Convention between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French, respecting Prisoners of War.

Signed at London, May 10, 1854.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, May 20, 1854.]

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the Emperor of the French, being desirous of regulating the disposal of prisoners who may be taken in the course of the war in which their Majesties are jointly engaged, have named as their Plenipotentiaries for this object, namely:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable George William Frederick, Earl of Clarendon, Baron Hyde of Hindon, a Peer of the United Kingdom, a Member of Her Britannick Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Her Britannick Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs;

And His Majesty the Emperor of the French, the Sieur Alexandre Colonna, Count Walewski, Grand Officer of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, Grand Cross of the Order of St. Januarius of the Two Sicilies, Grand Cross of the Order of Danebrog of Denmark, Grand Cross of the Order of Merit of St. Joseph of Tuscany, &c., &c., his Ambassador to Her Britannick Majesty;

Who, after having exchanged their full powers, found in due form, have agreed to the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The prisoners made in the course of the present war shall, as far as possible, be divided equally between the two countries.

Whenever one of the two countries shall have maintained a greater number of prisoners, or shall have supported a certain number for a longer period of time, an account shall be made every three months of the excess of expenditure which may have been incurred, and repayment shall be made of the half of the amount by the Government of the other country.

ARTICLE II.

Instructions shall be hereafter concerted between the two Governments in order to make known to officers of their naval and military forces the places or ports to which the prisoners are to be sent.

Et Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français, le Sieur Alexandre Colonna, Comte Walewski, Grand Officier de l'Ordre Impérial de la Légion d'Honneur, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre de St. Janvier des Deux Siciles, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre du Danebrog de Danemark, Grand-Croix de l'Ordre du Mérite de St. Joseph de Toscane, &c., &c., son Ambassadeur près Sa Majesté Britannique;

Lesquels, après avoir échangé leurs pleins pouvoirs, trouvés en due forme, sont convenus des dispositions suivantes:—

ARTICLE I.

Les prisonniers qui seront faits dans le cours de la guerre actuelle, seront, autant que possible, répartis entre les deux pays d'une manière égale.

Dans le cas où l'un des deux pays aurait eu à entretenir un plus grand nombre de prisonniers, ou en aurait eu un certain nombre pendant un plus long temps à sa charge, il sera fait tous les trois mois un compte de l'excédant de la dépense qui en sera résulté, et le remboursement de la moitié de cet excédant sera opéré par le Gouvernement de l'autre pays.

ARTICLE II.

Des instructions seront ultérieurement concertées entre les deux Gouvernemens pour faire connaître aux officiers de leurs forces navales ou militaires les lieux ou ports vers lesquels devront être dirigés les prisonniers.

ARTICLE III.

If a dépôt for prisoners should be established in any place not in the possessions of either of the two countries, the expenses of it shall be borne between the two Governments; but the advances to be made shall be by the Government which shall have appointed officers to take charge of the establishment.

ARTICLE IV.

Whenever the two Governments shall agree to an exchange of prisoners with the enemy, no distinction shall be made between their respective subjects who may have fallen into the hands of the enemy, but their liberation shall be stipulated according to priority of the date of their capture, except under special circumstances, which are reserved for the mutual consideration of the two governments.

ARTICLE V.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London in ten days, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at London, the tenth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

ARTICLE III.

Si un lieu de dépôt pour les prisonniers venait à être fixé hors des possessions de l'un des deux pays, les frais en seraient supportés par les deux Gouvernements, mais l'avance en serait fait par celui qui aurait préposé ses officiers à la gestion de l'établissement.

ARTICLE IV.

Toutes les fois que les deux Gouvernements conviendront de faire avec l'ennemi un échange de prisonniers, il ne sera fait aucune distinction entre les sujets respectifs tombés au pouvoir de l'ennemi, mais leur libération sera stipulée à raison de l'antériorité de date de leur capture, sauf les circonstances spéciales dont les deux Gouvernements se réservent l'appréciation commune.

ARTICLE V.

La présente Convention sera ratifiée, et les ratifications en seront échangées à Londres dans le délai de dix jours, ou plus tôt si faire se peut.

En foi de quoi les Plénipotentiaires respectifs ont signé la présente Convention, et y ont apposé le cachet de leurs armes.

HIS Grace the Duke of Newcastle has received two Despatches, of which the following are copies, addressed to his Grace by Brigadier General Harry David Jones, of the Royal Engineers:

No. 5. *Camp before Bomarsund,*
MY LORD DUKE, *August 16, 1854.*

IN my despatch No. 4, under date the 14th instant, I stated that there was every prospect of being able to open my batteries, erected against Fort Nottich, yesterday morning: I have now the honour to report that at 8 A.M. yesterday morning I ordered the two batteries, which were manned by seamen from the Fleet and detachments of Royal Marine Artillery, under the command of Captain Ramsay, R.N., to open their fire; this was done in a very effective manner, by a spirited and extremely well-directed fire. By 3 P.M. the interior of the tower was laid open, and all the guns silenced. At 6 P.M., a white flag having been hoisted, I directed my Brigade-Major, St. George Ord, who had offered his services to take his tour of duty on the batteries, and who was then so employed, immediately to proceed, and take possession of the fort; this duty he performed in a very satisfactory manner; but finding that it would not be possible for him to keep open his communication with my advanced posts after day light, in consequence of the proximity of the principal work, he brought off three officers and 115 soldiers, who gave themselves up to him as prisoners: I have in consequence sent them to the admiral, Sir C. Napier, for shipment.

In the fort were sixteen 18-pounder iron guns, and two 32-pounder iron guns.

Garrison—

I Lieutenant of Engineers, 1 Captain of Infantry, 1 Sub-Lieutenant, Infantry, and 129 men, Artillery and Line.

There were 6 killed and 7 wounded.

Notwithstanding the heavy and well-directed fire upon our batteries, both from Fort Nottich and Presto, the casualties were very few, but amongst that number I have to regret the loss of a very promising young officer of Engineers, Lieutenant the Honourable C. Wrottesley, who received a mortal wound from a cannon ball, which had struck a trunnion of one of the guns.

My thanks are specially due to Captain Ramsay, R.N., and the officers of the Royal Navy, and seamen; and also of the detachment of the Royal Marine Artillery, for the spirited and energetic manner in which they performed the laborious duty of dragging the 32-pounders up the mountain, to the site of the batteries. From my second in command, Colonel Graham, of the Royal Marines, and Aide-de-Camp to Her Majesty, and from all the officers and men employed under my orders, I continue to receive the most willing assistance. Although the operations of the last forty-eight hours may appear to be insulated and independent of those carrying on by the French troops, I have to state that I have constantly been acting in close communication with General Baraguay d'Hilliers, and that whatever I have ordered to be done, or executed, has been part of the general plan of attack, and which now must be considered as drawing to a close.

I HAVE the honour to report, that on the morning of the 16th the fire from the fleet was resumed, and after about two hours' firing, the white flag was hoisted on the large fort of Bomarsund, and the garrison* surrendered unconditionally, and were embarked in two hours afterwards.

The interior of the fort showed that the fire from the ships had been excellent; nevertheless the injury to the works was trifling, and ought not to have induced the Governor, with such a strong garrison, no breach, and a well casemated work, to have surrendered. The cause may be considered that, finding two of his principal advanced works taken, a breaching battery ready to open, and no prospect of relief, it would be a sacrifice of life to hold out any longer: thus has been lost to Russia a most important military post, and, judging from the nature of the works existing, those partly erected, and the foundations of others which have been laid, it was evidently the intention of the Russian Government to have created a first-rate fortress; the position of Bomarsund at the entrance of the Gulfs of Finland and Bothnia, with a beautiful and extensive anchorage well sheltered, points it out as a position of the most favourable nature, and no expence apparently has been spared in the construction of the works already built, and the walls of those partly erected are of the same substantial nature.

The position of Bomarsund is naturally very strong, and favourable for defence; bold and rocky, with a fine command of the ground in its immediate front, and when occupied with suitable advanced works would make its capture a very long operation, and if fully garrisoned would require a very large force for its reduction: the Admiral has sent home his report accompanied by a joint report from the French General Niel and myself, upon the practicability of holding Bomarsund in its present state; that report will have reached London before this despatch, it is therefore needless for me to recapitulate the substance of that report, as your Grace will have been acquainted with it; in fact I have no copy, as it was called for in great haste, and no time was allowed me to do so before the departure of Lieutenant Nugent, Royal Engineers, the bearer of the Admiral's despatches.

This the first operation of the combined forces having been brought to a successful termination, I may be permitted to state that the utmost cordiality and good feeling have pervaded every branch of the service employed, English as well as French; and in making these observations I should not do justice to the officers of the Royal Navy, the seamen and marines of the fleet who were employed under my orders on shore, if I did not notice the great order and regularity as well as the great zeal with which every duty was performed, and the strict discipline which was observed in camp; not a single complaint has been made to me of any irregularity on their part.

From Captain Ramsay, R.N., in charge of the seamen, and from Colonel Graham, in command of the Royal Marines, I have received the most ready assistance, for which my acknowledgments are due; Captain Ord, my Brigade-Major, has been most active and zealous, and in addition to his staff duties he offered his services, and took his tour of duty, as an engineer, during the period our works were erecting. I have also to express how much indebted I am to my naval aide-de-camp, the

Hon. Edward Cochrane, for the assistance he has afforded me throughout our operations, and since I have been deprived of the services of Lieut. Cowell, he has performed that officer's duty, so far as a naval man could perform military duties.
