THE following Address was presented to the Queen on Her Majesty's journey to Scotland; and Her Majesty was pleased to receive the same very graciously :

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Newark, humbly crave your Majesty's gracious permission respectfully to welcome your Majesty within the precincts of our ancient borough.

We now place at the disposal of your Majesty these emblems and insignia of power which your Majesty's royal predecessors, in testimony of their approval of the great loyalty of our ancestors, more than two centuries since, bestowed upon them.

In former days our burgesses were accustomed to the frequent and lengthened visits of their Sovereign to the noble castle whose venerable ruins (still the property of your Majesty) adorn our town; and the feelings of strong attachment to the Throne which in those troublous times ever prompted the men of Newark to devoted loyalty to their King, still, in these happier days, animate as strongly the hearts of the present inhabitants of our borough.

It is now our happiness, by the blessing of God, after a long and important period in our country's history, again to hail our Sovereign's presence in our town.

It would be neither right or becoming for any particular locality in your Majesty's dominions to pretend to greater loyalty than another.

We believe that throughout the length and breadth of the land one universal feeling prevails of unceasing thankfulness that it has pleased the Almighty to bless us with a Sovereign whose virtues, while they tend firmly to establish her Throne, shed a lustre over every class of her subjects, and set an example worthy of imitation by all.

In these days of progress and enlightenment, the nation feels that in your Majesty and your august Consort they have the patrons of everything that tends to the encouragement of art and science, and the full development of true national liberty, and it is gratifying to reflect that as this liberty increases so does the attachment of the nation to the Throne of their Sovereign.

We have watched with the greatest interest the late visit of His Royal Highness Prince Albert to the shores of France, and trust that it is an earnest of

an alliance between the Sovereigns of two mighty nations which will never again be interrupted; and that by their united endeavours and the blessing of God upon the allied fleets and armies engaged in the present momentous struggle, a lasting and honourable peace may speedily be established, and the happiness and progress of the world not again be disturbed by the ambitious and selfish designs of any power.

We earnestly pray that it may please that Almighty Being (of whose mercies in granting us such an abundant harvest we have now so lively a remembrance) to bless and guard your Majesty, your august Consort, and the Royal Children, to protect your Majesty and them on your journey, and to spare your Majesty to reign long and prosperously over an enlightened and happy people.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the 54th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, chapter 159, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's docks, dock yards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores therein, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose," it is enacted (among other things) that no person or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks, of any port, harbour, or haven of this kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by order, under their hands, or the hand of their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of Ten Pounds.

And whereas we, as Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, have found it necessary for the protection of the navigation leading to Portsmouth Harbour, its channels, landmarks, and anchorages, and of certain shores and banks therewith connected, to prohibit the taking or removing of any ballast or shingle from the shores of the sea between high and low water marks at Hengistbury Head, from a point, on the west of the Head, where an ancient work, called the "Double Ditches," abuts on the sea cliff; and thence easterly to another point on the shore where the same is intersected by the channel or entrance to Christchurch Harbour, at or near the Coast Guard Station or Haven House at Muddiford. And we do therefore hereby order, that no person or persons shall take or remove any ballast or shingle, between high and low water marks, from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks, between the "Double Ditches" and the Coast Guard Station aforesaid.

NORTH UNST, SHETLAND—TEMPORARY LIGHTHOUSE.

THE Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that, with the view to a permanent light being ultimately established in the same locality, a temporary Lighthouse tower has been erected off the North End of the Island of Unst, in Shetland, and that the Light will be exhibited therefrom for the first time on the night of Wednesday, 11th October, 1854, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening till the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a Specification of the Lighthouse, and the Appearance of the Light, by MR. DAVID STEVENSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Temporary Lighthouse is erected on Muckle Flugga, being one of the group of rocks called the Burra Fiord Holms, which lie off the headland of Hermaness, being the northern extremity of the Island of Unst. The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 60° 51' 20", and W. Long. 0° 53' 3".

The small rock called the Out Stack, which is the most northern rock of the Shetland Isles, bears from the Lighthouse about E. b. N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. by compass, and is distant about half a nautic mile.

The North Unst Light will be known to Mariners as a Fixed Light, of the natural colour. It is elevated about 165 feet above the level of high-water of ordinary spring-tides, and may be seen at the distance of about nineteen nautic miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The Commissioners further give notice, that by Order in Council, dated the 3rd day of July last, the following tolls are authorized to be levied in respect of the said Lighthouse; viz. :—
