, in the said church, and of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

The Whalsey Light will be known to Mariners as a Revolving Light, which shews a bright White

Light once in every minute.

The temporary light will be exhibited from a tower of timber frame work, and is elevated about 108 feet above the level of high-water of ordinary spring-tides, and may be seen at the distance of about 16 nautic miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere. To a near observer, in favourable circumstances, the light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness.
