WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the "further amendment of the Church Building "Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; viz: "Your Majesty's Commissioners for building

new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Meifod, Llanfihangelyn-Gwynfa, and Llangyniew, in the county of Montgomery, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Pont Robert, in the said parish of Meifod, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building 'Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be called or named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Pont Robert,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

"Commencing at the influx of the Henfelin Brook into the River Mechan, at the point marked A on the map hereto annexed, and proceeding in a northwardly direction up the middle of that brook to one of its sources at Ffynnon Dorogan, on the township road leading from Pont Robert by Garthfach to Meifod; and thence along the middle of the said road, north-eastwardly, to its junction with the road from Llanfihangel to Meifod; and thence along the middle of that road, north-westwardly, to the Four Crosses, near Rhospenbwa; thence along the middle of the road, from Pont Robert to Llanfyllin, north-eastwardly, to the Brogan Brook, and along the middle of that brook to the influx of the Creignant Brook into it, near Cwmnantymeichiaid House; and thence north-westwardly, along the middle of the said last-mentioned brook, to the boundary of the parish of Meifod, near Llwybrygath, at the point marked B and C on the said map; then proceeding from such point on Creignant Brook, marked C, along the boundary of the said parish of Meifod and the boundary of the township of Llaethbwlch, north-eastwardly, as far as the parish of Llanfillin; then westwardly and south-westwardly, along the boundary of the township of Llaethbwlch to, and then along the middle of the road from, Penllys to

the road from Llanfihangel to Meifod; and thence along the middle of the last-mentioned road, westwardly, to the Moel Erful Brook, near Pandybach; and thence along that brook, westwardly, to the boundary of Pendugwm Farm; and thence along the northern boundary of that farm and also that of Letty-z-deryn to the Halfen Brook; and thence southwardly, along that brook to the River Mechan; and thence along the middle of that river, westwardly, to the influx of the Dolwar Brook, into it, at the point marked D and E upon the said map, and from the point marked E, proceeding southwardly and eastwardly, along the boundary fence separating the two farms of Bwlchgolen and Neuadd, till such fence reaches a small brook eastward of Neuadd House; and thence along that brook, southwardly, to its influx into the Hafesp Brook, near Tynewydd; and thence eastwardly, along the southern boundary of the township of Cynhinfa till it reaches the River Mechan, at Mathrafal Mill; and thence along the middle of that river to the aforesaid influx of Henfelin Brook, into the same, at the point marked A, where the boundary of the said consolidated chapelry of Pont Robert commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, pink,

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, and also as patron, in right of his see, of the parish churches of the said parishes of Meifod, Llanfihangel-yn-Gwynfa and Llangyniew has been obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Pont Robert, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed

and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, as such patron of the said parish churches of Meifod, Llanfihangelyn-Gwynfa, and Llangyniew, as aforesaid, is willing and has agreed, testified as aforesaid (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, at Pont Robert aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom

shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, at Pont Robert, in the parish of Meifod, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Bishop of the diocese of Saint Asaph for the time being, he being

the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint Asaph.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned places without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said places be discontinued, with the following modifications, from and after the twenty-third day of September instant (except as is herein otherwise directed), viz:

IARWICH.—To be discontinued forthwith in the church of St. Nicholas; and from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five in the churchyard thereof, and in the burial-ground of the Independent Chapel. To be discontinued forthwith in the church of Dover-court, and within three yards of the walls thereof; and, with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body to be buried in each grave in the churchyard.

Colchester.—To be discontinued forthwith in the following churches, and, from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the burial-grounds thereof, viz.; All Saints, St. James's, St. Peter's, St. Mary's-at-Walls, St. Leonard's, the Holy Trinity, St. Martin's, and St. Giles's. To be discontinued from the same date in the burialgrounds of St. Nicholas, the Wesleyan Chapel Culver-street, the Roman Catholic Chapel, Stockwell Chapel, the Baptist Chapel Stan-well-street, the Baptist Chapel Eld-lane, the Independent Chapel Lion-walk, the Independent Chapel Chapel-street, the Primitive Methodist Chapel, St. Botolph, and St. Runwald, and in the Friends' Burial-ground. No burial to take place within five yards of the new church of St. Mary Magdalen, nor within five yards of the enclosing walls of the pro-posed new churchyard of the said parish; and with the exception of family vaults and graves, one body only to be buried in each grave in the same.

Huntingdon.—To be discontinued forthwith in All Saints Church, St. Mary's Church, and the Wesleyan Chapel and vestry; and from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the church-yards of St. John the Baptist, All Saints, St. Benedict, and St. Mary. In the Friends' Burial-ground to be discontinued forthwith within three yards of the chapel walls, and of all surrounding buildings.

DORCHESTER, DORSET.—To be discontinued from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the churches and churchyards of All Saints, the Holy Trinity, and St. Peter.

FORDINGTON.—To be discontinued forthwith in the church of St. George, and in such part of the churchyard thereof as is within five yards of the church, or of any dwelling-house, and one body only to be buried in each grave.

WIMBORNE MINSTER.—To be discontinued from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in Wimborne Minster, and the parish burial-ground adjoining. In Holt Chapel burial-ground one body only to be buried in each grave, and no grave to be opened in a less period than twenty years. In the Meeting House Lane Burial-ground to be discontinued forthwith within five yards of the Independent Chapel or of any other building.

BLACKBURN.—To be discontinued forthwith in the parish churchyard, except in the part established under the authority of any Act of Parliament. To be discontinued from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the burial-grounds of the Independent Chapel, the Wesleyan Methodist Association, and of the Baptist Chapel (Town's Moor), and in the Quakers' Burial-ground; and forthwith within the said Baptist chapel. Except in private vaults and graves, one body only to be buried in each grave in the burial-ground of St. Alban's Roman Catholic Chapel, and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five. To be discontinued from the same date in Trinity Churchyard, St. Paul's Churchyard, and St. John's Churchyard.

SUNDERLAND.—To be discontinued forthwith under the parish church, and from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred

and fifty-six, in the churchyard.

BISHOP WEARMOUTH.—To be discontinued forthwith in the parish church vaults, the National School Cemetery, and vaults under the schoolroom, Bethel Chapel Cemetery, and Sans-street Baptist Chapel Burial-ground; from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the parish churchyard, Rectors Gilly Cemetery, and the Quakers' Burial-ground; and from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in the Jews' Burial-ground, Ayres Quay.

MONE WEARMOUTH.—To be discontinued from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in St. Peter's Churchyard, and forthwith in Dundas-street Chapel and Burial-ground. To be discontinued forthwith in the chancel vault of All Saints' Church, and from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the churchyard of the same.

WINCHESTER.—To be discontinued forthwith in the Cathedral, in the churches of St. Peter Cheesehill, St. John, St. Michael-in-the-Soke, and St. Bartholomew Hyde; and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the burial-grounds of the Cathedral, St. John, St. Martin Winnall, St. Thomas, St. Martin-in-the-Soke, and St. Bartholomew Hyde.

BISHOPS STORTFORD. — To be discontinued forthwith in the Parish Church, and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the Parish Churchyard, in the Baptist Chapel Burial-ground, and in the Independent Chapel Burial-ground. To be discontinued forthwith in the burial-

ground of All Saints Hocherill within five yards of the wall of the church, and of the

enclosing wall on the north side.

GREAT DUNMOW.—To be discontinued forthwith in the Parish Church, and also within five yards of all houses in the Friends' Burialground; and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the Parish Churchyard (except in three vaults in the said churchyard, which may be used for the members of the families to which they belong, leaden coffins being used, bricked over with cement or concrete), and in the burial-grounds of the Protestant Dissenters' Chapel, and of the Baptist Chapel.

LEWISHAM.—To be discontinued forthwith in the churchyard within ten yards of the River Ravensbourne, and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, to be wholly discontinued in the

said churchyard.

SYDENHAM, KENT.—To be discontinued forthwith under St. Bartholomew's Church, and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the church-

yard of the same.

Totness.—To be discontinued forthwith in the Parish Church, and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the Parish Churchyard, except in existing vaults and brick graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in peat or other charcoal, and separately entombed by slate, concrete, or masonry.

ASHBURTON, DEVON.—To be discontinued forthwith in the church of St. Andrew, and (excepting in existing vaults or brick graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed by concrete, brickwork, or masonry,) in that part of the churchyard which is to the north of the church, or within five yards of the building.

BRIDPORT.—To be discontinued forthwith in the *Parish Church*, and from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the *churchyard*, except in existing vaults and brick graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in concrete, brickwork, or masonry.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in ease it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial,

shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Orders in Council of the eighth of August and twenty-fifth of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the burial-ground of the parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, in Gray's-inn-road; in the churchyard of the parish of Saint George-in-the-East; and in the churchyard of the parish of Camberwell, from the days mentioned in such orders respectively:

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount
Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal
Secretaries of State, has made representations
stating that he is of an opinion that the time for
closing the said churchyards may be in part

extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said representations into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be not discontinued in the burial-ground of the parish of Saint Andrew, Holborn, until the City burialground is fit for use; that in that portion of the churchyard of the parish of Saint George-in-the-East in which no interments have taken place, burials be discontinued from and after the first of October next, instead of from and after the eighth of August last; and that burials be discontinued in those parts of the churchyard of the parish of Camberwell not hitherto used for interments from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, instead of from and after the first of this instant September, as directed by a supplemental Order in Council of the eighth of June last.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial " of the dead in England, beyond the limits " of the metropolis, and to amend the Act con-"cerning the burial of the dead in the metro-"polis;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exemption or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifi-cations mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Crlers in Council of the eighteenth of February, twenty-ninth of March, seventh of April, first of May, eighth of June, and eleventh of August last, to direct that burials should be discontinued

in various burial-grounds in the places and parishes hereinafter mentioned, from and after the days

named in such orders respectively.

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has represented that he is of opinion that the time for closing certain of the said burial-grounds may be extended, and that certain modifications may be made in such Orders.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned burial-grounds as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Saint Mary Rye, from and after the first of December next, instead of from and after the first of June last.

In the burial-grounds of the parish of Kingstonupon-Thames from and after the first December next, instead of from and after the first October next.

In the churchyard of the parish of Alfreton, from and after the first October next, instead of from and after the twenty-first August last.

And it is hereby further ordered, that the vaults in *Mortlake* churchyard, belonging to E. Penrhyn, Esq., William Gilpin, Esq., Elizabeth Turner, the family of Sir F. M. Ommany, and Elizabeth Smith, widow, may be allowed to receive members of the families to which they belong, in lead coffins, embedded in brickwork or concrete.

And it is hereby further ordered, that the exception granted to private vaults and graves in the parish churchyard, and to Saint Paul's churchyard, *Warrington*, be restricted to private vaults only.

And it is hereby further ordered, that twentytwo vaults already built in the burial-ground of Tiviot Dale Weslyan Methodist Chapel, Heaton Norris, in Stockport, be permitted to be used for the members of the families to which they respectively belong, until such vaults be filled.

PARIS UNIVERSAL EXHIBITION OF

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 12th day of September, 1854.

By the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations.

MY Lords have had under consideration the best means of apportioning the space placed at their disposal by the French Imperial Commission among the various intending exhibitors, in such a way as to secure the most complete representation of our national industry which that space admits of.

In compliance with Art. 9, of the Regulations of the Imperial Commission, my Lords forwarded, on the 15th August (the day appointed), a return of the applications received up to that date, representing 2,130 exhibitors, who had applied for 348,625 square feet of horizontal space, including

the necessary addition for passages.

The Imperial Commission have announced their intention of allotting 15,000 square metres

intention of allotting 15,000 square metres (162,000 square feet), including passages, to this country, a quantity exceeding by 62,000 square feet the amount allotted to France in 1851, and must therefore be considered as a liberal allowance. It is, however, obvious that the demands of the United Kingdom must be materially reduced, in order to bring them within the prescribed limits.

Up to this time no judgment has been passed upon the character of the applications, although it must be evident that one part of them is more likely than another to reflect credit upon our national industry; and that though there are probably few applications which do not include

something of public interest and value, the general character of nearly the whole will be improved, if exhibitors should select only their most important

productions.

To pass such a judgment is evidently beyond the competence of the officers appointed by my Lords to attend to the business of the Exhibition, and it is upon the exhibitors themselves, and the Committees formed to represent their interests, that my Lords must depend for undertaking that selection, which in other countries is generally exercised by functionaries appointed by the State.

My Lords have therefore directed -

1st. That the necessary allowance shall be made for passages.

2nd. That the net space shall be broadly divided among the various classes of manufacture.

3rd. That a small reserve be made for the completion of such departments as may be unrepresented by the demands received; and-

4th. The remainder subdivided among the various Committees, partly in proportion to the number and character of the applications that have been received, and partly in proportion to the scale upon which each kind of industry is carried on in a locality.

Each Committee will then be requested to make such a division of the space thus allotted among the intending exhibitors as will be most creditable to their district, or to the particular branch of industry which they represent.

The Committees to which the demands will be

referred, will be as follows:-

1st. For Machinery and Civil Engineering. The Council of the Institution of Civil Engineers.

2nd. Agricultural Machinery. - The Committee appointed by the Royal Agri-

cultural Society.

3rd. Manufactures (Metropolis).-The Associate Committees for particular Trades.

4th. Manufactures (Provinces).—The Local Committees formed at Aberdeen, Arbroath, Belfast, Birmingham, Bradford, Derby, Dublin, Dudley, Dundee, Dunfermline, Edinburgh, Galashiels, Glasgow, Greenock, Huddersfield, Leeds, Macclesfield, Manchester, Norwich, Nottingham, Paisley, Preston, Sheffield, Staffordshire Potteries, Sheffield, Staffordshire Potteries, Stockport, Sunderland, Trowbridge, Walsall, Wolverhampton.

DIRECTIONS AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF HEALTH, issued under the authority of the Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848.

IN exercise of the authority vested in us. We. the General Board of Health, direct:

I. All Surveyors, District or Assistant Surveyors of Highways, Trustees, County Surveyors, and others by law entrusted with the care and management of streets and public ways and places, and where there are no public authorities so entrusted, the owners and occupiers of houses and tenements adjoining thereto, to take the measures necessary for the frequent and effectual cleansing thereof.


II. The owners and occupiers and persons having the care and ordering of all houses, dwellings, churches, buildings, and places of assembly, to cleanse, purify, ventilate, and disinfect the same.

III. All local authorities and persons whatsoever to exert all the powers vested in them by law for the removal of nuisances.

IV. All relations of, or others in charge of the bodies of, persons who have died of cholera or other epidemic disease, to obey the directions of the Medical Officers of the Guardians, as to the speedy interment of the dead.

In these Directions and Regulations, the word "Guardians" means the Guardians, Directors, Wardens, Governors, Parochial Board, or other like Officers having the management of the poor of any union, parish, combination, or place, where the matter requiring the cognizance of any such Officers arises, and the expression "Local Authority" means the Town Council, Local Board of Health, or any Trustees or Commissioners for the draining, paving, lighting, cleansing, managing, or directing the Police of any town, borough, or place, Highway Board, or any other body of a like nature, or any Commissioners of Sewers, or any body, excepting Boards of Guardians and Over-seers, having by law powers for the removal of nuisances.
